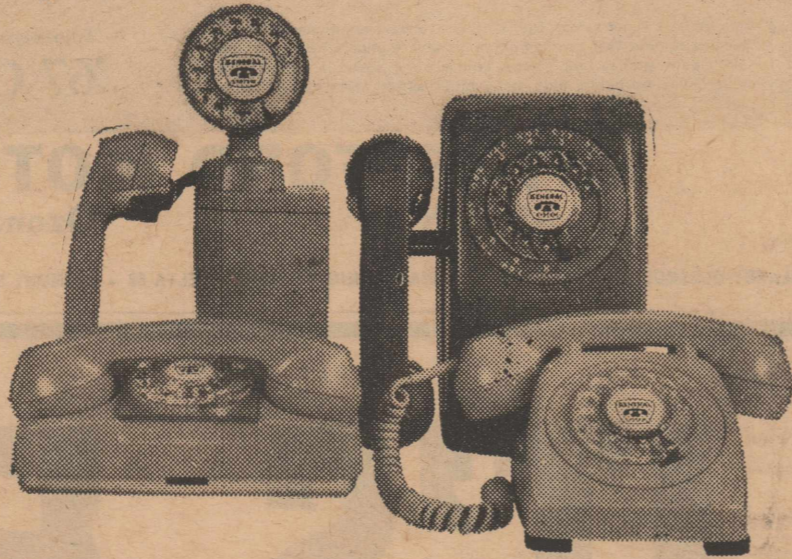
Prior to the last minute drive by the Eagles, the Ozona defense was almost unmovable, allowing only two

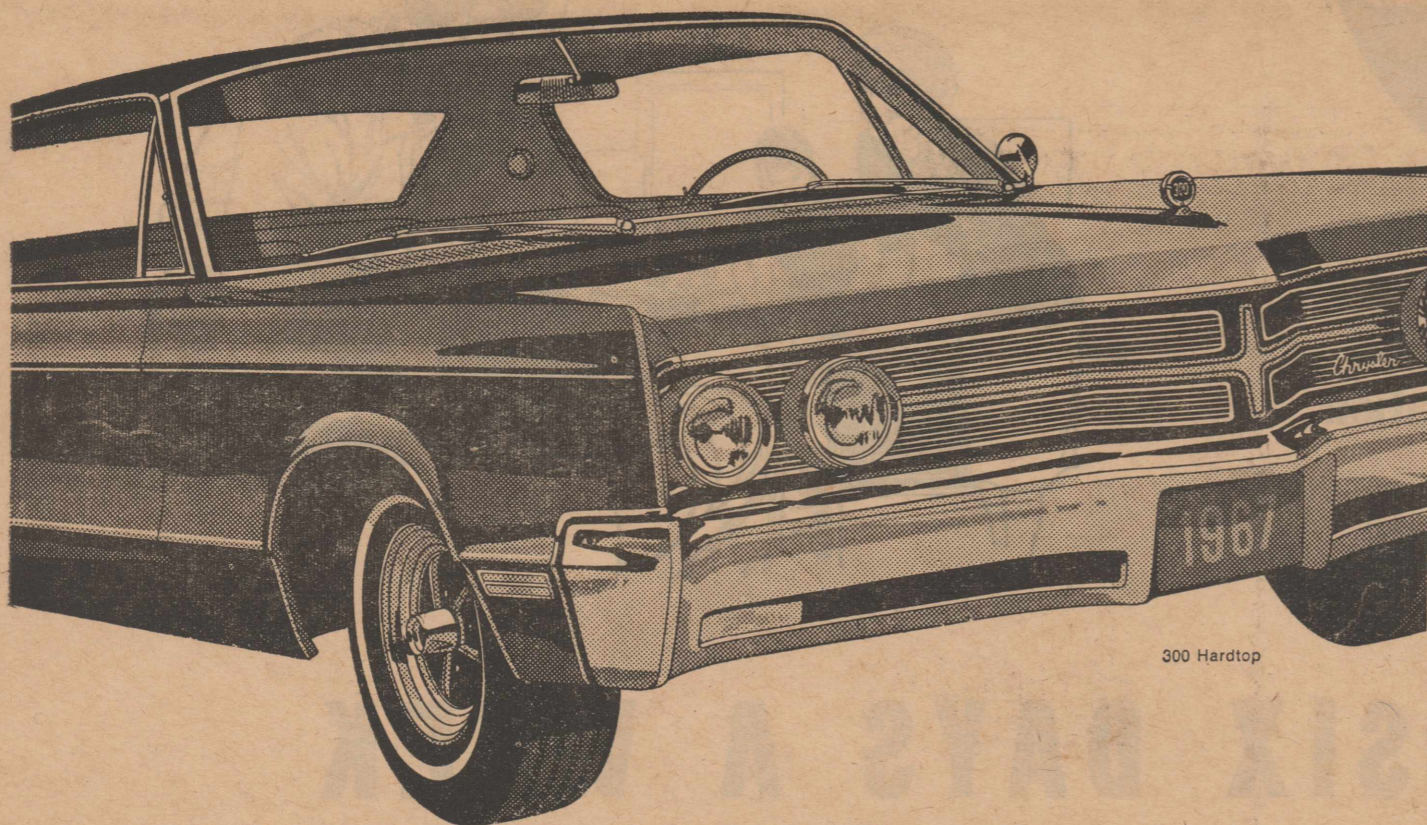

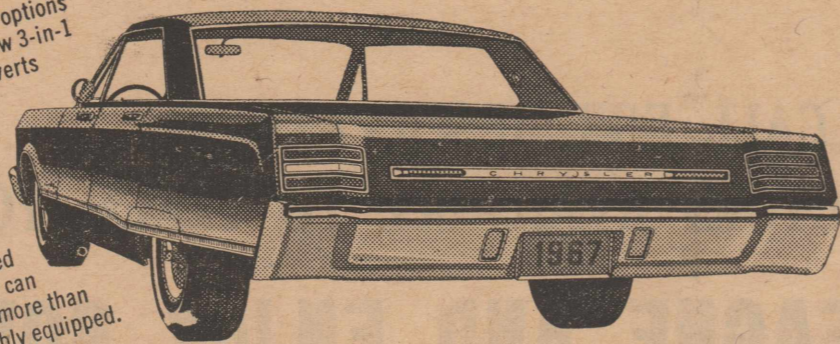
