James Baggett Host Boys Ranch Group For Hunt

Twelve tired but happy boys returned to West Texas Boys Ranch Sunday afternoon with a total of 19 deer and about 250 pounds of pecans, after spending the weekend at the James Baggett ranch south of Ozona.

Baggett, who has supported the ranch financially since its beginning, had long wanted to do something more personal for the boys here. After conceiving the idea, he found everyone he asked willing to help with the project. Representatives from the Sheriff's Department, Highway Patrol, Border Patrol and Texas Rangers furnished firearms and ammunition and acted as guides. Mike Porras volunteered his services as a cook.

The boys arrived at the ranch with two counselors Friday night and after supper bunked in the "hunters' cabin". Officers arrived Saturday morning at 5:00 and drew lots for pastures and boys. The boys drew to pair off and no more than two boys hunted with each guide.

By sundown the boys, ranging in age from 9 to 16 years, had bagged 12 doe and 7 bucks. The meat will be processed and used at Boys Ranch.

Sunday the group of boys thrashed pecan trees and gathered around 250 pounds of pecans, which will also be used in feeding the sixty-odd boys who make their home at West Texas Boys Ranch. The group left Sunday afternoon to return to their Boys Ranch home near Mertzon.

Baggett and everyone who took part in the hunt were delighted with the response from the boys and hope to make it an annual affair.

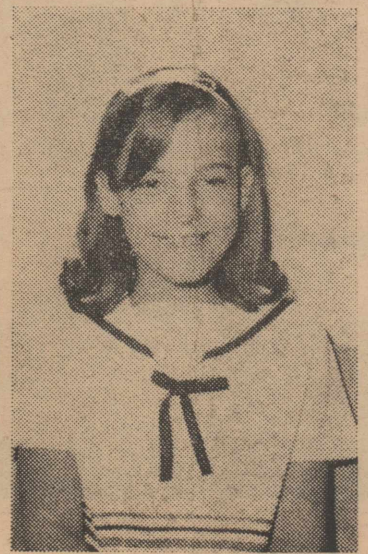

He was crouched behind a sotol clump stalking deer and saw the fox emerge from behind a nearby sotol, creeping toward him. Everett lowered his gun at ready but the animal turned aside and after a few steps leaped at the man's face.

Everett threw up his hands to ward off an attack in his face and the rabid animal sank his teeth into the right thumb. Everett grabbed the fox with his left hand and clamped the frenzied animal between his knees while he pried open its jaws to free his thumb. Unable to let go, Everett held on until he choked the animal to death, finally stabbing it in the heart with his knife to make sure before he let go.

His thumb still swollen and showing teeth marks on both sides, Everett said that neither the injured thumb nor the anti-rabies shots were causing him much discomfort.

Numerous reports of sightings of rabid varmints in the West Texas area have been received in recent days. A 3-year-old boy from Mesquite, whose parents were hunting in the Juno area recently, was bitten by a rabid ringtail, according to information received here, and County Agent Pete Jacoby has sounded a warning to ranchers and hunters to be on guard against any strange acting animal.

Ozona Shamrock Dealer Wins Sale Honors In Dist.

Johnnie Ramirez, local Shamrock dealer, attended a Christmas banquet for area dealers at the Holiday Inn in San Angelo Tuesday night, given by the Bryce Oil Co.

Ramirez won first prize, fifty dollars, for topping the national average in oil sales and out-selling the other 12 area dealers who were represented.

Extension To World Field Is Indicated

A confirmation was indicated in a Crockett County field and location staked for another project.

Second producer and a location southeast extension was indicated in the World, North (Ellenburger) field of Crockett County with the recovery of 7,911 feet of gas and 175 feet of heavily oil-cut drilling fluid on a drillstem test at Standard Oil Co. of Texas, No. 2-35 University in 35-7-University, 13 miles southwest of Big Lake.

Gas surfaced in 32 minutes volume too small to measure, on the 125-minute drillstem test taken between 8,086-8,108 feet. Recovery in the sample chamber was .33 cubic feet of gas, 460 cubic centimeters of oil and gas-cut drilling fluid and 840 cubic centimeters of free 44.8 gravity oil. Gas-oil ratio was 60-1. Flowing pressure was 50-86 pounds; 50-minute initial shut-in pressure was 3,213 pounds; and 120-minute final shut-in pressure, 3,149 pounds.

Offer Employment For Persons With Impaired Vision

Gainful employment to partially sighted and visually impaired persons is currently being offered in this area by the West Texas Lighthouse for the Blind, a non-profit organization established in San Angelo in 1963.

Early this year, the organization took a giant step in the direction of expanding its employment opportunity for the blind by beginning a cotton yarn mill, according to an announcement by James Freeman, director. The machinery was purchased in Galveston and moved to San Angelo.

The plant is presently located at 410 Upton street in San Angelo and an appeal has been sent out for help in locating new workers from this area qualified for work in the Lighthouse.

"By providing gainful employment human dignity can be restored to those who seek it and these people in turn can become useful and productive citizens to themselves and their community," Mr. Freeman wrote.

Recipe of the Week From Kitty's Kitchen

Butterscotch Candy Clusters

1 pkg. (3 oz.) butterscotch pudding mix (not instant)
 1 cup sugar
 1/2 cup evaporated milk
 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
 1 cup pecan halves
 1/2 teas. vanilla

In 2-quart saucepan, blend pudding mix, sugar and milk, cook over medium flame until mixture comes to a boil and add butter. Turn heat to low and boil gently 3 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and stir in pecan halves and vanilla. Beat until mixture becomes slightly dull. Drop from teaspoon onto waxed paper. If candy becomes to thick, add few drops of hot water. Makes about 2 dozen.

Praline Cookies

20 to 24 graham crackers
 2 sticks butter or margarine
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 cup chopped pecans
 Cover a cookie sheet with graham crackers, Bring butter and brown sugar to a boil in saucepan and boil for 2 minutes, add cup of chopped pecans and pour over graham crackers. Place in preheated 350 degree oven for 10 minutes. Cool slightly and

slice into squares.

It was finaled for a 37.82 barrels of 37 gravity oil, plus 4 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,319-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 4,954-962 feet, which had been fractured with 10,000 gallons.

Location is 7,400 feet from the northeast and 660 feet from the northwest lines of 40-31-H&TC.

The 4,950-foot opener, the firm's No. 1-40 J. H. Tippett, also a re-entry operation, and dually completed in the lower Leonard, was finaled June 25 from the Wolfcamp for 80 barrels of 35 gravity oil plus 24.33 per cent water, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,948-5,014 feet.

The Tippett multipay field of Crockett County gained its 10th lower Leonard oil producer with dual completion of Standard Oil Co. of Texas No. 3-38 J. H. Tippett, Wolfcamp oil producer, 14 miles south of McCamey.

It was finaled for 39 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 70 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 890-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,040-85 feet, which had been fractured with 20,000 gallons. Tubing pressure was 100-200 pounds, with packer on casing.

Total depth is 6,273 feet, with 7-inch casing set at 6,235 feet. Location is 440 feet from the northeast and southeast lines of 38-31-H&TC.

Frio-Tex Oil & Gas Co. San Antonio, will drill the No. 8 W. C. Montgomery as a 3/4-mile southeast outpost to the Ozona (Canyon sand) field of Crockett County, 12 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 220 feet from the south and 1,820 feet from the east lines of 1-AAA-TCRR. Contract depth is 7,000 feet; elevation, 2,454 feet.

Child Bitten By Rabid Ringtail In Juno Hunting Camp

San Angelo — A rabid ringtail cat raided hunting camp grounds south of Ozona near Juno and attacked a small child, reports District Chief Bill Sprott of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The family rescued the 3 1/2-year-old boy, whose home is at Mesquite, and destroyed the varmint.

The ringtail's head was sent to the State Health Department where definite proof of rabies was established.

The child, otherwise unhampered, immediately began taking rabies shots.

The incident followed an early warning by the Department cautioning outdoor visitors to suspect fraternizing wild creatures.

Sprott reported in this instance the ringtail, normally a shy, secretive animal slightly larger than a squirrel, leaped from the underbrush and inflicted deep wounds with its teeth on the boy's knee.

The disease of rabies is medically described as an

acute, often fatal, infectious affliction of the central nervous system occurring chiefly among carnivorous animals, particularly the dog and wolf species.

The disease is rarely fatal among humans since curative injections commonly available are effective if taken in time, according to the Department.

Texas has just enough of the tragic incidents such as that near Ozona to prompt public service authorities to maintain a fairly constant alert on behalf of the

mounting outdoor conscious throngs.
