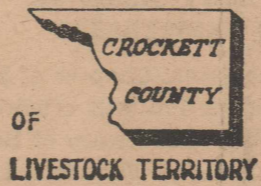

## One Wildcat Two Confirmers Slated In County

A wildcat and two confirmers were scheduled in Crockett County the past week.

Lone Star Producing Co., Dallas, will drill a 2,000-foot Queen sand wildcat in Crockett County, nine miles southeast of Iraan and 1 1/4 miles southwest of the Noelke, Southeast (multipay Queen) field and 2 1/2 miles east of the Millard (Queen) field of Pecos County. It is the No. 1 Lee T. Bivens.

Location is 880 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of 62-1-I&GN. Elevation is 2,770 feet.

Shell, Oil Co. will drill the No. 1-7 Myrtle Mitchell as a 1 1/4 mile south and slightly west outpost to the eight-well JM (Ellenburger gas) field of southwest Crockett County 35 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, exception to Rule No. 37, is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 7-Q6-T&StL. Contract depth is 15,500 feet; derrick floor elevation, 2,300 feet.

Shell will drill the No. 1-111 Mitchell as a 3/4-mile west and the same distance southwest outpost to the Crockett County three-well Ellenburger gas area of the Brown - Baggett multipay field, 39 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location, exception to Rule No. 27, is 770 feet from the south and 3,985 feet from the east lines of 111-1-I&GN. Contract depth is 15,500 feet; estimated derrick floor elevation, 2,350 feet.

## New Multipay Field In County Gets Confirmers

One Crockett County confirmation was assured and another indicated in a newly opened multipay producing area, nine miles southeast of McCamey.

Gulf Oil Corp. No. 2-E J. H. Tippett, recent 5,000-foot detrital opener 1,650 feet southeast of the dual opener of the Tippett, West (McKee and Ellenburger) field and 3/4 mile west of a recent proposed Huaco pay opener in the Tippett multipay field, has assured production in a second zone, possibly Huaco, with the swabbing of 66 barrels of new oil and four barrels of formation water in 11 hours.

Recovery was through perforations at 4,884-90 feet.

Operator loaded the hole with 33 barrels of load oil, acidized with 2,000 gallons and was swabbing and flowing the well to clean.

It was finished March 17 for 234.6 barrels of 42.1 gravity oil per day, with gas-oil ratio of 939-1, through a 13-64-inch choke and detrital perforations at 4,974-86 feet.

It also tested the Ellenburger in open hole at 6,622-33 feet.

## 4-H Clubs Hold Safety Meeting

The Limazona and Tejas 4-H Clubs held a joint meeting Monday night at the Ozona Community Center. The program was presented by the Public Speaking project members in the form of a safety play entitled "Pete's Bad Day". The group was led by Mary Jane Martinez, Junior Leader. The following acted parts: Romelia Vela, Sylvia Flores, Richard Reinberg and Melecio Martinez. Games and refreshments closed the meeting.

The Ozona Lions swept to their 2nd Regional Track title in three years last Saturday in Lubbock, easily outscoring the huge field with 67 points, followed by Spur with 40 points and Sonora, 37 points. The Lions qualified Gary Sutton, Geo. Cox, Derold Maney, Fleet Coates, and Rodney Pagan in

the State Track Meet to be held in Austin on May 5 and 6.

Sutton copped two regional titles with wins in the shot put and discus. Sutton's winning discus throw was 170'9 3/4", a new regional record. His shot was good for 54'5 1/2". Sutton ranks 9th in the state in the discus—but tops in Class A and is the favorite to win at the state meet. Sutton's best in the shot is 57'5" and he could win this event also at the state meet.

Sprinter Cox remained undefeated in the 220 yard dash as he romped across the finish line in 22.6, some 7 yards ahead of the other finalists. As he did at the district track meet, Cox had his best run in the anchor leg of the mile relay. After Maney, Coates, and Pagan had kept the Lions within striking distance, Cox took the baton in 5th position as the anchor men began the last lap of the mile relay. Gradually moving up on the leaders, Cox passed the last man on the backstretch and hit the tape for a thrilling win in the Mile Relay for Coach Chick Womack's Regional Champs. The Lions' winning time was 3:27.4.

Other than Sutton's two wins (20 pts.) Cox's win in the 220 (10 pts.), and the mile relay win (20 pts.), the Lions added 4 points when miler Maggie Galindo ran his best mile of the season (4:50.2) to grab 4th. The Lion sprint relay got a third for 12 points and barely missed qualifying for the state meet. Two faulty hand-offs with the baton hurt the Lion chances as the Eldorado Eagles nosed out Ozona for second place. The Ozona foursome covered the distance in 44.1. Pole vaulter Tony Cullins cleared 11'6 3/4" for a point.

This week Coaches Womack, Grosse Moehler, and Joe Marlett plan to rest the boys and prepare to have them at their peak next weekend. Class A finals in the State Meet will be held on Friday night, May 5th.

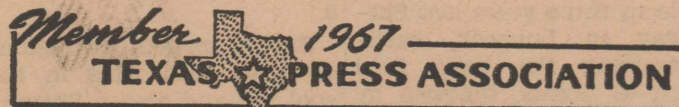

**Postal Savings No Longer Earn**

United States Postal Savings Certificates which are on deposit at post offices will cease earning interest for depositors today.

Over 90 million dollars is still in the program, which was discontinued a year ago today, and no deposits have been accepted since that time. June 30 all money remaining in the fund will be turned over to the Treasury Department until liquidated. The money will be available for payment without time limitation when proper claims are received.

Postmaster Floyd Hokit suggested that Postal Savings depositors close out accounts and invest in U. S. Savings Bonds or the new Freedom Shares which will pay 4 7/8 percent interest on May 1.

Holders of Postal Savings certificates may redeem them at the post office where they were issued. The postmaster in charge will provide all necessary forms and assistance.

**Postal Rate Hike On International Mailing Announced**

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, except for mailings to members of Armed Forces overseas and mail addressed through APO and FPO designations, postmaster Floyd Hokit announced today.

The first increase in international rates since 1961, the Postal Department proposed the rate raise in order to help offset a deficit of around \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office. An increase of 13% is the overall average in the international rate.

Rates for Canada and Mexico correspond to U. S. domestic rates, which are set by Congress, and are not being changed at this time, Hokit added.

Second McKee producer and a location east and slightly south extension to that pay was indicated with the flowing of 70 barrels of 43.2 gravity oil in 35 minutes, plus gas at the daily rate of 600,000 cubic feet daily, at Gulf No. 3-E Tippet, in 36-31-H&TC.

On the one-hour test at 5,825-70 feet, gas surfaced in four minutes, mud in 14 minutes and oil in 17 minutes. It cleaned to pits 25 minutes and then flowed the above gauge. Recovery below the circulating sub was 90 feet of mud. Flowing pressure was 737-1,367 pounds; two-hour final shut-in pressure, 2,463 pounds.

Drilling was scheduled on a 7,000-foot Ellenburger contract.

The field opener, Chambers, & Kennedy, Midland, No. 1 Amacker, was finalized Dec. 22, 1966 for 126.89 barrels of oil through a 14-64-inch choke and McKee perforations at 5,850-864 feet; and for 144.04 barrels of oil through a 12-64-inch choke and Ellenburger open hole at 6,598-939 feet.

The proposed Hueco opener of the Tippet field, Southwestern Natural Gas Inc., Houston, No. 2 Tippet, was finalized April 13 for 240 barrels of 39 gravity oil, plus 10 barrels of load water, through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,880-4,930 feet.

A triple producer, it was finalized as a third 4,950-foot Wolfcamp producer and a 1 1/2-mile northwest extension to the same field, for 168 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,971-982 feet; and as a second 5,000-foot detrital producer and a 3/4-mile east extension to that pay in the Tippet, West field for 192 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,017-030 feet.

Shell Oil Co. No. 1-37 Tippet, in 37-31-H&TC, one location northwest of Southwestern Natural 2 Tippet, recovered 460 feet of very slightly gas-cut mud on a straddle packer drillstem test at 4,870-4,960 feet, identified as lower Leonard. Operator was taking pressures.

Slated to 5,700 feet, it was bottomed at 5,070 feet.

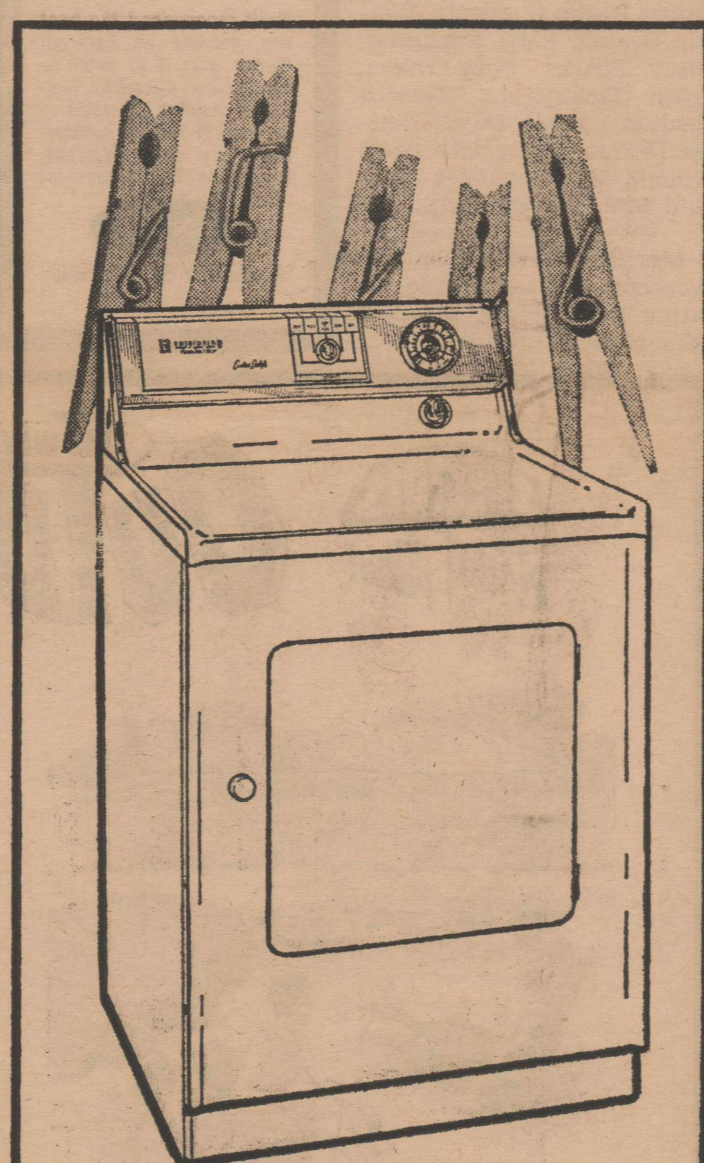

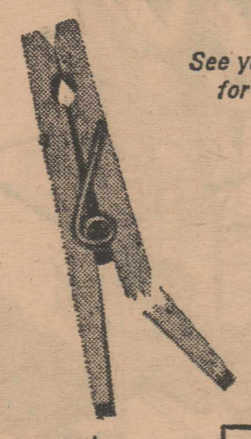
