Juveniles Figure In Burglary, Car Theft Incidents

A Saturday night burglary of a local business firm and theft of an automobile from an Ozona street were quickly solved by the Crockett County Sheriff's department and officers, all juveniles, were arrested and all stolen articles recovered, Sheriff Billy Mill; reported.

The Saturday night break-in was at the South Texas Lumber Co., where a number of pocket knives, hunting knives, electric shavers, electric irons and a small amount of change were taken. Entry was gained by breaking a glass window.

It was so easy Saturday night that the burglars, a pair of local school boys, 10 and 12 years of age, returned Sunday afternoon for a return entry. But to their surprise, Jamie Knox, an employee of the firm, happened to be in the store and had just discovered the broken window. While Knox was staring at the broken window, one of the boys poked his head through and Knox recognized him.

"What are you doing here?" Knox asked the boys, but he and his companion didn't bother to answer — they took to their heels. They were later picked up at school and are awaiting hearing in juvenile court.

Shell Gas Plant Expands Personnel, Adds Compressor

To catch up with its expanding production load, the Shell Oil Co. gas plant two miles north of Ozona is adding the sixth compressor to the plant machinery and a third plant operator to its personnel, Dean Rippeot, plant foreman, said this week.

Transferred here from Denver City to become a part of the plant's operating personnel is Charles Praddy, Mr. Rippeot said. Mr. Praddy will be the third plant operator assigned to the Ozona plant. Others are Jack Tankersley and Raymond Adcock.

Addition of the new compressor will enable the plant machinery to nearly catch up with the present load. The plant presently is operating at 125 percent of capacity, processing 14 million cubic feet of gas daily in the plant designed for 10 million.

The plant extracts hydrocarbon liquids from gas gathered from gas producing areas around Ozona, sending dry gas into pipelines and marketing the liquids, butane, propane, etc. by truck transport.

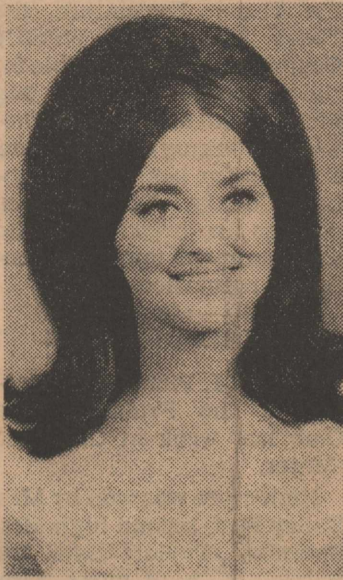
Moore Oil Still On Top In Little League Standing

Funeral Services For Mrs F Friend Here Friday At 3

Funeral services for Mrs. Frank Friend, 86, Crockett County pioneer, will be held tomorrow, Friday, at Johnson's Funeral Chapel in San Angelo at 11:00 a. m. Graveside services and burial will be in Cedar Hill Cemetery here in Ozona Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Friend died at 1:00 a. m. Wednesday in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo after a brief illness.

Mrs. Friend, the former Olivia Byrd, was born at Jewett in Limestone County, Oct. 25, 1880. She attended schools at Ozona, Kerrville, Southwestern University and the Alamo City Commercial College, from which she graduated. She was married to the late Frank Friend here October 19, 1904. Together they operated the Cedar Bluff Ranch in Crockett County, which is now a part of the Friend estate. She and Mr. Friend were charter members of the Ozona Methodist Church.

As a result of her many civic activities, Mrs. Friend was accorded many honors. A long time member of the Ozona Woman's Club, she was a past director and first vice president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. A life member of the Texas Poetry Society, she was a well-known West Texas poet. She was a member of Delta Kappa Gamma and a past matron of the Order of Eastern Stars.

She helped organize one of the first Girl Scout troops in Ozona in 1918, before moving to San Angelo in 1929 where her activities brought her state and national notice.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Floy Hume of San Angelo and Mrs. E. W. Sudderth of Dallas; three grandsons, Ted Hume of Dallas, Dr. J. Friend Sudderth of Washington D.C. and Dr. Michael Earl Sudderth of Dallas and five great grandchildren.

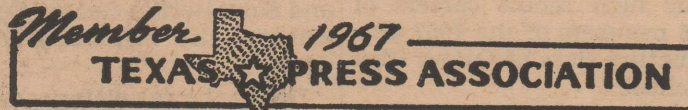

BAN THE BOYCOTT

The building trades unions are making enormous efforts to destroy a man's fundamental freedom to do business with whomever he pleases. They are now asking Congress to pass legislation (HR 100 and S 1487) which would legalize secondary boycotts in the construction industry and enable the unions to force one company to stop doing business with another. This bill will give any union the legal right to completely shut down an entire construction project even though it has a grievance with only one of the many employers on the project. In some cases, disagreements between two unions could bring all work on the job to a stop.

Passage of the secondary boycott bill will give the building trades unions a monopoly over construction labor in most parts of the country. They could demand that certain contractors or subcontractors on projects be kept off the job; or that wages be increased out of all proportion to productivity. And the unions could close down entire construction sites until their demands

were met.

In a recent precedent-setting decision which established the building trades unions' right to boycott prefabricated materials the Supreme Court said: "It may be that the time has come for re-evaluation of the basic content of collective bargaining as contemplated by Federal legislation. Congress might be of the opinion that greater stress should be put on eliminating more and more economic weapons from the unions' grasp but congressional policy has not yet moved to this point." Secondary boycott legislation is a move in the opposite direction.

The building trades in the past year have been able to get wage increases that averaged more than 6 percent (this is more than twice the average income rate of growth). Added strike power would, of course, result in more unreasonable demands. The secondary boycott bill could prove to be the inflationary straw that could break this country's economic back.

Field Parties Near End Of U. S. Geological Survey Work, Mapping 3,000 Square Miles of West Texas

Field parties of the U. S. Geological Survey, who have been based in Sonora and Ozona are bringing to a close the field work in this area, Ferrell Gregg, Project Engineer, announced this week.

These parties have been operating for six months in this area bounded by Sonora, Ozona, Iraan and Sheffield, the area covering approximately 3,000 square miles. The new maps, when published in about two years, will be available to Federal State and local officials and can be used in future planning. It is hoped that the local ranchers will make use of them also for their local needs, Mr. Gregg said.

These maps will become a part of the standard topographic atlas of the United States. Mapping in other states is continuing on the same basis as the State of Texas and it is hoped that the Survey will have the United States and all of its possessions completely mapped in another 7-10 years.

Members of this survey team wish to express their appreciation to the local ranchers for their help in gaining access to lands in order to get the necessary field work accomplished. Included in the crew working from Ozona, Ferrell L. Gregg, Project Engineer, Thomas C. Burger, Project Supervisor, William Chirnside, James G.

Devitt, Charles F. Dickinson, Martin F. Spelich, Doyle E. Yeater, Tom W. Stovall, Charles R. Hughes, Lee Stone, James E. Greer, William N. Runnels, Kenneth S. McLean, Edwin G. Eskel. From Sonora, Kenneth D. Cox, Project Supervisor, Joe Palagyi, and Ralph G. Boshert.

The primary purpose for mapping this area is to facilitate the study and development of water and conservation, the engineer explained. This includes such related subjects as drainage, flood control, potential stream yield, irrigation and surface water studies. Topographic maps serve as a basis for the study and solution of many problems relating to activities affected by the character and relief of the earth's surface. Therefore, these maps will also be used in the future as an aid in planning and developing our military requirements, road systems, industrial expansion, recreation facilities, and engineering construction of all types.

The most modern engineering methods are employed in the preparation of these maps. The use of aerial photographs and precise photogrammetric instruments has greatly facilitated the work. However, considerable field work is still required in order to produce an accurate map, Mr. Gregg pointed out.

The field work consists of establishing accurate geographic positions on numerous pre-selected points. This assures the map maker that all features shown on the map will be shown in the correct position. A dense pattern of elevations above sea level is also established, from which the shape and slope of the land is drawn.

The field parties also check and determine which of the infinite number of features should be shown on the map. These will include features such as houses, barns, roads, fences, power lines, pipe lines, wells, windmills etc.

Thousands of topographic maps have been published by the Geological Survey, and millions are distributed annually. Available without cost are state index maps showing which areas have been mapped, and brochures describing topographic maps and the functions of the Geological Survey. Most of the published topographic maps are sold for 40 cents each and may be ordered from the Geological Survey, Topographic Division, Federal Center Bldg. 25, Denver, Colorado, 80225.

TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

Mittens Warmer — In cold weather wear a finger glove on your trigger hand and a mitten on the other. Mitten allows fingers to touch and normally warm each other.

Handy "Ammo"—If you're right-handed, which most of us are, sew a couple of loops on the back of your left-hand glove for carrying two spare shotgun sheeys. This will permit fast reloading. It eliminates trouble getting another shell out of your pocket while wearing gloves in cold weather.

Of course, if you shoot from the left shoulder, sew the loops on the right-hand glove.

Removing Burrs — If you have a long-haired hunting dog and hunt in burr country, rub the dog's ears and tail with petroleum jelly. It makes combing burrs out very easy.

Foil Foils Soot — Eliminate cooking pots blackening from campfires by wrapping the outside of the pot with aluminum foil. The foil will transfer heat, but not the soot.

Tires for Targets — An old tire makes a good archery target. Stuff rags or straw between pieces of cardboard fitted between the tire openings. Prop up the tire with a stick in the back, or if you want a moving target, let it roll down a slope.

Frees Frozen Ferrules — Here's an easy way to free stuck rod ferrules.

Heat the ferrules, then put on a few drops of penetrating rust solvent. Heat will create a vacuum that will cause the solvent to work its way between the frozen parts.

Then the ferrules can be pulled apart.

Beeswax Cleans Lead — If you cast your own bullets, be sure the lead is free of impurities.

You can be sure the lead is clean by putting a small piece of beeswax in with the metal. Melted wax will float the foreign matter to the surface of the pot.

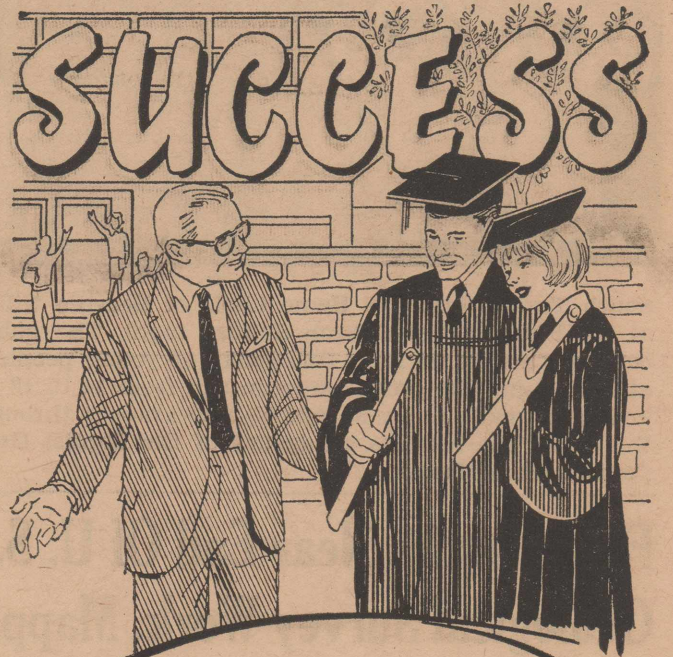

An unidentified discovery was indicated in Crockett County with the flowing of 80 barrels of new oil, along with 22.1 barrels of formation water, in 24 hours at Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-O W. Parker, Jr., et al, in 80-1-I&GN, re-entered opener and lone producer in the Meek (Strawn) field, 3½ miles northwest of Iraan. Flow was through a 13-64-inch choke, which was plugging, and perforations at 6,388-82 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons. Tubing pressure was 500-400 pounds; gas-oil ratio 75-1. Plugged-back depth is 6,730 feet. Originally drilled to 8,206 feet and plugged back to 7,205 feet, it was finished July 12, 1966, for 193 barrels of oil through a 16-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,816-830 feet.

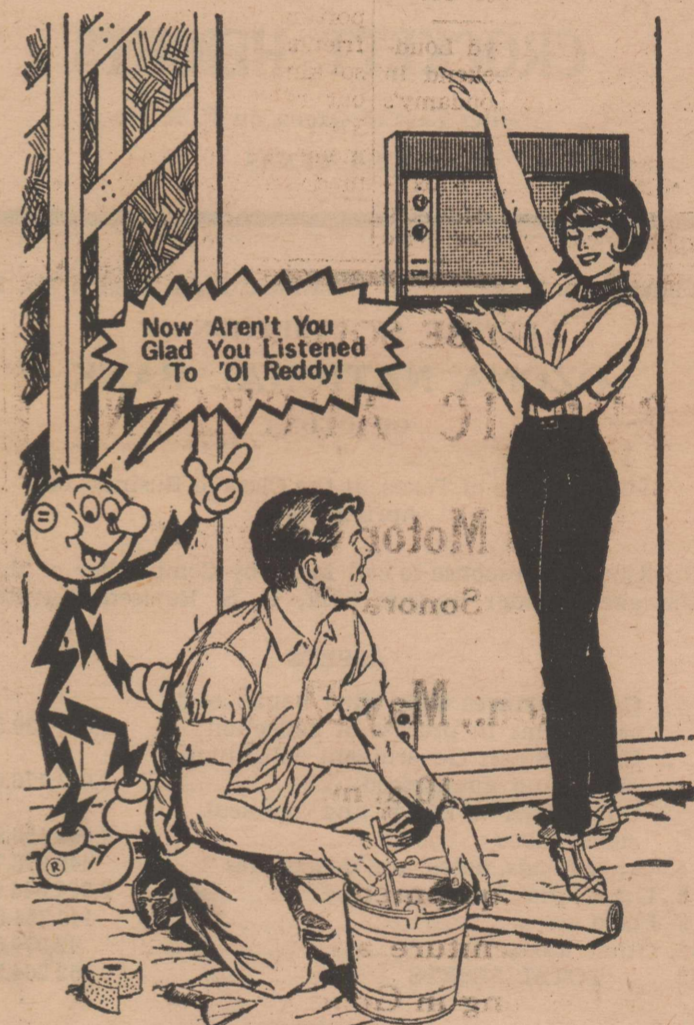

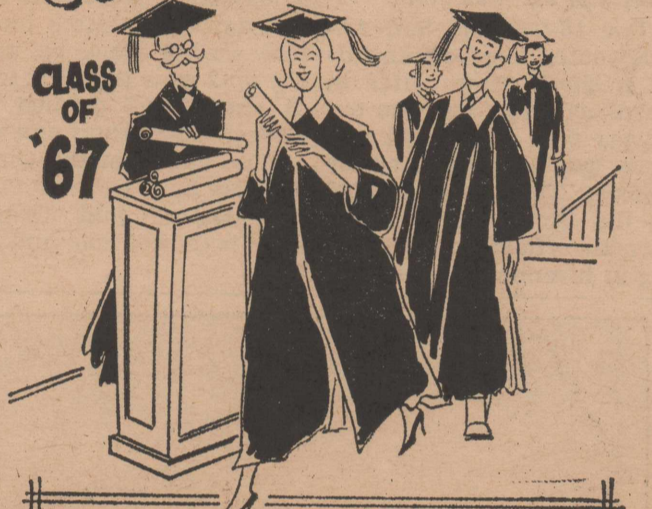

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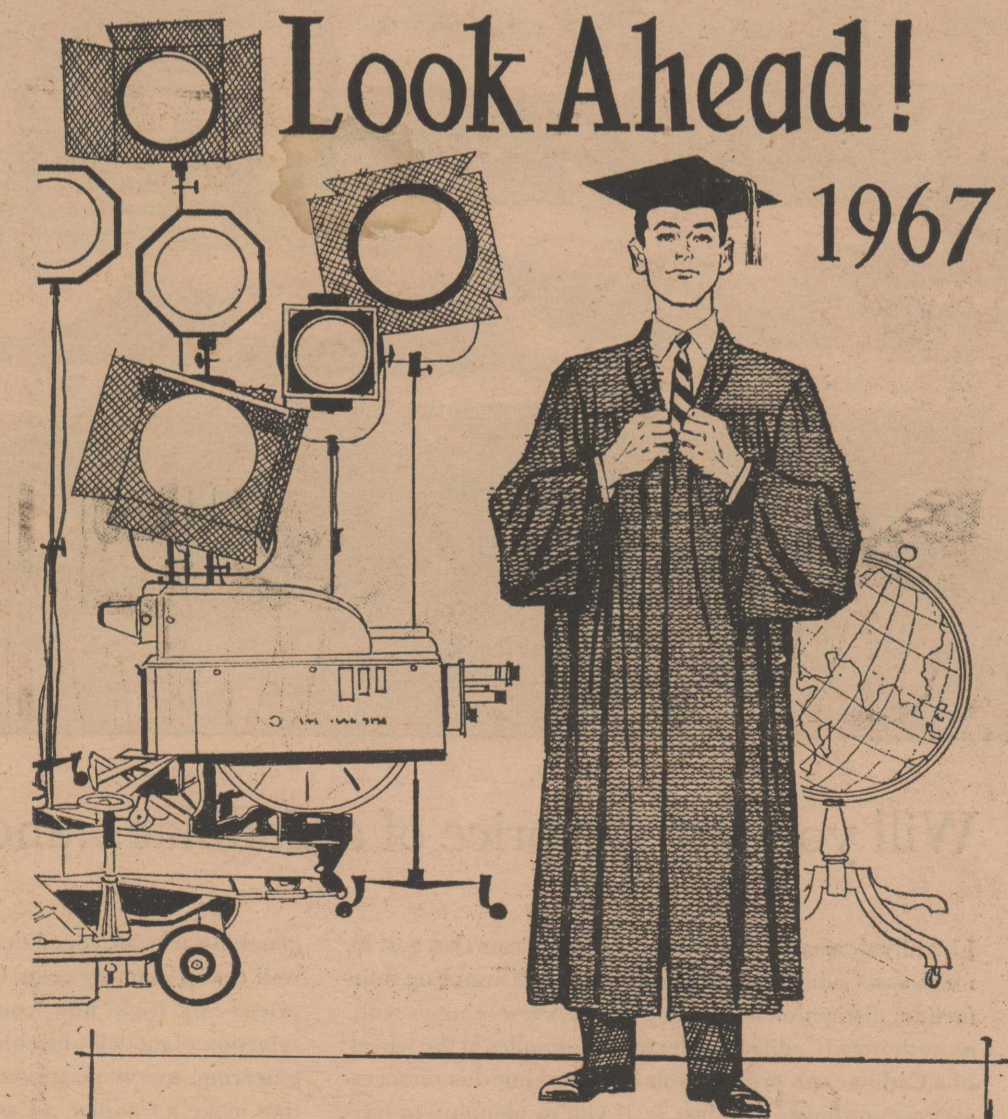
