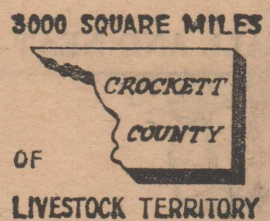

CC Invitational Golf Tournament Set For June 3-4

The Ozona Country Club announces its annual Invitational Golf Tournament to be held June 3rd and 4th, 1967.

Strike Assured In Tippett Field

Third 5,000-foot detrital producer has been assured in the Tippett, West multipay field of Crockett County with the flowing of 341 barrels of new oil and 18 barrels of load water in 19 hours at Gulf Oil Corp. No. 3-E J. H. Tippett, in 36-31-H&TC, previously assured third Ellenburger producer, one location north of the detrital opener and 8 3/4 miles southeast of McCamey.

Flow was through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 4,982-96 feet, with tubing pressure of 975 pounds.

Tested 21 hours through a 12-64-inch choke and Ellenburger open hole at 6,584-620 feet, it flowed 97 barrels of new oil and one barrel of unidentified water, with tubing pressure of 125 pounds.

Operator swabbed 15 barrels of load oil through McKee perforations at 5,842-44 feet and then swabbed dry. Reacidized with 1,000 gallons it kicked off after three runs of the swab and flowed to tanks three hours, no gauges. Testing continued.

Crockett Field Gas To Market In New Pipeline

El Paso Natural Gas Co. will start work immediately on a \$2.0 million pipeline to the company's treating plant in Terrell County, which will take gas from the JM (Ellenburger gas) field of Crockett County, 34 miles southwest of Ozona, it was announced in press releases from El Paso this week.

The line will be able to handle 40 million cubic feet daily, a take authorized earlier by the Federal Power Commission.

Plans call for nearly 10 miles of gathering facilities and 15 miles of field lines. A certificate to increase the line's capacity to 150 million cubic feet is now pending.

JM field, principally on the John Mitchell and Tom Mitchell ranch in Southwest Crockett County, has proven gas reserves estimated at around 860 billion cubic feet. Shell Oil Co. field operator, has committed reserves underlying 55,000 acres in the Val Verde Basin to El Paso.

Under the agreement, El Paso has rights to reserve up to 3 trillion cubic feet, with an option for all gas supplies over that amount.

Construction is due to be completed in the next few months.

Report of County Water Resources Study Completed

First copies of the written report on "The Occurrence and Quality of Ground Water in Crockett County," result of a project completed by the Texas Water Development Board in cooperation with the Crockett County Commissioners Court, were handed to County Judge Bernice Jones and the Commissioners Court at an informal meeting at the courthouse Tuesday afternoon.

The report, in bound book form, was delivered by Fred Osborn of the state Water Board. The copies were delivered for study preparatory to the calling of a public meeting, tentatively set for July 11, at which time the report will be presented and the findings explained by a member of the board, and the public will be urged to ask any questions about the report or make any comment on it.

Press release date on the contents of the report has been set for June 1, when a formal press release will be circulated by the State Water Development Board to news media over the state.

The report, prepared by Hilary H. Iglehart, who made his home in Ozona during the period of his studies, is the culmination of a project begun in 1962 at a public meeting of members of the Commissioners Court, representatives of the Water Development Board and interested citizens.

Spot Extension To Henderson Gas Producing Area

Adobe Oil Co., Midland, will drill the No. 1 Henderson as a one-mile northeast outpost to the two-well Susita (1,400-foot Grayburg gas) field of Crockett County, 15 miles northwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the most westerly west and westerly north lines of 52-UV-GC&SF. Contract depth is 1,700 feet with cable tools; elevation, 2,622 feet.

Third Ellenburger producer and a location east and the same distance southeast extension to that pay was assured in the Tippett, West multipay field of Crockett County with the flowing of 81 barrels of new oil, along with two barrels of water, in 18 hours at Gulf Oil Corp. No. 3-E J. H. Tippett, in 36-31-University, 8 3/4 miles southeast of McCamey.

Flow was through a 12-64-inch choke and open hole at 6,584-620 feet, with tubing pressure of 125 pounds.

Swabbed 18 hours through McKee perforations at 5,842-44 feet, recovery was seven barrels of water and 1.5 barrels of new oil. Operator acidized with 500 gallons and shut the project in.

Swabbed 11 hours to pits through detrital perforations at 4,982-96 feet, recovery was 75 barrels of water, no oil. Operator acidized with 1,000 gallons and shut the project in.

14-Year-Old Boy Cyclist Injured In Car Collision

Curtis Weant, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Weant, narrowly escaped serious injury Thursday evening around 6:30 when an automobile collided with the motorcycle he was riding in downtown Ozona.

The car, a 1966 Plymouth, driven by Ronald Green of Yoakum and traveling west on Hwy. 290, was in the process of making a left turn into Ave. D when it hit the cycle as it was traveling west on the highway. Green, who was accompanied by his wife, said he saw the boy but thought he had plenty of time to turn.

Investigating officer Orvil Perry said the boy apparently jumped or fell from the motorcycle before the collision, only suffering superficial cuts and bruises. He was taken to the hospital in a James ambulance and released after x-ray pictures showed no broken bones.

Perry estimated that each vehicle suffered an estimated \$100 damage.

Damage Heavy In Residence Fire

Fire, caused by a faulty hot water heater, heavily damaged a house belonging to Mrs. Gus Parker and occupied by Mrs. Cora Lilly at the corner of Ave. J and Beall St. early Friday morning.

Mrs. Lilly was not at home when the blaze started and the heater had burned through the floor before firemen arrived on the scene. Smoke, in the closed house, had severely damaged the contents before the alarm was turned in.

Autopsy Is Ordered To Determine Cause Of Aged Man's Death

An autopsy was being performed in San Antonio on order of Crockett county Sheriff Billy Mills on the body of Tomas Mar, about

88, who died in Crockett county hospital Monday night from unknown causes.

County officials had initiated a move to commit Mar to the state hospital at Big Spring as senile demented following an incident at his home in which a small girl was involved.

The child was examined after the incident by a local physician who reported she was not injured in any way.

Bruises about the old man's face prompted officers to investigate and the child's father admitted to having "slapped" him when he entered Mar's home and found the child crying. Examining physicians declared the injuries superficial, Sheriff Mills said, but the man was left in the hospital pending his transportation to Big Spring because no suitable facilities were available in the jail.

Following his death, an autopsy was ordered to determine the cause of death. Justice of the Peace A. O. Fields is withholding an inquest verdict pending receipt of the pathologist's report, which was expected Friday.

Graveside services for Mar were held Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock in Lima Cemetery, under the direction of James Funeral Home, with Rev. Henry Medina officiating.

- 1 large can sauerkraut

- pickling spice

Boil sugar, vinegar and pickling spice until sugar is dissolved, then cool. Mix the remainder of ingredients together. Pour sugar mixture over vegetables (be sure it is cool). Refrigerate 24 hours before serving. Keeps indefinitely. Delicious with meats or beans.

I'll wager that no one believes that the boys down at the pool hall are engaged in the pursuit of open-air, outdoor entertainment. If they're playing pool or any other variation of billiards, that's just what they're doing. Billiards was originally an outdoor lawn game which was played much like today's croquet, but when the weather became inclement, the game was ruined so they moved the game indoors. Here the limitations of space were found to be prohibitive. As a result, the game was reduced in size, scaling it down to where it could be played on a table. Over the years, the game dropped the wickets and mallets of croquet, becoming the fine, precision-skilled pastime it is today.

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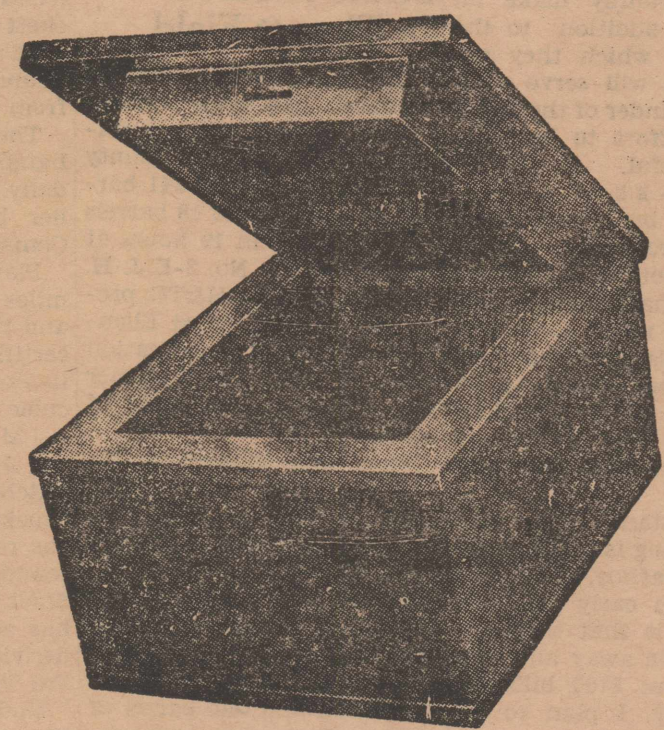

Washington News Letter

Congressman O. C. Fisher

The Great Welfare Society got a bit of a scare last week when the House turned back a move to spend another \$40 million on a rent subsidy program which was arm-twisted through the House last year. This is the early stages of the project, which would be expected eventually to cost more than a billion dollars.

This novel hand-out to a select group of tenants calls for Uncle Sam to pay part of rent bills each month. The favored tenant would be required to pay no more than 25% of his monthly income on rent, with the U. S. government paying the balance.

Another prime purpose of the program, according to HUD Secretary Robert Weaver, would be to enable more Negroes to be placed in more prosperous neighborhoods — designed to promote integration.

What happens to this grandiose scheme in the future remains to be seen. The Senate will have to act on it. Right now the outlook for advancement of this project at this session appears to be dim.

There's a Move on in Congress to make it a federal offense to cross state lines for the purpose of engaging in a riot. Last year the House approved such a provision in the civil rights bill, but the measure died in the Senate. A separate bill on the subject is now pending. With threats by the Carmichaels, the Kings, and other agitators being publicized, the Congress may be induced to take some action on this badly needed legislation.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Final minutes are ticking away in the biennial legislative game of "beat the clock."

Ozviously, the wind-up of the 60th session will be a cliff-hanger.

As lawmakers move toward the May 29 finish line, the major jobs they came to Austin to accomplish remain unfinished.

The Budget — it went to conference committee, following an unsuccessful attempt by Gov. John Connally and Speaker Ben Barnes to sell the Senate on accepting the House appropriations bill without the traditional conference to adjust differences. House Bill calls for \$449,300,000 in general revenue; Senate Bill, \$437,700,000.

Redistricting — A senate Congressional Redistricting Bill would save all incumbent congressmen the agony of having to run against a colleague. But the House Judicial Districts Committee has drawn different lines.

School Teacher Pay—Both houses agree there must be a raise. Major problem is to determine the amount.

Drivers Licensing Change Due — Major changes in Texas drivers license laws have been approved by both houses.

Bill increases minimum age for license from 15 to 16 for those who complete approved driver training

courses and to 18 for those without such training. Hardship licenses are permitted for 15-year-olds where there is a licensed adult driver in the front seat. Motor scooter and motorcycle operators must be at least 15, and for commercial licenses, 17.

Present license will be replaced by a plastic card with a color photograph of the driver. New ones will be good for four instead of two years and will cost \$6 instead of \$3. Drivers may be required to take a new competency examination when they apply for a new license. However, re-examination is not compulsory, as proposed in the original bill.

Horse Racing — Voters will be given an opportunity to express their opinion on whether Texas should legalize horse-race betting, if the House agrees with the Senate to put the question on the ballot in the Democratic and Republican primaries next May.
