Two Girls Are Seriously Hurt In Auto Mishap

Two teenage girls were seriously injured Sunday afternoon in a one-vehicle accident 18.3 miles northwest of Ozona on the Big Lake highway. The accident occurred when a 1966 Chevrolet pick-up driven by Kathy Williams failed to negotiate a curve, went out of control and overturned at least two and a half times.

Vicki Walker, a passenger in the pick-up, was thrown out of the vehicle and Miss Williams managed to free herself after it came to rest.

T. J. Bailey and Arthur Klye, both of Ozona, came upon the mishap around 6:00 p. m. as they were returning from a golf tournament in Iraan. Miss Walker, bleeding profusely, was standing in the center of the highway in an effort to get help. Miss Williams was unable to move but the two men removed the top of a golf cart they were towing and lifted her onto the make-shift stretcher and into the car with the help of a passer-by.

Upon arrival at the Crockett County Hospital, Miss Williams was taken by James ambulance to San Angelo where she underwent surgery on both legs Sunday night. She suffered a compound dislocation of the right knee and severe injury to the left knee. She was removed from the intensive care ward at Shannon Hospital yesterday and is reported in satisfactory condition at the present time. Miss Williams is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Byron Williams.

Miss Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred V. Walker, is in satisfactory condition in the hospital here. She suffered a broken collarbone, a severely lacerated foot and multiple lacerations and bruises. Both girls are Ozona High School sophomores.

Investigating officers Orville Perry and Dale Copeland estimated the accident occurred around 5:30 p. m. The pick-up was a total loss.

No More Dances May Be Held On School Property

Hereafter there will be no dances, public or private, permitted to be held on school property, members of the board of trustees ruled in a resolution adopted unanimously at the board's regular meeting the past week.

Dances have been permitted heretofore, an outgrowth of local conditions where no place was available in many instances. But with the civic center available for public use, the board felt that further use of school property for such functions was no longer a necessity and imposed undue maintenance problems for the system. The new rule becomes effective Oct. 15.

Historical Soc. Members Drive Benefit Museum

Crockett County Museum membership committee kicked off the first concentrated drive for membership in the Historical Society Monday afternoon.

Since the museum is maintained through annual dues to the Historical Society, the committee agreed to contact every resident of the county in order to give them an opportunity to become a member and help keep the museum open. Dues are \$2.50 per year and membership in the society does not mean a member is obligated to attend meetings and participate actively unless he wishes to do so.

The committee will make an effort to enroll as many members as possible and old members will be contacted for current dues.

After looking at the registry, the group discovered that over 1,000 people had visited the museum since January. Every state in the Union was represented, plus many foreign countries.

Members of the committee feel that the museum is an important part of the community and that county residents owe it to the pioneers of the county, as well as future generations to see that the institution is maintained. They also discussed the fact that many people labor under the misconception that cash memorials to the museum are used in its maintenance.

The Lions broke into the win column last Friday night at Lion Stadium when they whitewashed the Menard Yellowjackets 47-0. The purple and gold combined a versatile offense with their usual tough game for their first district victory.

Paced by the running of Rodney Pagan, Beto Diaz, and Fleet Coates, the Lions rushed for 318 yards while quarterback Randel Clepper connected on 3 of 7 passes for 93 yards and 1 TD. Tackle Wesley West broke into the scoring column by recovering a blocked kick for a touchdown. West recovered another Menard fumble which led to another Lion score.

Pagan swiveled-hipped his way for three Ozona TD's, one coming on a punt return of 5 yards, another on a 10 yard sprint around end, and the third on a pass and run from Clepper, good for 57 yards. Diaz dodged and spun for scores on runs of 18 and 31 yards. Coates got his score on a 4 yard blast at the center of the line. Larry Webb hit on 5 of 7 extra points attempts.

A prize of \$25.00 will be given for the most man miles traveled to attend the convention. All racing teams must be registered by 12 noon.

Members of the association will be entertained with a barbecue supper at 6 p. m. at Memorial Park following the races.

The convention ball will be held at the Ozona Country Club at 8:00 p. m. with Lloyd Mitchell and the Rock-springs Playboys furnishing the music. The public is invited to attend the dance and tickets may be purchased from local firemen or at the door.

The Lions will be in enemy territory Friday night when they engage the Junction Eagles in combat in what will be a survival game for both ball clubs, especially for the Lions. Game time in Junction is 8 p. m.

In district play, two league defeats is almost certain elimination from championship contention. Junction has already dropped two district contests, one to Sonora last Friday night 13-0, and they were upset victims of Iraan the week before. But the Lions are still in the race having lost only to Sonora 13-7. If the Lions can take the rest of their district games, they could tie for the championship, possibly with Iraan, but the Braves have an improving ball club, one that knocked off Junction 27-13, and they could take the Broncos.

Last Friday night Ozona blasted a game Menard eleven and the Lion offense has improved with each game. The already tough defense should permit the offense several opportunities with the ball.

Sparking the Lion offense last week were halfback Rodney Pagan, Beto Diaz and Fleet Coates behind QB Randel Clepper. Clepper moved into the QB spot when David Huff twisted a knee in the hard Sonora battle.

The probable starting lineup for the Lions has Larry Kilgore and Donald Huff, end; Wesley West and Gary Sutton, tackles; Tom Davidson and John DeHoyos, guards; Marlin Farris, center; Clepper or David Huff, QB; and Pagan, Diaz and Coates.

Huge Fracturing Job On Crockett Well By Dowell Develops 20,000 Horsepower, 4,900 Lbs. Pressure

Twenty-nine pumping units were utilized simultaneously in a fracturing treatment performed on a new gas well near Ozona by Dowell Division of The Dow Chemical Company.

Believed to be the largest number of pumping units ever assembled for a single treatment the units produced nearly 20,000 horsepower when operating at full power.

Dowell utilized two high-rate manifold trailers with 4-inch high pressure discharge lines to effect single hookup of the 29 units.

"Use of the railers enabled us to hook the units together, fracture the well and move off the well-site in a minimum of time," said Dowell District Sales Engineer P. L. Crenshaw.

The new well has a perfor-

ated interval from 6300 to 6900 feet in the Ozona Canyon Trend. This stimulation treatment was performed immediately after completion. The J. W. Henderson ranch southwest of Ozona was the site of the record operation.

Before fracturing, Dowell treated the well with 5000 gallons of Mud Acid. Ball sealers were used as diverting agents.

The fracturing treatment utilized 350,000 gallons of a specialty prepared acid and salt water mixture which included 350,000 pounds of sand. Materials were injected at 166 barrels per minute at a pressure of 4900 psi. The high horsepower was required because of the well's pressure and the rate of injection, Crenshaw said.

Wolfcamp Strike In Tippet; Spot McMullan Wildcat

The Tippet multipay field of Crockett County gained its fifth 4,950-foot Wolfcamp producer and a 3/4-mile east extension to that pay with dual completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 10-G J. H. Tippet, lower Leonard oil producer, 11 miles southeast of McCamey.

It was completed to flow 58.04 barrels of 41.8 gravity oil per day, plus 20 barrels of water with gas-oil ratio of 4.135-1 through a 12-64-inch choke and perforations at 5,068-70 feet which had been acidized with 5,500 gals.

Completion from the lower Leonard was Feb. 2, 1966 for 97 barrels of 39.2 gravity oil through perforations at 4,698-700 feet and also from the Wolfcamp for 39 barrels of oil through perforations at 5,926-27 feet. The Wolfcamp zone is now abandoned.

Location is 7,175 feet from the northeast and 467 feet from the northwest lines of 42-31-H&TC.

Texaco Inc., Midland, will drill the No. 1-B A. H. McMullan as a 2 1/4-mile northeast outpost to dual Strawn and lower Canyon gas production in the DePaul multipay field of Crockett County, 10 miles southeast of Ozona.

Location is 900 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the west lines of 1-P-TCRR. Contract depth is 9,300 feet. The field has two Strawn and 11 Canyon wells.

The Rodman Corp., Odessa No. 1 Ada Pierce, Crockett County unidentified dry gas discovery, 28 miles southwest of Ozona and 2u miles southeast of the Ozona (Canyon) gas field, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2.6 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 2,090-132 feet and 2,479-533 feet possibly Clearfork, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 60,000 pounds of sand.

Slated as an outpost to the Ozona (Canyon) field, it was drilled to 7,600 feet and plugged back to 2,690 feet. Casing (4 1/2-inch) was set at 2,723 feet.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 44-A-TCRR.

The Rodman Corp. No. 1 Victor Pierce, in Mrs. A. M. Wilkerson No. 4, Crockett County unidentified Permian oil discovery, 3 3/4 miles north and slightly west of the No. 1 Ada Pierce and surrounded by production in the Ozona (Canyon) field, was continuing to pump 12 to 14 barrels of oil daily, through

perforations at 2,245-2,382 feet.

Scheduled as a 7,000-foot Canyon test, it was drilled to 6,750 feet.

The Rodman Corp., was waiting on cement after setting 4 1/2-inch casing at 6,309 feet, on total depth of 7,200 feet, at the No. 1-47 Harvick, in 47-A-TCRR, Crockett County wildcat, 30 miles southwest of Ozona and three miles south of the firm's No. 1 Ada Pierce.

Operator ran logs. No shows were encountered in shallow zones.

Dalton H. Cobb, Midland, will drill an 8,000-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 12 miles southwest of Rankin, 1 1/2 miles southwest of the Crockett (Grayburg-San Andres) field and seven miles east and slightly north of the Tippet multipay field. It is the No. 1 University.

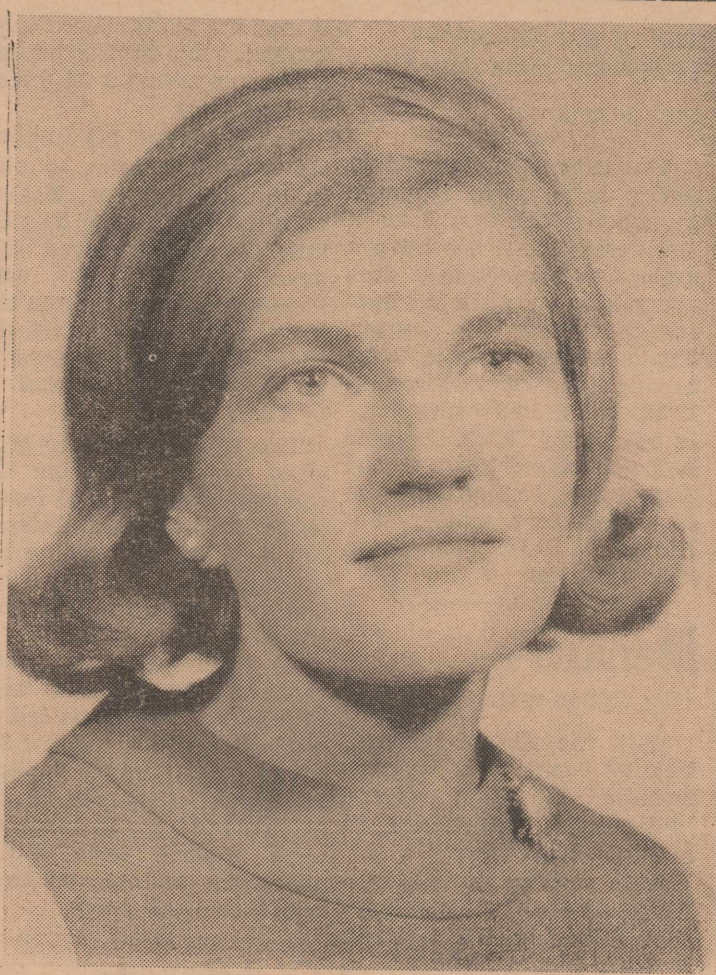
Location is 660 feet from the south and 2,205 feet from the west lines of 3-14-University.

Standard Oil Co. of Texas will drill the No. 5-38 J. H. Tippet as a 1,500-foot east and very slightly north stepout to 4,950-foot Wolfcamp production in the Tippet multipay field and the same stepout to 5,000-foot detrital production in the Tippet, West multipay field of Crockett County, 14 miles south of McCamey.

Location is 467 feet from the northwest and southwest lines of the northwest quarter of 38-31-H&TC.

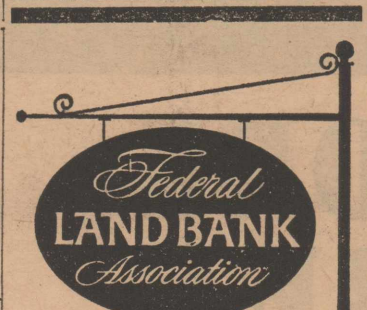
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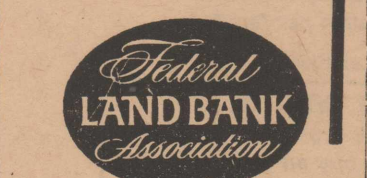

With the Ozona defense holding Menard to 0 yards rushing, the Lion offense had ample opportunity to get into high gear.

After failing to make a first down on their possession following the opening kickoff, Menard punted to the Ozona 35 where Pagan fielded the ball started to his right, cut back sharply to the left sidelines, picked up blocks near the 50, and sped into the end zone behind the wall formed by Lion downfield blockers.

Four minutes later Ozona went 69 yards for its second score. Included in the drive were a 20 yard pass from Clepper to Pagan and a 16 yard pass to Larry Kilgore. Diaz got the score on a reverse from 31 yards out.

With nearly 4 minutes still remaining in the initial quarter, West broke through to block the Yellowjacket punt and followed it into the end zone, recovering for the third Ozona TD, giving the Lions a 20 point lead at the end of the first quarter.

Early in the second quarter, West fell on a Menard miscue at the Yellowjacket 4 and on the first Lion play Coates drove in for the score. Diaz added the fourth Ozona TD on a twisting 18 yard run through the Menard secondary. The Lions had taken possession of the ball at the Menard 45 following a short punt.

Substituting liberally on the offensive and defensive

teams, the Lions slowed their scoring pace in the second half after taking a 34-0 lead at halftime.

Ozona scored TD number six with 7 minutes to play in the third stanza. Taking over the ball at the 50 yard line, the Lions moved into paydirt in six plays, with Pagan darting over from the 10 yard line. Included in the 50 yard drive were runs of 21 yards by Coates and 13 by Diaz.

The final tally came on a short swing pass from QB Clepper to Pagan who fooled three Yellowpacket defenders by quickly changing his direction back to the short side of the field and sprinting 57 yards to paydirt.

As the 47-0 score would indicate, the statistics were all Ozona. The Lions led in first downs 20-4, rushing 318 yards to 0, passing yardage 93-20, and penalties 10 for 90 yards to 3 for 25 yards. Ozona punted once for 40 yards (by Coates) and Menard 7 for 18.5 yards.
