A wide variety of subjects was covered at the regular monthly meeting of the Businessmen's Activities Committee on Tuesday morning, ranging from the past Halloween parade, carnival and other events to the upcoming Showboat Jubilee and Christmas Parade.

Traffic Study In School Zone, At Crossroads

Due to a lengthy discussion of traffic and parking problems in Muleshoe, the Muleshoe City Council held a longer than usual meeting Tuesday morning.

Highlighting the discussion was a problem with traffic in the school zones, especially on West American Blvd. A major problem was considered and remedies sought for the West American Blvd. and West Fourth Street crossing near Piggly Wiggly. Motorists were reminded following the meeting that the city police department radar unit will be used extensively in the future to slow traffic in the school zones.

Council members also discussed the problem of congested traffic around the crossroads intersection and considered prohibiting parking on the east side of Highway 214, south of the crossroads intersection.

In other action, the city council approved payment for landscaping at the city hall; authorized payment of \$297.50 for soil tests on the new library site and considered a request for a loading zone at Gunn Brothers Stamp Store at 222 East Avenue B.

A new planning commission was named, but as all new members had not been contacted for confirmation, no names were released.

In a meeting on October 30, councilmen passed an ordinance approving Pioneer Natural Gas Company's gas rate increase request.

The next regular meeting will be held Tuesday, November 17 at 8 a.m.

Chairman R.A. Bradley reported that because of a request by school officials, the annual Christmas Parade has been rescheduled for Friday, December 4 at 4 p.m.

Much discussion followed his announcement, with a decision being made to leave it to the individual store operator as to whether or not he will want to stay open somewhat later during the hours immediately following the parade.

Bradley said the bands from both high school and junior high will march and out of town schools are being contracted and invited to participate in the parade.

Dick Johnson, Muleshoe Jaycee, and chairman of the annual Sandhill Crane Hunt, reported on the outstanding year for the annual hunt. He said 154 hunters took part in the hunt the first day, and commented that spot checks of several local business firms indicated an upswing for their proceeds during the time the hunters converged on this area.

He invited Joe Carroll, operator of the Dinner Bell Restaurant, to add to the financial report and Carroll said he and Mrs. Carroll had prepared and sold more than \$100 in breakfasts before the rest of their work crew had arrived to begin their day's work.

A report was also given on the three different television crews who were in town over the weekend. They were representatives from Amarillo, Lubbock and WBAP in Fort Worth for National NBC and ABC. The films taken by the Fort Worth television crew are expected to be used in a nationally televised sports program. The TV cameramen used 3,000 feet of film in the area, as they also took films of the feed lot operations, water, resources, agriculture pictures and general pictures of the area.

Mules-Lobos Set For District Battle

Muleshoe's Mules, who easily rode over the Tullia Hornets by a score of 40-14 during last Friday night's game, may find a bit of rough sledding this Friday night when they meet high-ranked Levelland.

Levelland took advantage of two crucial Perryton Ranger fumbles during their game last Friday, to eke out a 22-20 victory over the Panhandle team.

The Levelland Lobos came into the 1-AAA district this year, almost unknown and virtually unranked, but since the beginning of the season have held their own and now are ranked second by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for all seven games thus far and fourth in district play.

According to rankings of the Amarillo Globe News, Levelland is second in district ratings for the season in all games and fourth in district games played.

The Lobos were behind going into the third quarter by a large 20-0 margin in the Levelland-Perryton game. The two costly fumbles and a last ditch effort brought the Lobos out in front of the Rangers 22-20 for a big win.

Going into the third district game for the season, Muleshoe has a 3-4 overall record for the year, and are 1-1 for district play. The Levelland Lobos are 4-3 for the season and 1-1 in

district play.

Department Store Holds Anniversary

From a small wooden 20 x 40 foot building in 1930, St. Clair's Department has progressed over the past 40 years to a 100 foot modern department store getting ready to celebrate their 40th anniversary.

Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Lowell St. Clair moved to Muleshoe May 19, 1930 with their two sons, Lowell Irvin and Billy Jim. Both Bill Jim and Irvin graduated from Muleshoe schools. Irvin married the former Dorothy Perry of Littlefield and they have three children, Mrs. Mike (Pam) Miller, Johnny and Kelly. Mrs. Miller has presented Mr. and Mrs. Irvin St. Clair with two grandchildren, Kurt and Christine.

Bill Jim St. Clair married the former Marlene Cooper of Andrews and they are the parents of four children, Karen, Janis, Brenda and Tommy. They live on a farm northeast of Muleshoe.

Irvin Lowell St. Clair died in an accident in April, 1950 and Mrs. St. Clair died in February, 1955.

The original St. Clair's Store was a general variety store, said longtime manager-owner, Lowell Irvin St. Clair and was located where the present West-

ern Drug is today. He said the 20 x 40 building also contained their living quarters in the back.

In approximately 1932, the elder St. Clair purchased the old Kennedy Bakery building from Mrs. Kennedy, following the death of her husband in a freak automobile accident. The 25 x 60 foot building became the St. Clair dwelling.

Irvin St. Clair said that around 1936, St. Clair's variety was enlarged to a 50 foot front

Write-In Vote Pushes Harlan Over Moraw

The Democrats carried Bailey County in the Tuesday, November 3 general election which was marked by one upset.

A write-in candidate from the Bula community, Nolan Harlan, bested County Commissioner candidate Rudolph Moraw, in Precinct Four, by four votes. Moraw had defeated incumbent R.P. McCall in the May Democratic primary. The write-in vote for Harlan was 172, while Democrat candidate Moraw had 168 votes, indicating backlash voting from the Bailey County Hospital District contest.

Bailey County courthouse officials said late Tuesday night that the election would probably be contested, and disclosed a recount would be requested. Democratic candidate for U. S. Senate Lloyd Bentsen edged out Republican opponent George Bush, 920-855, and incumbent Texas Governor Preston Smith sailed to a clear victory over Republican candidate Jack Eggers, 1,028-735.

In the Senate race Bentsen, conservative of the "United" Texas Democratic party, pushed ahead of Republican Bush by 65 votes in county totals. Bush nosed Bentsen out in Muleshoe Precincts One and One-A, West Camp and the absentee box, with both candidates tied at the Longview voting box.

Incumbent Lieutenant Govern-

nor Ben Barnes held his position by defeating Republican hopeful, Byron Fullerton, 1,121-606.

In other contested races, the full slate of Democrats swept to a clear-cut victory in Bailey County.

Crane Hunters' Success Above Top Estimate

The Muleshoe Jaycees were overwhelmed temporarily Saturday by the number of sandhill cranes bagged by more than 150 hunters who converged on the area for the first day of the annual Jaycee-sponsored sandhill crane hunt.

With only nine birds being weighed in during the first day of the hunt in 1969, the surprised Jaycees had weighed in and logged a total of 120 birds by late afternoon Saturday.

More than sixty hunters who braved the early morning cold on Sunday found the hunting a little rougher as they only had 20 birds by the end of the day.

An official of the Jaycees reported a vast difference in the quality of birds this year and the better hunting conditions. He said every attempt is being made to save some of the best hunting locations for the windup of the annual hunt this weekend.

The largest bird weighed in to date is slightly over the size of the largest crane last year. It weighs nine pounds, six ounces.

The Jaycees have 30 pounds of dressed crane in a deep freeze and Texas Tech University officials picked up the heads and wing tips to study crane parasites. The biology department of Tech hopes that through the studies, they can determine what parasites may be shortening lives of the popular game bird.

The Jaycee hunt will conclude on Sunday, November 8, and the person bagging the heaviest bird will be presented a 12 gauge automatic shotgun.

In the absence of Carleton Newell, Jerry Hutton reported on the Halloween Parade and movie last weekend. He reported the largest and most successful parade to date. More than 300 youngsters also attended the BAC-sponsored free movie immediately following the Saturday afternoon parade.

A brief report on the park situation was given by Park and Recreation Chairman Rev. Walter Bartholf. The upcoming Showboat Jubilee was reported by Olan Burrows, who said that from 50-60 persons would be on stage on November 9 during the presentation and at least that many more would be working backstage.

He also reported on the purpose of the project, and said the funds received will be used to help defray costs of the Christmas tree at the Mule Memorial Site and the Christmas parade.

An extensive report was given by Harmon Elliott, chairman of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation. He brought the group up to date on varied activities and prospect contacts made by the MAIF during the past several months.

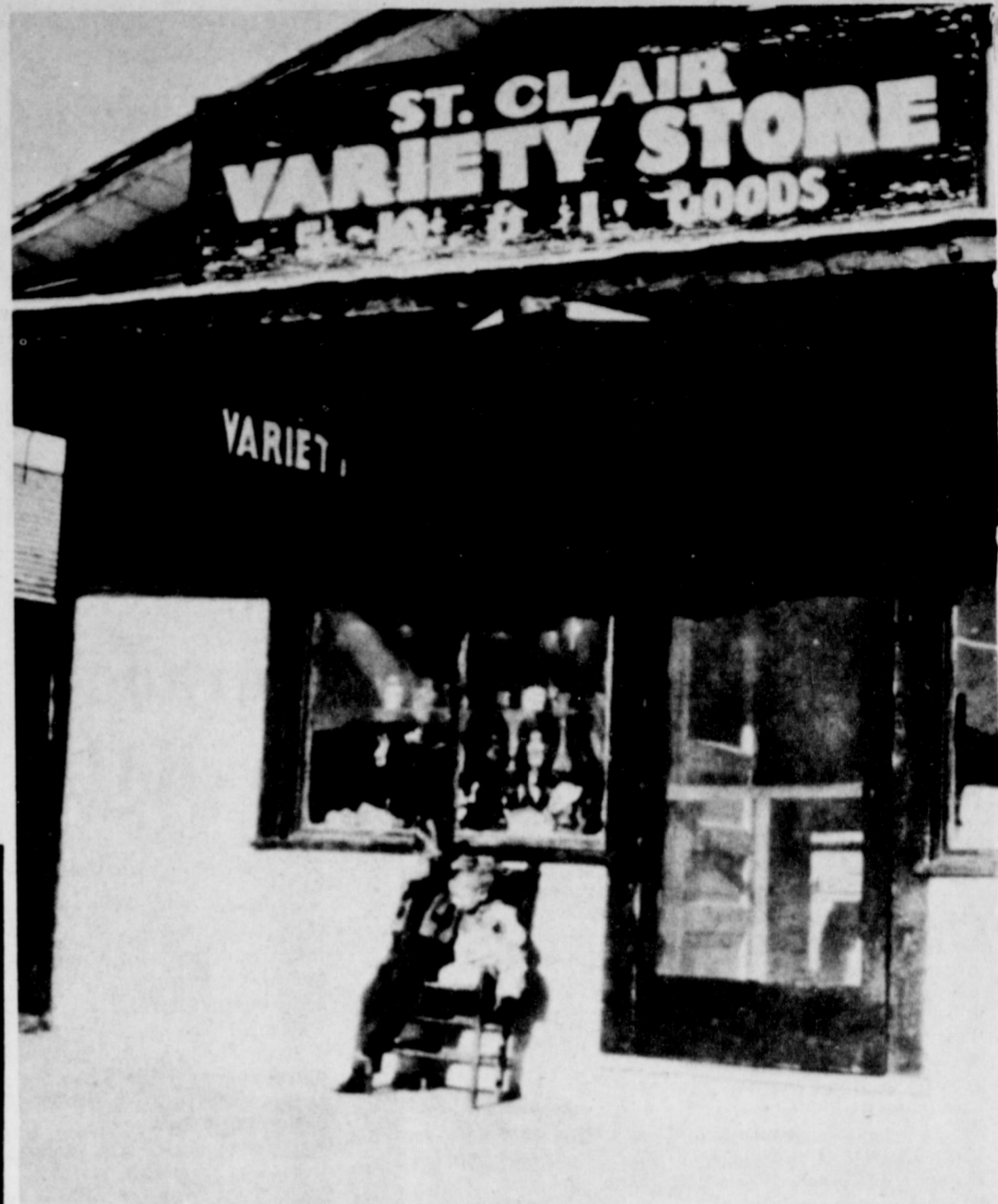
Officers reported that at Johnson Furniture an attempt was made to break into the safe, although the burglar or burglars did not succeed in that attempt.

No county offices were contested, except for the Commissioner for Precinct Four, where the contestee was a write-in candidate.

Persons receiving write-in votes in other precincts for various offices were John Zengler, Jack Young, J.E. Stroud, Homer Fikes, Elbert Nowell, Earl Ladd, Don Cihak, Roger Gorelli, D.O. Burelsmith, Kenneth Nesbitt and Arthur Bolton.

Only two of the seven amendments on the ballot were approved by voters in this county. Amendment One, on judges' retirement carried by a margin of 897-559 and Amendment Six, on homestead exemptions, was approved, 772-716.

The number voting was considered an outstanding turnout

for an off-election year, with 1,917 registered voters trekking to the polls in Bailey County during the day Tuesday. There were no 'traffic jams' and vote traffic moved smoothly in and out of the polling places in the county.

Bailey County has a total of 3,076 registered voters, and the total vote was only approximately 500 behind the 1968 general election when 2,557 voted in a presidential election year.

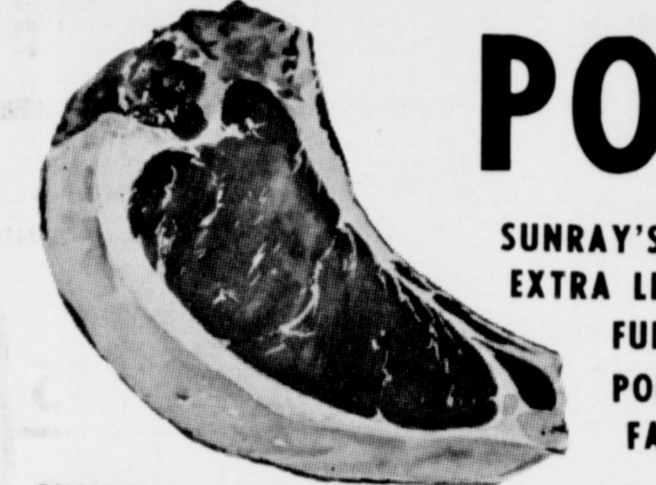

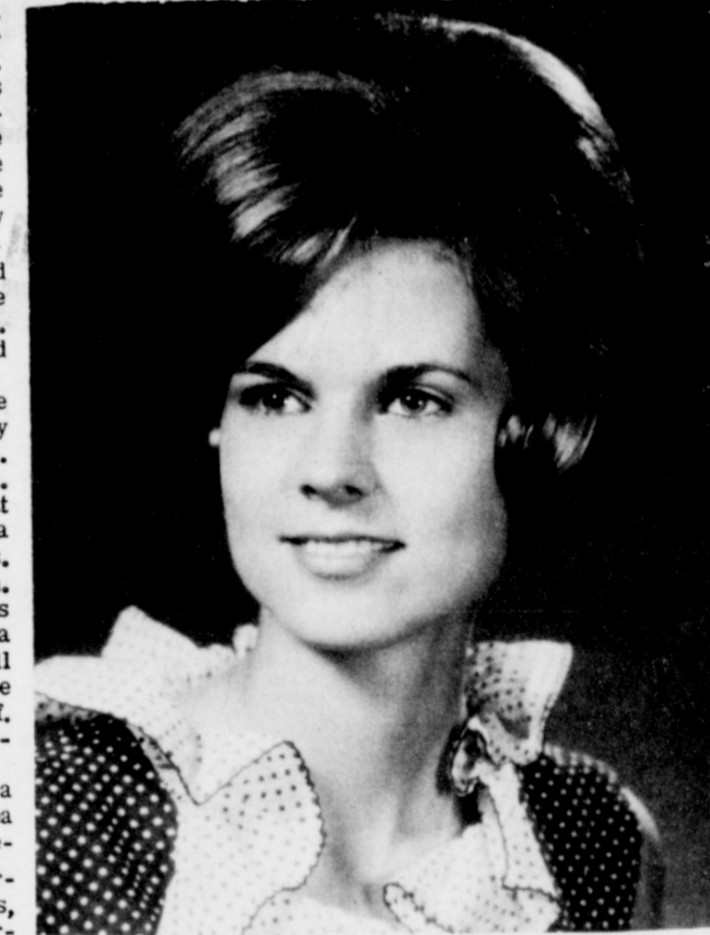

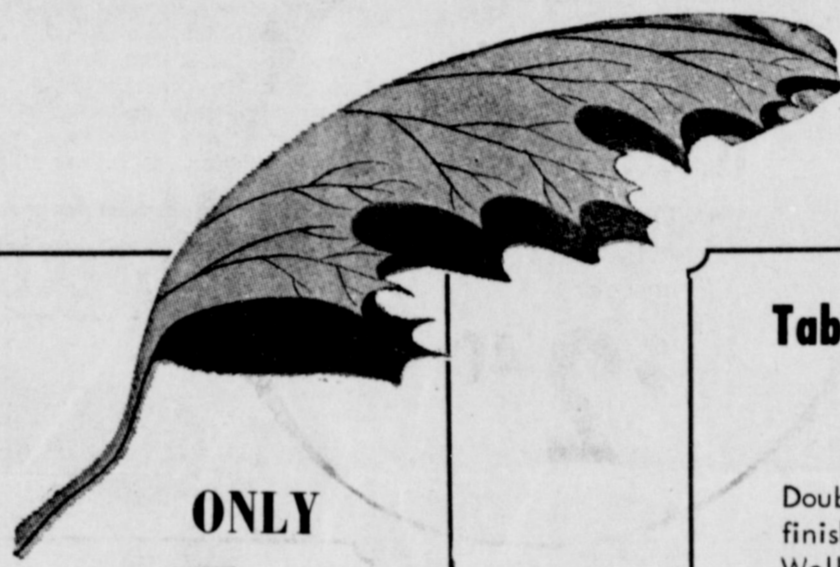

The Longhorns just held on again this week to nose out Notre Dame, Texas is 118.8 . . . the Irish, 118.3. Ohio State is a hot breath behind in third, and Nebraska, in fourth, is moving closer every week.

Notre Dame plays host to Pittsburgh Saturday, but the Panthers will have to reach super heights to untrack the Irish. Notre Dame will win by 38. Texas should breeze by Baylor . . . the spread is 36 points.

Three teams remain in Ohio State's path to the Rose Bowl, and Wisconsin is first on the list. No trouble here . . . the Badgers will fall by 24 points. Nebraska continues to power its way to the Big Eight title

and a certain bowl bid. Iowa State is this week's victim . . . the Cyclones will lose to the Cornhuskers by 33 points.

Louisiana State, ranked number nine, faces a major test in its quest for the Southeast Conference championship. And through 14th-rated Alabama has already been beaten three times, we're picking the Crimson Tide to upset L.S.U. by two points.

Still not out of the woods, but with the smell of roses getting stronger, sixth-rated Stanford meets tough Washington. The Huskies, another three time loser, aren't about to plant a rose-bush in honor of the Indians, but Stanford is favored by 12 points.

Eighth-ranked Arkansas will keep pace with Texas in the Southwest Conference race. The Razorbacks will beat Rice by 22 points Saturday.

The forecasting average sli-

thered up a few points after a particularly good Saturday two weeks ago. Through October 24th, our average was .762 with 977 right, 305 wrong.

Fifth-ranked Tennessee and seventh-ranked Michigan should hold onto their lofty ratings with victories this week. The Volunteers will whip South Carolina by 27 points while the Wolverines will beat charged-up Illinois. The difference will be 28 points.

Still undefeated (barely), the high-flying Air Force, rated 13th, will notch win Number 9 Saturday. The Oregon Ducks won't be easy, but the Falcons should win by seven.

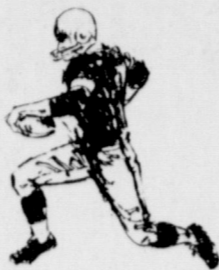

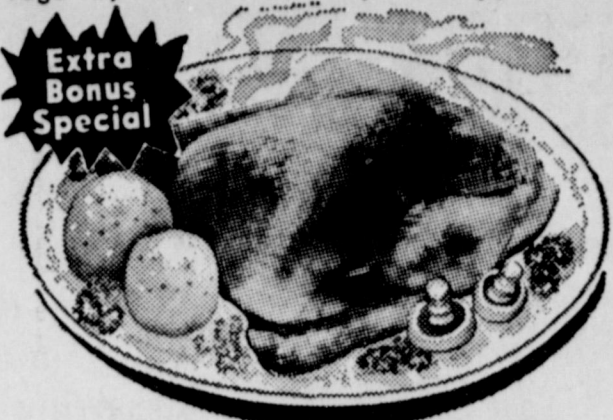

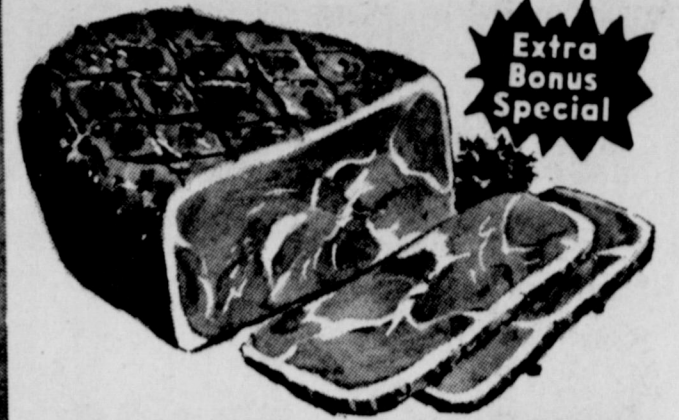
