## Doe Permits To Be Issued Here Monday & Tues.

Crockett county land owners are reminded that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits here Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 28 and 29.

Game Warden Raymond Davee has announced that permits will be issued at the courthouse in Ozona from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on each of the two days.

Landowners or their agents must be present to obtain their permits during the scheduled periods for permit issuance.

Permits to take one antlerless deer per 100 acres of land may be secured in an area of Crockett County south of Highway 290 and east of 163 north of Ozona to State Highway 29. One antlerless deer per 300 acres will be permitted in the rest of the county except for the segment north of Highway 29 and east of 163, and the extreme western tip of the county from the Iraan-Ran-kin road west. No doe permits will be issued for hunting on these areas.

Funeral services for Oliver H. Bailey, 84, brother of Ozona T. J. Bailey, will be held this afternoon in Eldorado with Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ozona, officiating.

Mr. Bailey died Tuesday night in a Kerrville hospital. He was born in 1884 in San Saba county. Mr. Bailey moved with his family to Schleicher county in the early 1900's, where his father participated in the land rush. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Bailey, early Schleicher county settlers.

The Golden Cranes scored two touchdowns on Lion fumbles and one on an interception to down the Lions 28-12 in a real thriller Friday night at Lion stadium. The game was much closer than the score and the difference was "no mistakes" on the part of Crane.

It was anybody's ballgame in the first half and it looked as if there would be an upset when the Lions took the lead in the second quarter. However, the Cranes came back to score just before halftime to take a 14-12 lead.

Crane scored in the first period when Ricky Andregg hit Tommy Jones for 40 yards and a touchdown. Jones kicked the extra point to give Crane a 7-0 lead. However, the Lions controlled the ball most of the first period and a fumble on the Crane 20 cost them a score.

The Lions roared back in the second period to score twice. Starting a drive on their own 48-yard line, Fleet Coates got loose for 40 yards to set up the first Lion score. A couple of plays later, he hit the middle for the score. The Lions tried to go ahead by passing for the two points, but failed. The next score came when Beto Vargas grabbed a Crane pass on the 45-yd. line and Rodney Pagan broke over for the score on the first play from scrimmage.

With a minute to play in the first half, Andregg hit Jones from mid-field to set up a Crane score on the Ozona 7. Andregg passed to Steve Pettit for the score. (Continued on Last Page)

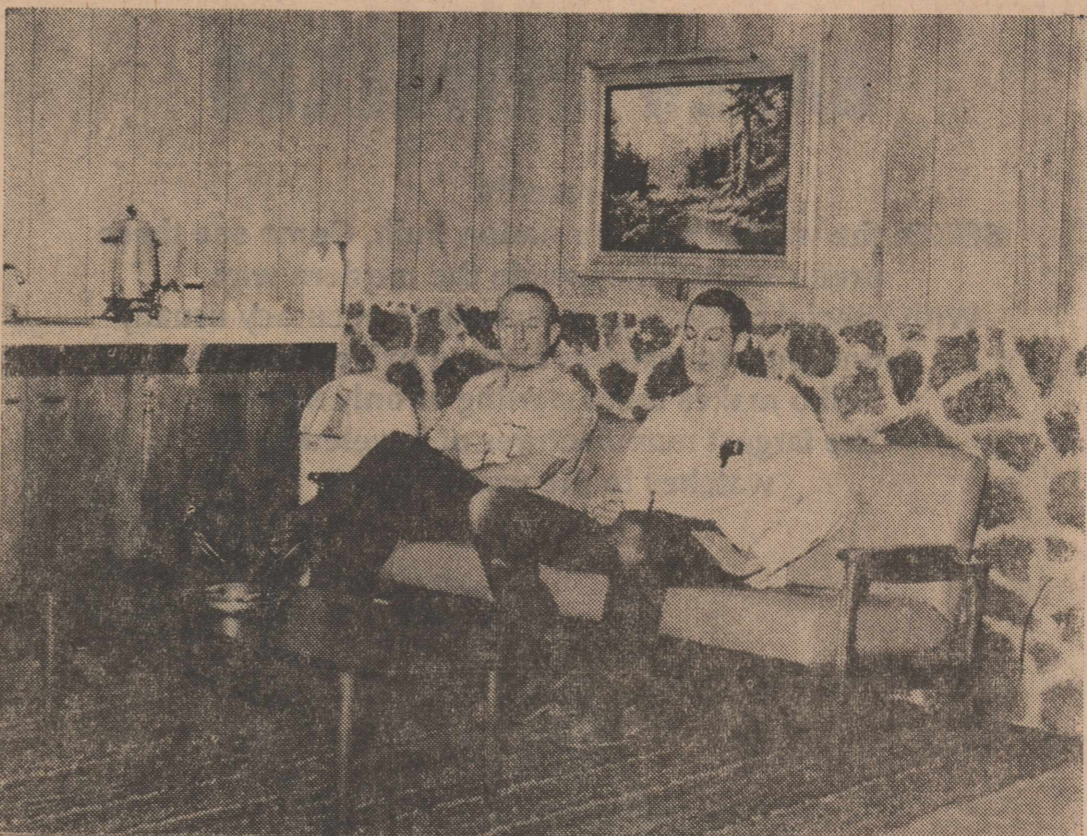
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## Ozona Boy Wins In PP&K; Dallas Next

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**DPS Seeks Young Men As Recruits For Hiway Patrol**

Patrolman Orvil Perry, of the Ozona based patrol unit, announced today that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.

Patrolman Perry said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are in sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20-40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately."

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Driver License, License and Weight, Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy, he will receive a salary of \$500.00 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many other subjects.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Patrolman Perry urged interested young men to get their application today and take the examination before all vacancies are filled.

**New Residents Must Vote In Clerk's Office**

Voters in the coming general election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the county clerk's office by November 1, according to information received from County Clerk Leta Powell.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice President, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues.

However, instead of voting at a regular polling place on election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence. This period, which is the same as the period for absentee voting, began on October 16 and will end on November 1.

If the voter has lived in the same congressional, legislative, or judicial district for six months, he may also vote on that district office.

In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county clerk's office. However, if he has lost his certificate, he may vote after making an affidavit of its loss.

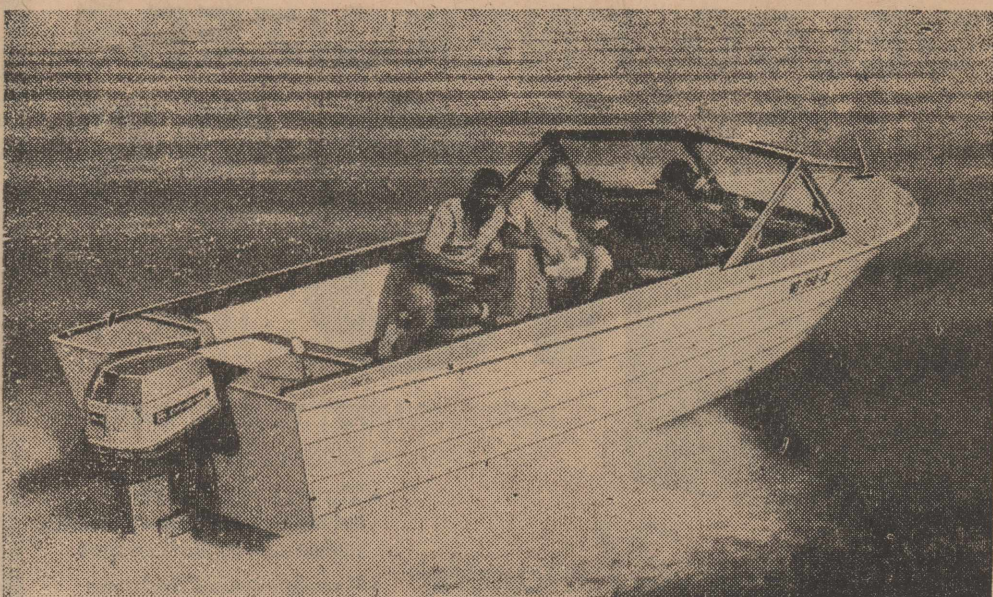

Survey, Crockett County, Texas via three outlets.

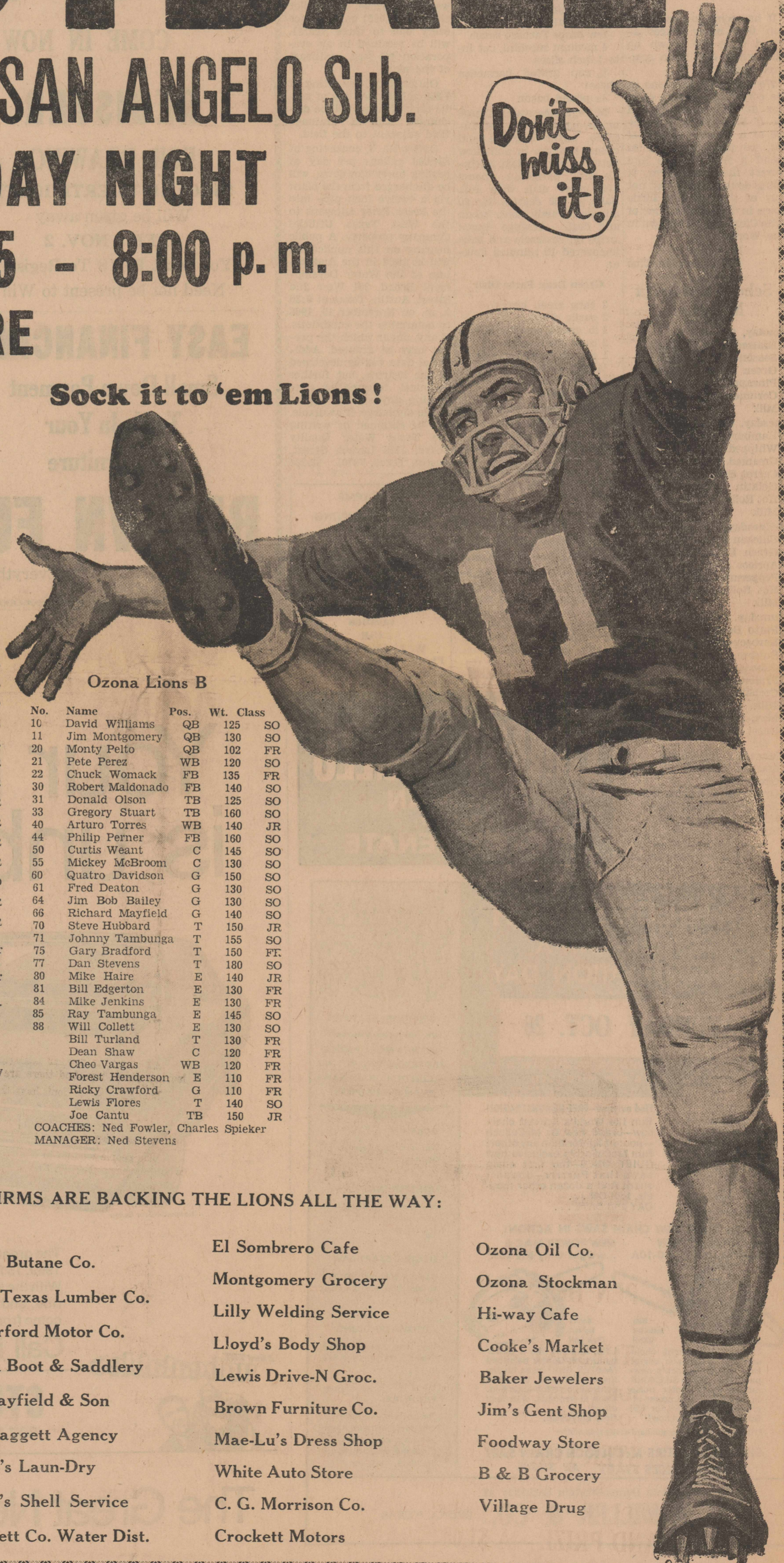
