Vaccination Of Pets For Rabies Planned April 11

Local county officials have become concerned over recent positive identified rabies cases in the county and have made plans for a mass dog and cat vaccination day for dog and cat owners in the county. County agent Pete W. Jacoby has made arrangements with Dr. Joe David Ross, DVM, of Sonora to come to Ozona the afternoon of Friday, April 11, for the purpose of vaccinating pets against this dread disease.

Place and time for the vaccinations has been set for 2-6 p. m. at the South Swimming Pool. Dr. Ross has advised that every dog or cat that has not been vaccinated with the live virus vaccine in the past three to four months should be vaccinated for full protection against rabies. A nominal fee will be charged for each animal vaccinated. Members of the local 4-H clubs and FFA Chapter will assist with the local mass vaccination program as record keepers and holders.

All pet owners are being asked to cooperate in this program by having their pets vaccinated so as to prevent further outbreaks of rabies in the county. Positive cases of rabies have been identified near Ozona and outbreaks have been reported in several towns and cities in the vicinity.

Rotarians Plan Annual Easter Egg Hunt Sun.

The annual Easter egg hunt for Ozona children up to 12 years of age will be held Sunday afternoon at Memorial Park, east of town, sponsored by the Ozona Rotary Club.

One hundred prize eggs, each containing a dollar donated by Ozona Merchants, will highlight the hunt. The prize eggs, along with hundreds of Easter eggs, will be hidden in areas designated for various age groups.

Age groups will include children from infant through 5 years, 6 through 9 years and 10 through 12 years.

Parents are asked not to bring their children until 2 p. m. Sunday afternoon.

Mrs. Robertson died Sunday afternoon at 12:30 p. m. in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring after an illness.

Mrs. Robertson was born August 18, 1905 in Ozona. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert M. Couch, pioneer Crockett County ranching family. She was a World War II veteran of the Woman's Army Corps.

She was a well known West Texas artist. Her most outstanding paintings were western landscapes and still life done in oils. She designed the cover for the book "Ozona" which was published in 1966 during the Crockett County Diamond Jubilee, a history of the county compiled by the Crockett County Historical Society. Her sketch of downtown Ozona, also used during the 75th anniversary celebration, was enlarged and reproduced for many residents.

Mrs. Robertson was a member of the Crockett County Historical Society and Survey Committee. She was also a longtime member of the Ozona Garden Club.

Survivors include a brother Joe Couch of Ozona, and two sisters, Mrs. R. M. James of Mt. Vernon, Ark. and Mrs. Lewis C. Pyatt of Springfield, La.

Wife Of Ozona Man Found Dead In Burning Car

Mrs. Billy Troy Williams, 21, was found dead in her burning car on an Alpine hospital parking lot early Saturday morning by her husband, an employee of the hospital. She was found about 4:45 a. m. The attending physician said cause of death was asphyxiation, due to inhalation of fumes from the burning upholstery.

Mr. and Mrs. Williams were both students at Sul Ross College and worked different shifts at the hospital. Mrs. Williams often slept in her car in the parking lot while waiting for her husband's shift at the hospital switchboard to end.

Saturday morning Mr. Williams saw smoke coming from the exhaust of the car as he approached the parking lot to ask Mrs. Williams to come into the hospital to wait. When he reached the car he realized that the car was full of smoke. He went for help and finding the car doors locked, he broke a window with a jack handle from a nearby car and pulled his wife from the burning car.

The physician said she had been dead some time before being burned by the flames. Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Sunday in Goesslin Funeral Home Chapel in Alpine with burial in Elm Grove Cemetery.

Mrs. Williams was born in Alpine and had lived there all her life.

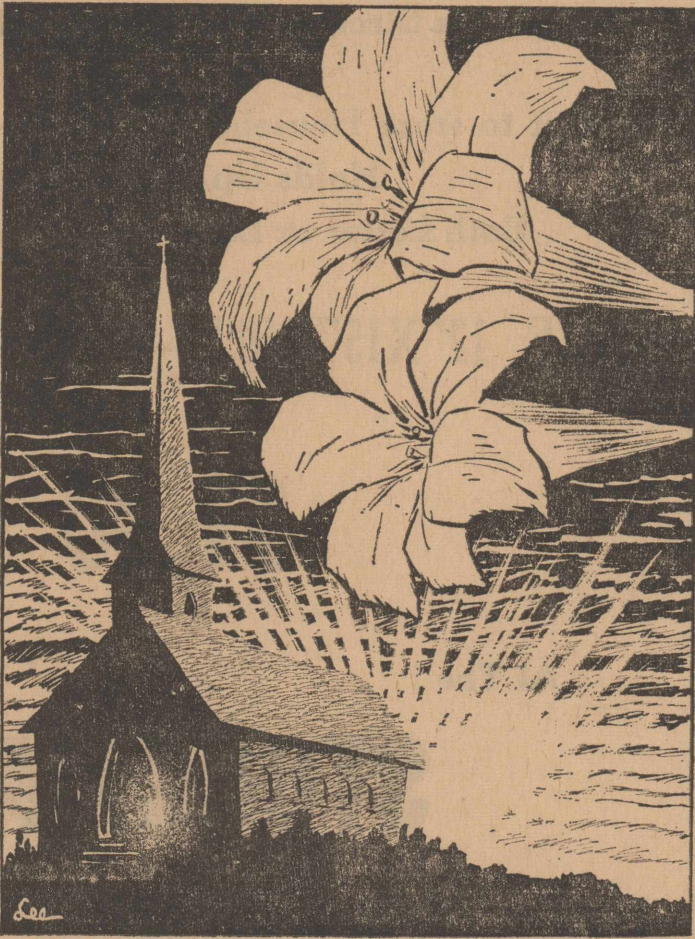
Plans are underway by the Ozona Garden Club to hold the annual Ozona Spring Clean-up this month.

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“THE GOOD MEN DO . . . DEFINING POVERTY

Passing of one of the nation's great men is always a sad occasion but for one of the stature of General of the Army and former President Dwight D. Eisenhower to reach the end of his mortal service brings a deep sense of personal loss and heavy hearts throughout the land. In this day of draft dodgers, justifiers of court rulings and widely disseminated excuses thought up by so-called psychologists from the Berkeley campus, of rioters, looters, anarchists and subversives, of constant broadcast of communist and socialist propaganda by our own mass media, the loss of a patriot like Ike Eisenhower is doubly depressing.

Unless history is terribly warped by the efforts of today's organized drive toward national suicide, President Eisenhower will be recognized as one of the nation's greatest patriots, to be listed along with Washington, Franklin, Lincoln, Pershing, MacArthur etc. Architect of victory for the free world in history's greatest war, he did his bit as president to reverse the Roosevelt-Kennedy-Johnson toboggan to national bankruptcy. Now that his voice is stilled and his counsel no longer available, it is to be hoped that the man in the White House who served with him as his vice president will hear the small voice of the patriot on the street over the din of propaganda being poured out and wield the great powers of the presidency to guide this nation back on the road to sanity.

“Rural Opportunities” is a slick little monthly printed at the taxpayer's expense by the Office of Economic Opportunity. It's a two-color magazine of eight to twelve pages. We don't know whether or not its size varies with the amount of money distributed by the Rural Affairs branch of the OEO. But this is not our main concern. It is probable that the money would be spent even if the newsletter were to be eliminated.

It is interesting to browse through the printed matter, though it is doubtful if much of it will do you any good unless you are a master of trivia. For example in the March 1969 edition we find that James D. Templeton, Asst. Director, Rural Affairs, is astonished that the definition of “rural” has not changed in this country in 50 years.

We hope our disclosure of this will not cause our readers to lose too much sleep. Why is there no governmental bureau to meet every few years to revise our words and update them? Mr. Templeton is a man of action, though and this gross error may yet be corrected. He writes that he invited “25 Federal agencies, Congressional committees, and national farm and rural organizations to a meeting, to begin considering how to bring our definition of ‘rural’ up to date.”

No agreement was reached at this epic meeting, but some significant points were brought out: “. . . rural means fewer people in larger spaces; more distance to

travel, time, more cost; fewer services, and poorer; rural means self-help, small group efforts, small community bases; mass mechanisms, like transportation, hospital centers, big markers are out; rural means no public water or sewer services in the road by the house; rural means weak governmental units, low economic resources, low tax base.”

We might add that rural means a great deal more. It means people of independent minds, reluctant to accept the dole with its accompanying strings. What, Mr. Templeton, is wrong with “self-help, small group efforts”? It built this great nation and is contributing in large measure to the growth that permits the huge giveaways of the bureaucrats.

A RACIAL MYTH EXPLODED

Arizona Senator Paul Fanning is waging quite a fight to try to strengthen the laws against criminal use of deadly weapons in the District of Columbia. We hope that his campaign will be effective. It won't be an easy chore.

Because the racial makeup of the District is predominantly Negro, almost every effort to fight crime is attacked as being racist-oriented.

However, some facts entered in the Congressional Record by the former Arizona governor may well soften the complaints of the militants. The figures are taken from the pages of the Washington Daily News in what that paper calls its Crime Clock.

The Crime Clock for four days was published. The victims of robberies in these four days were in fourteen cases Negroes. Seventeen whites were victimized. In all cases the assailants were Negro. A lot of the victims of crime in the District are Negroes.

In the assault category, five Negroes were attacked, including two women who were victims of attempted rape, and one who was raped. Again the criminals were of the same race as the victims. There were only four whites assaulted on these particular dates and one Chinese man was shot for no apparent reason. A man merely walked into his store, fired one shot into him and walked out into the night.

The crime rate knows no race, age or sex barrier. One Negro youth was robbed of thirty-five cents. The boy was thirteen-years-old. Lawlessness is not an issue of civil rights. No civil rights bill is going to solve it. Only strong measures to find

and punish the guilty will work, and the sooner this is recognized, the sooner we will be able to cope with the problem. A lot of decent people of all races are being abused and killed in this most serious battle. Let us get on with it and stop the alibiing. We're wasting time and valuable lives — black, white and yellow.

Grandmother Of Ozonan Is Dead

Mrs. Elizabeth Jane Christopher, 94, grandmother of A. R. Rutherford of Ozona and a daughter of a pioneer West Texas ranching family, died Sunday afternoon in an Abilene nursing home, following a long illness.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 p. m. at North's Memorial Chapel with burial in Odd Fellows cemetery in Abilene.

NOTED AND PASSED

Justice Abroad: Last year a Dutch Senator called President Lyndon Johnson a “war criminal.” The Amsterdam Appeals Court has just fined him the equivalent of \$60.00.

Justice At Home: “There are a great many people who feel very strongly that the Supreme Court is kind of set apart. But the Supreme Court justices, in their constitutional role, should be no different than presidents, governors and legislators. The justices should be subject to the criticism of lawyers, laymen and political science people.” — Justice Robert C. Finley, Washington State Supreme Court.

Now Hear This: US Navy Communications Technician Don E. Bailey didn't need a bullhorn to be heard at the Pueblo inquiry. The onetime bus driver told the five admirals on the dais: “All the beatings I had did not hurt half as much as when we were pleading for help from the largest navy in the world and still nobody showed up.”

Search Continued: On March 4 another F111A fighter-bomber crashed 85 miles north of Las Vegas. It was the 14th of the sweeping planes to crash in the last 21 months. On February 12 one of the planes disappeared on a 750-mile night training flight in the same general area. It is still missing and other planes have been searching for it.

Hope continues that one of these McNamara specials will fly safely.

Uncle Collects \$Million An Hour On Gasoline Tax

New York — The gasoline tax, 50 years old this year, brings in \$1 million an hour, Oil Facts reports.

The first gasoline tax, called by some the “painless penny,” was levied in Oregon in February, 1919, to provide money for highway construction. The late Loyal M. Graham, the legislator who sponsored the tax measure, said he never thought the idea would spread. But by 1929 every state and the District of Columbia had gasoline taxes, and the federal government joined them in 1932. The average state gasoline rate today is 6.8 cents a gallon; the federal levy 4 cents.

Total state and federal motor fuel tax collections for 1969 will come close to \$9 billion — more than the revenue derived from any other commodity. The cumulative total during the past half-century was more than \$120 billion.

Thousands Expected To Flock To Junction Saturday Night For 19th Annual Easter Pageant Production

Junction's nineteenth annual Easter Pageant will be presented Saturday, April 5, 1969 at 10 p. m. on the eve before Easter Sunday, in a natural amphitheatre on the hillside below The Everburning Cross, one mile southeast of Junction.

Presentation is by four-score Kimble County people, all laymen, women and children in colorful costumes, typical of the dress of Biblical times. Here they will reenact Jesus Christ's last Days on Earth, so timed that the Scene of the final Ascension will take place shortly after midnight on Easter morn.

This Holy Spectacle will be presented in pantomime, supported from a broadcasting both by readers and background music. A dozen stages have been arranged among the rugged rocks of the hillside, and changes of scenes are effected by the shifting of spot and flood lights.

The production is entirely amateur and non-commercial. Members of the cast are all local people with no professional or paid actors. The cast contains men and women from many walks of life; clerks, lawyers, barbers, ranch men, bankers, teachers, mail men, housewives, merchants, mechanics — who take time from their business for several weeks to participate in this consecrated service.

Mrs. Eamp Johnson directs the Pageant for its nineteenth consecutive year. In 1951, a group of about twenty inspired people enacted the first Pageant from a single stage. From year to year the Spectacle has grown with changes and improvements in scripts, scenes, staging and props. Attendance has yearly increased, and last year over 6,800 people came from far and near. The excellence of the production is perhaps attested by the ever increasing attendance. Many think there is nothing finer this side of Oberammergau.

Congressman O. C. Fisher

When 20,000 people, mostly youngsters, gathered in a Miami coliseum the other day to celebrate decency, the press hardly knew how to report it. The news media has been kept so busy in recent years televising and reporting Negro riots, souped-up racial demonstrations, Yippie and Hippie defiance of human cleanliness and self-respect, and the pro-Communist trouble-makers — on and off the college campuses, little time or attention has been given to decency and respectability.

Yet, we are assured there is good reason to believe the flag-desecrators, draft card burners, racial demonstrators, long-haired and fuzzy-brained college rebels, and other nondescripts in our society are very much in the minority.

Mr. Gallup recently found that 4 out of every 5 Americans think all campus rioters should be summarily suspended or expelled.

The "Up with the People" movement has attracted thousands of youthful patriots who still believe in their country and its flag, and are organized into orderly crusades to advance their cause. There was a crowd of them in Washington for the Nixon inaugural.

They were in the parade, and then thrilled a half dozen large audiences as they sang their inspiring songs at the inaugural balls that evening. Those young people, including both blacks, and whites, impressed the people with their patriotic zeal.

The Young Americans for Freedom (YAF) has been in the forefront for several years, opposing crime and upholding law and order. With chapters on school campuses throughout the land, these young people believe fervently in America

institutions.

Offsetting some of this is the presence on many campuses of Americans for a Democratic Society (ADS), composed in the main of bitter, hard-nosed trouble-makers, whose antics would be more fitting in Havana. They are burdens on society, and many of them are undoubtedly jail-house-bound.

Let us give aid and encouragement to the right-thinking element among our young people. They are traveling on the right track.

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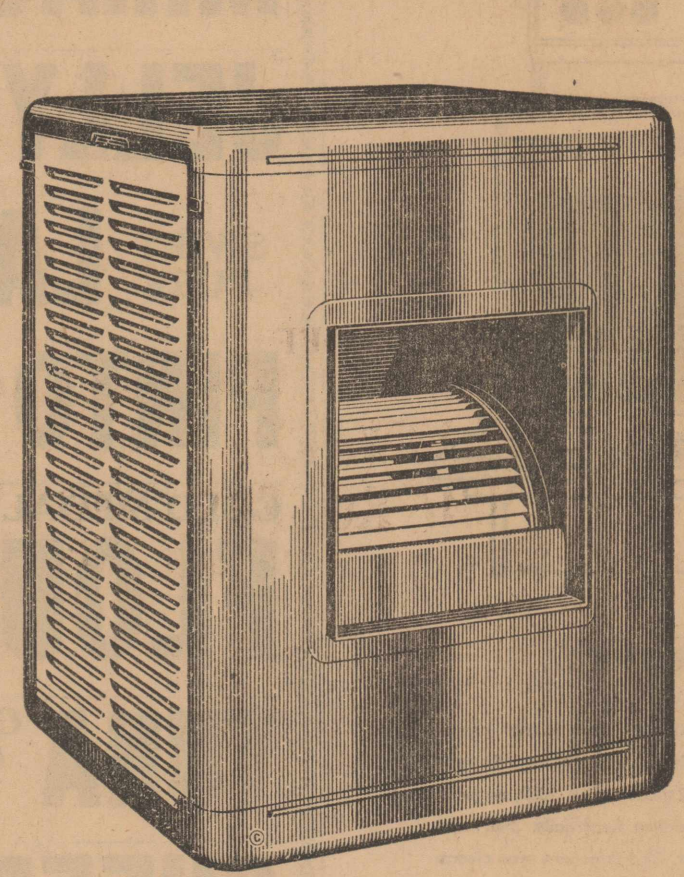

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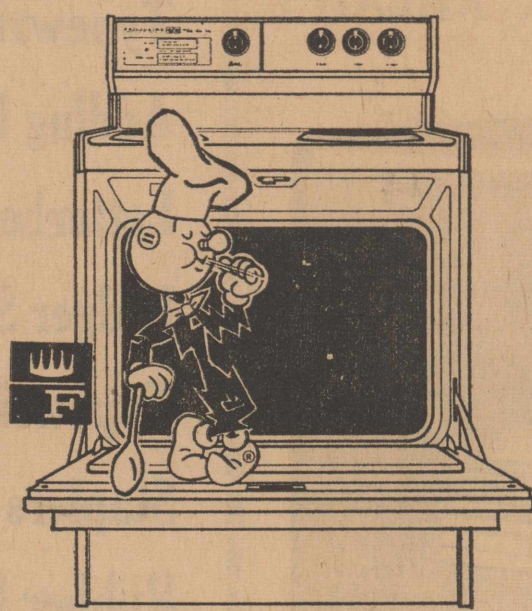
