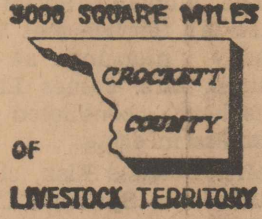

Stanton And Ozona Meet Friday Night In Stanton To Decide Who Will Occupy District Cellar Post

If the Lions are going to win one this year, tomorrow night is the night for it. Lions and fans will travel to Stanton to take on the Stanton Buffalos, who only have one win to their credit this year and are, like the Lions, winless in district play.

The Lions and the Buffalos are evenly matched as far as experience is concerned, both drawing heavily from players with B team experience. Stanton will be fighting to win their only game in district play, as they meet the district leader, Big Lake, in their final game of the season.

On the other hand, a win over the Buffalos, just might give Ozona the steam they need to upset McCamey in their final game. The Lions have already lost the tough ones, Crane and Big Lake, and figure they have no where to go but up. A win over Stanton and McCamey would allow the Lions to end the season with a third place berth in district play.

The Lions held the Big Lake Owls to only 154 yards rushing last Friday night

and unless the Buffalos can move in the passing department, which they have not been able to do this year, they could wind up scoreless. The Lions should be able to move well on offense, as they will be facing the weakest defensive team they have played all year.

Friday night the Owls came and conquered, but the outcome was not as bad as predicted, the final score being 36-12. The Lions scored twice in the fourth quarter, but failed on the PAT attempts.

Freshman halfback Ruben Tambunga scored the first touchdown for the Lions, hitting paydirt from 12 yards out. Tambunga was also the leading rusher for the Lions with 39 yards. He intercepted one Owl pass.

The second Lion score came on a 40-yd. pass play from David Williams to Pete Perez.

Heading up the Lion defense was Tom Davidson with 15 tackles. David Pagan and Tony Wheeler had 10 tackles each. Quatro Davidson and Tom Jenkins each recovered an Owl fumble.

While working as an usher in the Schubert Theatre in Chicago, she volunteered to replace one of the leading characters who failed to appear and sang the entire performance. The manager took her with the show to New York and for 15 years she sang in Schubert Productions.

She received her Master's degree from the American Conservatory in Chicago before coming to Ozona. While living here, she spent her summers studying in Chicago.

Bag limits in the county are 3 deer, no more than 2 bucks, and 2 turkeys. Permits for antlerless deer must be secured from the land owner.

Deer hunters will be vying for prizes in the annual hunting contest, sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. Each deer entered in the contest must be registered with its tag at the Ozona Trading Post, Cooke's Market or the Ozona Body Works.

Winners will be announced at the end of the season. A run-down will be given weekly on those leading in the various divisions of the contest.

First prize for the deer with the most points will be a Remington 243 Model 700 rifle and second prize will be an ice chest. Points will be measured from the brow up.

A Coleman stove will be given as first prize for the deer with the widest rack. Second prize will be an ice chest. Entries in this category will be measured at the beam.

Prizes for the heaviest field dressed deer will be a Coleman stove for first place and an ice chest for second place. Deer will be weighed when it is registered.

Busy Patrolman Probes Accident, Grabs Suspects

Highway Patrolman Orvil Perry investigated three accidents in the county during the past week. Property damage was heavy but there were only minor personal injuries.

Late Wednesday night Patrolman Perry was on his way to investigate a truck wreck on Lancaster hill west of town on Hwy 290 when a call came from Sonora to be on the lookout for two men driving a late model Chevrolet and pulling a U-Haul trailer. The two were wanted in Sonora for beating and robbing a hitch hiker and dumping him out on the highway just before entering Crockett County.

Reaching the site of the accident, Perry reported that a 1969 White truck tractor and semi-trailer, driven by James Bell of Sonora, had parted as the driver lost control on a curve. The trailer careened off the right side of the road and overturned while the tractor skidded into a pasture on the other side. The driver suffered minor injuries and damage to the rig was estimated at \$17,000.

Returning to town about midnight, he went to the site of an accident just east of Ozona on Hwy 290 where an Oklahoma man had lost control of a 1966 Chevrolet towing a U-Haul trailer, hit a culvert and the trailer broke loose and overturned. He took the driver, Steven Edwards and a passenger, Russel Cooper, into custody and turned them over to the officials in Sonora where they are being held for robbery by assault.

A minor accident occurred on Santa Rosa St. early Saturday morning when C. H. Landin backed his 1963 Chevrolet into a parked pickup belonging to Esequiel Flores. Damage was \$25 to the car and \$50 to the pickup.

PROCEED, MR. AGNEW

Vice President Spiro Agnew has drawn down on his head the fury of the left-wing in the Congress and the press for his demunciation of the leaders of the October 15th "Moratorium".

The shrill criticism seems to center primarily on the charge that Vice President Agnew attacked the Moratorium leaders as "an effete corps of impudent snobs who characterize themselves as intellectuals." In the interest of fairness, we believe that this quote should be re-evaluated in the context of the speech given by Mr. Agnew in New Orleans.

The Vice President said: "Education is being redefined to suit the ideas of the uneducated. The student now goes to college to proclaim rather than to learn. The lessons of the past are ignored and obliterated in a contemporary antagonism known as the generation gap. A spirit of national masochism prevails, encouraged by an effete corps of impudent snobs who characterize themselves as intellectuals." "It is in this setting of dangerous oversimplification that the war in Vietnam achieves its greatest distortion.

"The recent Vietnam Moratorium is a reflection of the confusion that exists in America today. Thousands of well motivated young people, conditioned since childhood to respond to great emotional appeals, saw fit to demonstrate for peace. Most did not stop to consider that the leaders of the Moratorium had billed it as a massive public outpouring of sentiment against the foreign policy of the President of the United States. Most did not care to be reminded that the leaders of the Moratorium refused to disassociate themselves from the objective enunciated by the enemy in Hanoi."

Upon reading the full text of Mr. Agnew's speech, it is obvious that a deliberate attempt to distort the true meaning of his words has been made by individuals whose reasoning, as well as their identity, is obscure. But the most cogent evidence of the legitimacy of Mr. Agnew's remarks was provided by the avowed enemies of the United States. In an open letter to the Moratorium agitators, North Vietnamese Communist Premier Pham Van Dong saluted them as his "Dear American Friends."

Just a few weeks ago we were wondering "where is Agnew?" Now we know and we're glad to have found him.

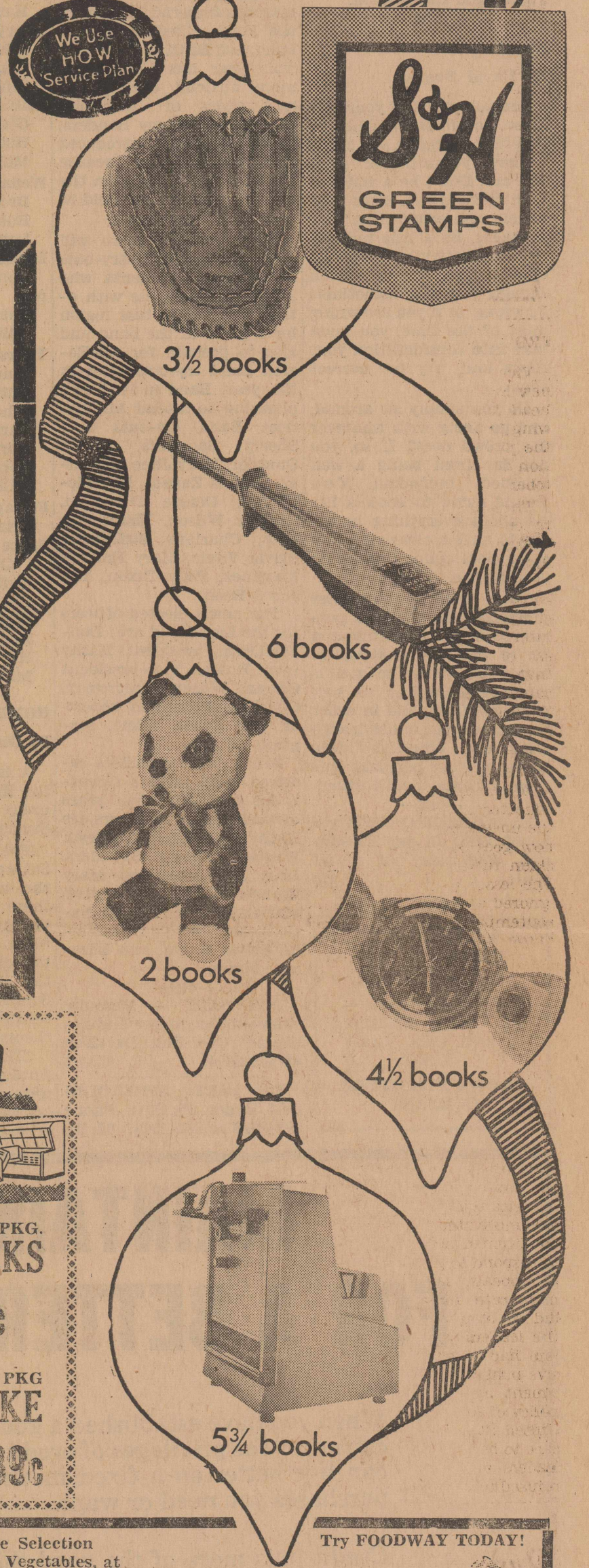

TIPS

For Gardeners

The Ozona Garden Club

By Mrs. Bailey Post

November is the best month to start planting shrubs, trees and bulbs. Most deciduous plants lose their leaves by the last of the month and will be safe to plant bare rooted.

Balled and burlapped plants planted late this month or early Dec. will have time to develop a good root system while soil is still warm.

In late November, begin planting bulbs every ten days to have a succession of blooms in the spring. I have planted bulbs as late as Christmas.

Cut back dead tops of peonies, feed one cup of bone meal and mound dirt over roots for winter protection.

Protect half-hardy plants with leaves that have been raked or start a compost heap. A dormant spray used this month will kill many of the eggs and larvae that winter over around the base of plants and in leaves. All rubbish should be cleared away.

Cut back chrysanthemum plants to six inches after a killing frost and mulch roots if needed.

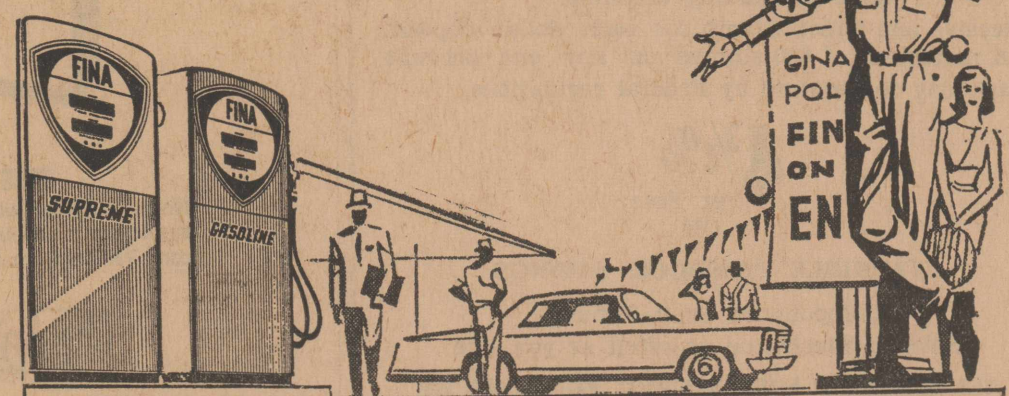

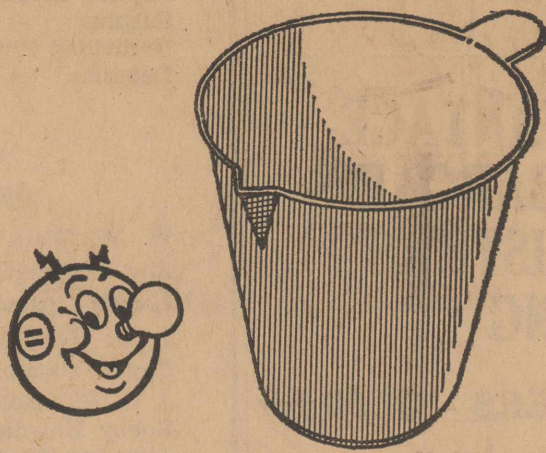

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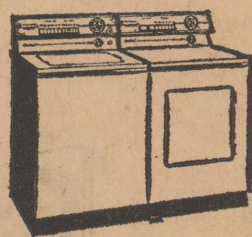
