Sorola, janitor at Ozona Gas Processing Plant, was crossing the draw about 2:15 when his pickup stalled in the high water. His cries for help brought other employes to his aid. He was attaching a cable to the stalled vehicle when the water shifted the pickup and Sorola lost his footing and was swept downstream. The Attica rebellion demonstrates the need for restoring the death penalty. Hardened criminals such as the Attica ringleaders don't hesitate to undertake new, bloody deeds because they are confident that capital punishment is a dead letter in the United States. If the electric chair had been in use in New York State, the Attica uprising

might not have taken place. Beyond that, state authorities must screen prison populations more carefully, isolating politicized criminals bent on revolutionary activities behind prison walls. And states most certainly must refuse to permit New Left "observers" to negotiate with or represent prisoners.

Prison reforms are needed in Center. of inmates, incarcerated for FEMALE HELP WANTED minor crimes, can be rehabilitated. ### **HOW COME RUSSIA IS A STRONG-WEAK NATION?**

It is one of the great mysteries of the world that the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics has a much greater fleet of submarines than the United States. But the situation is much worse. Representative John G. Schmitz of York Times, whose eulogy the Whittier, Calif. area, the President's Congressman, of George Jackson apparently says:

"There is now little doubt in the mind of any informed person that the United States is inferior to the Soviet Union in practically every aspect of military power. What is worse, this disparity in strategic forces is growing worse due to a combination of executive restraint in hopes of progress at the SALT talks, Congressional criticism, and growing pressure from numerous disarmament lobbies chanting about 're-ordering priorities.'"

The question arises, why is it that the Russians cannot build a mass production automobile or truck plant, while they can build warships, freighters, atomic bombs, missiles, tanks, artillery and the ammunition to fire big guns? While they are helping the North Vietnamese, the Egyptians and the Cubans and others to make war, and are of the prisoners. Obviously the Russians are engaging in a crash production of armaments while neglecting other areas of needful output. makes reasonable allowance for hardship cases. For example: An unemployed woman was offered a job on the night shift at a nearby factory. When she refused to take it, her unemployment compensation was cut off. But in a court hearing, she told the judge that she would have had to walk home in the dark through a tough neighborhood—and that she had been terrorized twice by nocturnal assailants. The judge decided that her re-

fusal to take the job was justified, and ordered her compensation payments reinstated.

That does not mean, however, that you can wait serenely until the perfect job comes along. Another case involved a restaurant worker who, accustomed to working from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., turned down a job that started two hours

later in the day. "Frankly," he explained, "it's just too hard for me to change my hours. I'm used to the old way." But this time, a court denied his right to unemployment com-pensation. He was out of work, noted the court, more by choice than by necessity.

Suppose a job that is offered would create religious conflicts. A number of cases have arisen involving Seventh-Day Adventists who were not willing to work on Saturday.

Almost invariably, the courts have accepted this as a legitimate reason for rejecting a job, with no effect on the person's right to collect unemployment compensation. "Work which requires one to

violate his moral standards," said one court, "is not suitable work."
