As of Monday, 820 hunting lists had been mailed out to prospective hunters for Crockett



Demanding better treatment and living conditions for prisoners, Americans have come to realize that persons are not in prison to be punished. Being there is punishment.



Military survivor benefits and suspension of Federal safety and health inspections, were featured news items on Capitol Hill last week.

The survivor benefits measure is a landmark in military personnel legislation. As one of the original authors of bills on the subject I attended the President's signing ceremony at the White House. For a memento I was given one of the pens used in the historic signing of the bill that was enacted.

In general terms, this law gives the families of military retirees the same protection available to the families of civil service retirees, and will require comparable monthly contributions by those who participate. And it puts a \$2100-per year floor under the income of all current military widows.


A House approved amendment, which I offered to the annual HEW-Labor Department appropriation bill will, if retained by the Senate, suspend during the current fiscal year inspections by Labor Department agents of small business firms, ranchers and farmers. under the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA). Hopefully, the time will be extended.

Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club Bv Mrs. Bailey Post

From now until Christmas this is the most enjoyable season of the year to me. With the countryside well-covered in grass, we should miss the usual unwelcome sand storms.

With the cooler days coming on, there are a number of chores you can do around the garden this fall that will make next season more productive and much easier.

If you did not divide or plant new bearded iris in the spring, they may be planted now. The iris bed should be in full sun if possible and should be well drained. Soil should be light in texture with a balanced plant food added. If old clumps of iris, lift them with a fork and divide into single rhizomes, discarding the old growth in the center of each. Cut leaves back to at least half their length in fan shape. Plant each about a foot apart just deep enough to cover the toots. Water the bed well to settle soil around the roots. Keep watered until roots are established, but not too wet to rot.

Try alliums in your roses. The colorful flowering onions. The allium is just as effective as its strong-smelling vegetable cousins in chasing pests and a lot more attractive, says "Organic Gardening." Any of the dozen varieties available to gardeners are also well worth planting for their long-lasting, ball-like clusters of blossoms in a range of sizes and colors. The ornamental alliums are suitable plants of easy culture in ordinary garden soil. The bulbs may be planted in the autumn or spring, or seeds sown in the spring. Most all bulbs and seed are listed in nursery catalogs.







Since the first soil and water conservation district was organized over 3,000 districts have been established. Today, 97 percent plus of the farms and ranches in the United States are in such districts.
