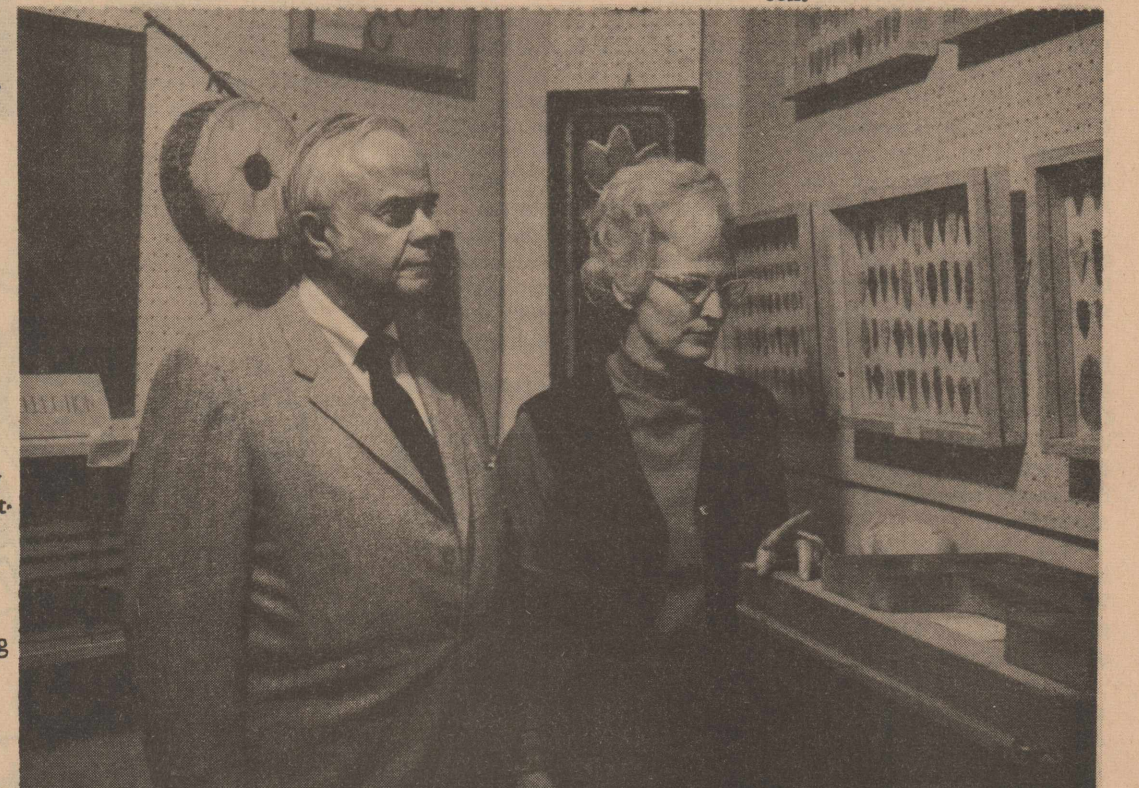
McCamey also scored in the waning moments of the game.

Ozona completed 5 out of thirteen attempts in passing and McCamey was 1 for 10. The Lions intercepted 2 passes and lost two fumbles while McCamey intercepted no passes and lost three fumbles.

Telephone Rates For Ozona Go Up In Dec.

General Telephone of the Southwest has officially announced an increase in local telephone service rates in Ozona.

Jack Goss, division manager from San Angelo stated that the increases are needed to allow General Telephone to earn a fair and reasonable return upon local investment, enabling the company to keep pace with customer needs.

This is the first increase in local rates in Ozona since 1959.

Goss said utility companies are major victims of inflation and as an industry have lagged substantially behind in adjusting prices to offset rapidly increasing costs. He added that utilities, unlike other companies and businesses are not free to adjust prices immediately each time a higher cost of operation is incurred.

"In fact we are generally granted increases only after a considerable time has elapsed since the higher costs were incurred," Goss said.

"Customers may notice telephone increases more because they sometimes occur in large increments. However, other items and services often have increased as much or more but in small amounts at more frequent intervals - thus slipping by unnoticed."

Goss explained the company must earn a fair return on their investment or people will not invest their savings. This results in either a higher cost of capital, or unavailability of capital to carry on construction programs necessary to provide acceptable service.

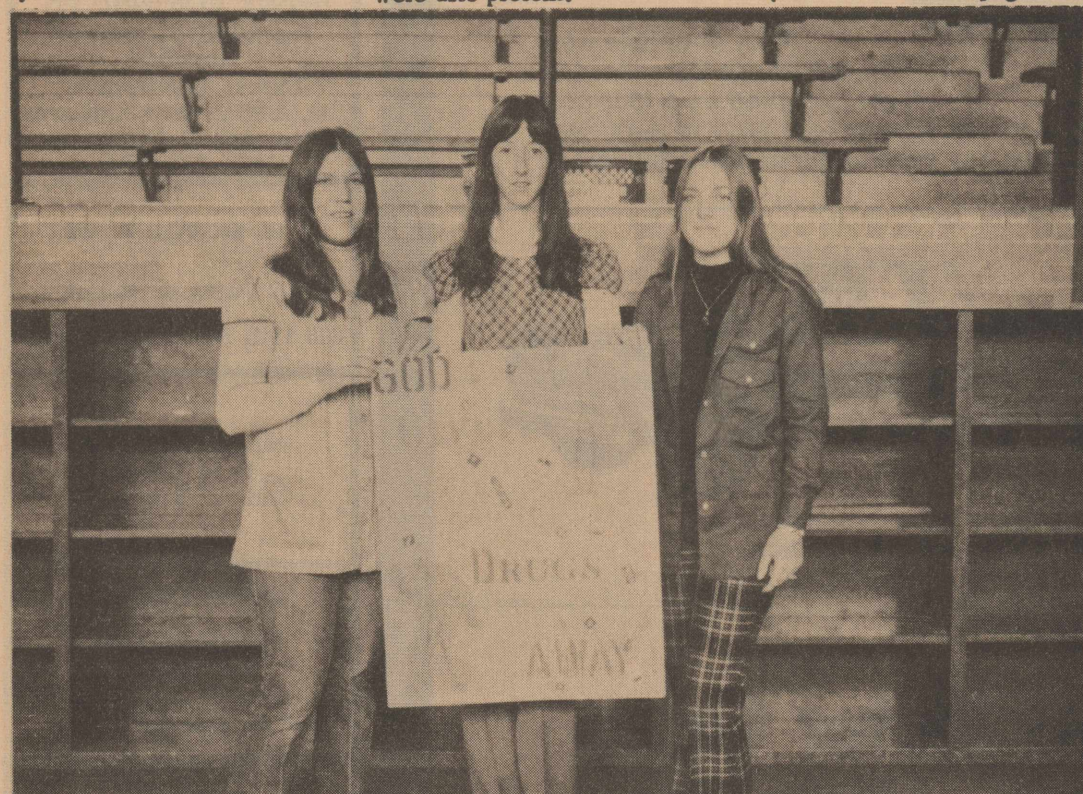
Pecos Services Last Week For Ozonan's Father

Special Fuel Users Permits To Be Issued Here Dec. 13

The regular session of the 62nd Legislature amended Subchapter B of Chapter 10 to make it possible for farmers and ranchers to obtain Special Farm User Permits effective September 1, 1971. This enabled users of LPG (butane) to pay in advance the State tax of 5¢ per gallon on 100 gallons per month, or 1200 gallons per year. It also allowed the user to use the mileage factor of 12½ miles to the gallon of butane.

The decals may be secured from the different district offices of the Comptroller of Public Accounts. Each year since the effective date, beginning September 1, 1971, the San Angelo District Office has scheduled representatives to be in different towns and cities within its fifteen county district. The same procedure will be followed for the acquisition of new and/or renewal decals for 1973. According to the statute it is necessary that a representative of the Comptroller's office attach the decal to the vehicle, at which time certain information is required to be shown on the decal. The amendment also requires that the speedometer or hubometer be in working order at all times, and failure to adhere to this requirement subjects the user to a penalty.

The Comptroller's office has been assured by the Texas Butane Dealers Association that all the suppliers of butane will be informed as to the different places where the representatives will be, as well as the hours.

The decals may be secured in Crockett County in Ozona, Wednesday, December 13, from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., at the Courthouse.

In the event a user of butane does not obtain the decal from the representative at the designated places, he

will find it necessary to go to the district office of the Comptroller's office to obtain the decal. The address of the San Angelo District Office is 238 West Beauregard, San Angelo, Texas.

If the user has previously had a decal he has received a renewal notice. Such notice is needed to obtain the new 1973 decal.

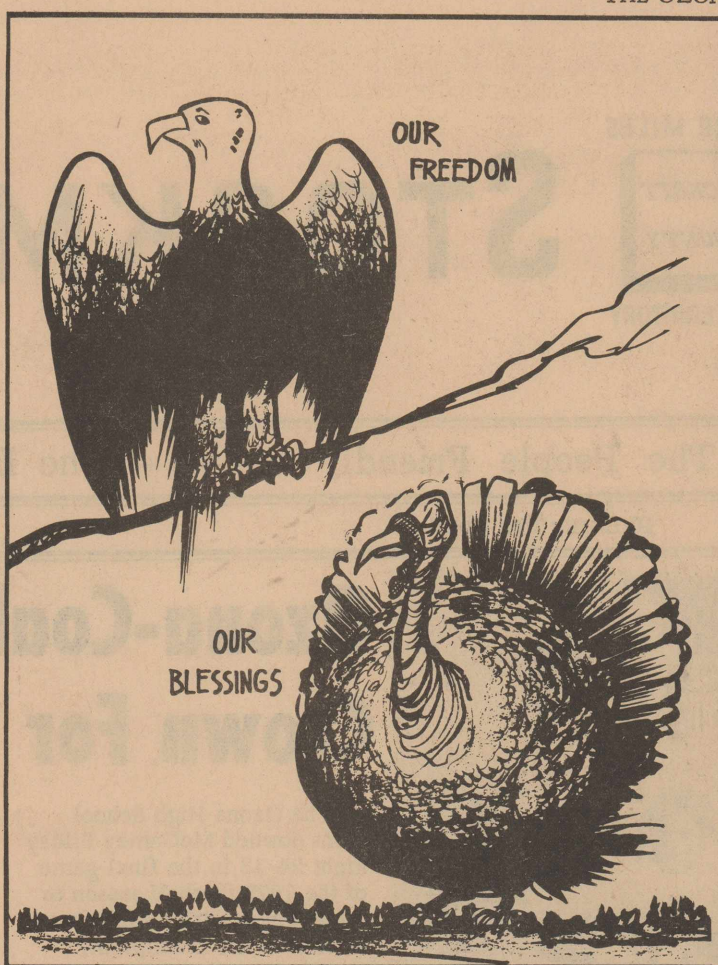
Purpose of the dinner was to recognize the part the school plays in the lives of Parish families and to express appreciation to the school personnel.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

This season should inspire beautifully planned table settings for your Thanksgiving dinner. For the center of interest design there are many colorful fall flowers, leaves, foliage branches, vegetables and accessories to use in your arrangement. Try it.

Last week Mrs. Gene Lilly presented such an informative paper on iris at the Garden Club meeting, members thought others would like to have this condensed information. If you haven't separated or planted your iris by now, you should do so at once or wait until after bloom next spring.

(IRIS)

Iris vary in height from dwarf kinds 5" to 6" tall to the tall bearded kind 20" to 48" in height. Iris are divided into two main sections those which grow from bulbs and others which have thick root-stokes or rhizomes. Iris with thick rhizomes consist of four different types: tall bearded, intermediate bearded, dwarf bearded and beardless. The beardless varieties need acid conditions to do their best. There are many miscellaneous iris but I am only going to discuss the most hardy and well

known ones. Bearded: These iris are the easiest to grow and will give good results. They will grow well in nearly any soil. Sandy soils are the poorest for iris culture. Plant rhizomes deep in sandy soil and high in heavy soil. They need good drainage and normal irriga-

tion, but not as much as you would give a lawn. Plant in full sun. Do not shade by interplanting closely with annuals. Clip off dead foliage but do not cut foliage back in summer. The bearded are heavy feeders. Work manure or chemical fertilizers into beds before planting or between the rows of established plants but avoid contact. Right after bloom is the most important feeding time. A super phosphate dressing is good. Later in the winter you can add wood ashes. You can extend the blooming season of your bearded iris by planting the intermediate iris. They bloom at or near tulip time after the dwarf. The lilliput bloom early after the dwarf and before the intermediate. The best time to plant the bearded is July to September. Plant flat and only half covered. They need to be sunbaked to produce the maximum blooms.

Spuria: The spuria bloom in late spring toward the end of the iris season in most areas. The spurias are easy to grow and not overly demanding. Plant in the spring and plant the rhizomes immediately on arrival and keep quite moist until established. They must not dry out at this time. They must have good drainage and

full sun. Spurias are hardy in coldest areas but must have summer heat to bloom well. Leave clump undisturbed for years. They are excellent for corsages and cut for arrangements.

Louisiana iris: These iris have some problems in the colder areas but do well from Oklahoma south and along the moderate coastal country. They have a wide tolerance culturally. They will grow in standing water or in regular garden conditions. Irrigation sufficient for annuals is enough but must have acid bed, light shade is advantageous in the south.

The bulbous iris are the Dutch, Spanish and English Bulbous iris: and they bloom in that order. They multiply so rapidly that

their numbers increase each year. The blooms resemble the orchid. Colors range from pure white through golden yellow to corn flower blue, dark violet and deep purple. They are excellent for cutting, stand a lot of handling and last even longer when put in water. They need sunny location with fairly good drainage and they do best in acid soil. In England they are known as "The Poor Man's Orchid" due to their fragile beauty. Plant them 3" to 4" deep and 6" apart. October and November are good months for planting. The Dutch are the best known and most vigorous. The Spanish bloom in a wide range of colors and have distinct grasslike foliage. The English have the largest bulbs and flowers but are the least hardy. Blue is the main color of the English type and yellows are found only in the Spanish and Dutch.

To grow spuria, Siberian and Japanese iris in Ozona you would need only to make an acid bed. Now to make an acid bed you should dig or turn soil one shovel depth. Work in manure, straw, peat moss or compost while loosening the soil. Now for every 100 sq. ft. of bed add one pound of soil sulphur and work it in. It is best to let this lay for two or three weeks - keeping it moist before planting. If the plants show a tendency to yellow after they have started to grow, give them a light dressing of nitrogen - any kind. Feed twice a year with acid camillia food.

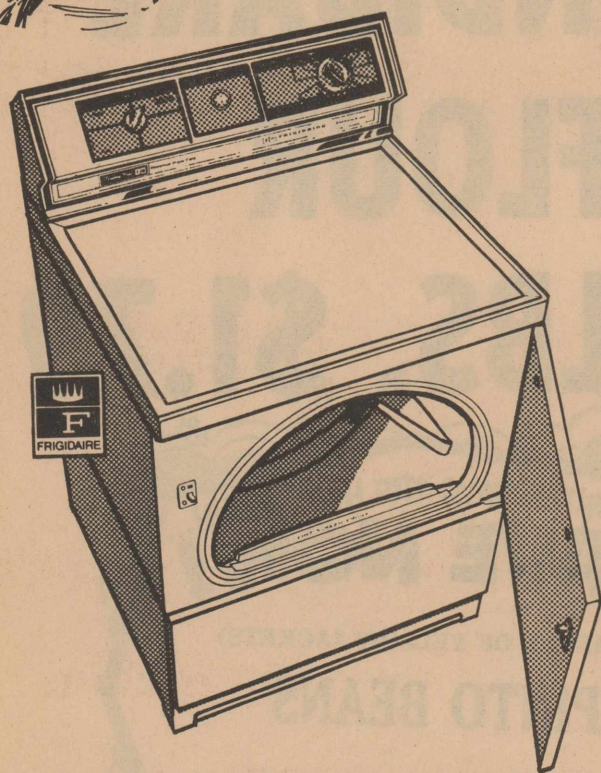

a constant watch on the earning trends and to apply promptly for increases where the rate of return falls below a fair and reasonable level," he stated.

"After all other possible ways to improve the rate of return by reducing costs and achieving greater efficiencies have been fully utilized, a utility has no alternative but to seek a repricing of its services.

"Obviously, we are just as unhappy as the public when this becomes necessary, but if we were to do otherwise, we would be defaulting on our obligation to provide adequate service to the public," Goss stated.

The new rates, to become effective with the December bills are:

Business one party, \$14.10.
Business two party, \$12.10.
Business extension, \$1.75
Residence one party, \$5.75.
Residence two party \$4.80.
Residence extension, \$1.25;
Rural business multiparty, \$12.10.
Rural residence multiparty \$5.00.
Semipublic, \$14.10.

Goss said the proposed rates are in compliance with the price commission criteria for public utility price increase.

Criteria an increase must meet include that it is cost-justified and does not reflect future inflationary expectations; it is the minimum required to assure continued, adequate and safe service or it is needed to provide for expansion to meet future requirements; and it will achieve the minimum rate of return needed to attract capital at reasonable costs
