REAP Abolished From ASCS Work For Year 1973

The Rural Environmental Assistance Program, a federal program administered locally by the ASCS office, has been cancelled, according to a directive received by C. W. Elder, county executive director of the Crockett-Sutton counties ASCS.

Elder received the notification Friday after a story on ASCS work for ranchers appeared in the Stockman last Thursday.

The program, commonly known as REAP, provided for various well drilling and brush control measures up to \$500 per ranch in Crockett county and \$400 per ranch in Sutton.

The notification received by the local office Friday notified ranchers that this part of the ranch improvement work would not be subsidized by the federal government in the year 1973 and had been cut from the ASCS program.

Local Woman And Grandson Buried On Christmas Day

Funeral services for Mrs. Hilario Cortez and her grandson, Mario Flores, about 3 years, were held on Christmas Day from Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church with Father James Plegans officiating. Burial was in Lima Cemetery.

Both Mrs. Cortez, 74, and the little boy were killed in a head-on crash about four miles north of Big Lake Dec. 23 around 9:30 p.m. The boy was dead at the scene and Mrs. Cortez died four hours later in the hospital in Big Lake.

Mrs. Cortez was born October 15, 1898 in Ozona and had lived in Ozona all her life. The Flores boy was also born in Ozona, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mario Flores. Also injured in the wreck were Mr. and Mrs. Valentin Flores Jr., Hilario Cortez, Mr. and Mrs. Mario Flores and Arturo Robeles, all of Ozona. Mrs. Mario Flores and Arturo Robeles were transferred to a San Angelo hospital while the others were treated and released at Big Lake.

Survivors of Mrs. Cortez were her husband, and four daughters, Mrs. Juan Tijerina, Mrs. Inez Ybarra, Mrs. Gertrudes Enriquez, and Mrs. Valentin Flores Jr., 26 grandchildren and 36 great grandchildren.

American Quasar Petroleum Co., Midland, will drill an 8,000 foot Pennsylvania wildcat in Crockett County, 14 miles east-southeast of Ozona, 4 1/2 miles east of a dual producer in the DePaul (Strawn) and 7,890 Pennsylvania gas producer in the Davidson Ranch multipay field and 23/4 miles north of the one-well Angus (Strawn gas) field. It is the No. 1-38 Jones Ranch.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and west lines of 38-J-TV TCRR.

Gene Lilly is the owner of Lilly Welding and Construction Co. here in Ozona while his brother, Dr. Bill Lilly, is a veterinarian in Las Vegas. The brothers own a grocery store in San Saba also.

Mrs. Smith was found dead at her home Saturday morning and apparently died from a heart attack Friday night. She was born March 7, 1901 in Stephenville and was a retired school teacher. She had been a resident of Ozona since 1924. She was married to U. S. "Rusty" Smith May 27, 1926 in Stephenville. He served as county commissioner for many years before his death in 1970.

Phone Customers To Receive One % Tax Decrease

Telephone customers may notice a one per cent decrease in their telephone bills in January. The reduction is the first scheduled step to eliminate the Federal Excise Tax paid by telephone customers and collected by telephone companies on telephone service, reducing it from 10 per cent to 9 per cent during 1973.

Cooke has been removed from the critical list at Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. The driver of the other pickup suffered numerous cuts and bruises. Both vehicles were totally demolished in the head on crash. Complete details were not available.

Crockett County Pipeline System Changes Owners

Tomlinson Oil Co. of Wichita, Kans. and Fossil Energies, Inc. of Midland, have announced the purchase of the 17-mile pipeline system which serves the Adams-Baggett (Canyon gas) field in Crockett County, 25 miles south-southeast of Ozona. It was purchased from Aztec Gas Systems, Inc. of Corpus Christi, and others for an undisclosed consideration.

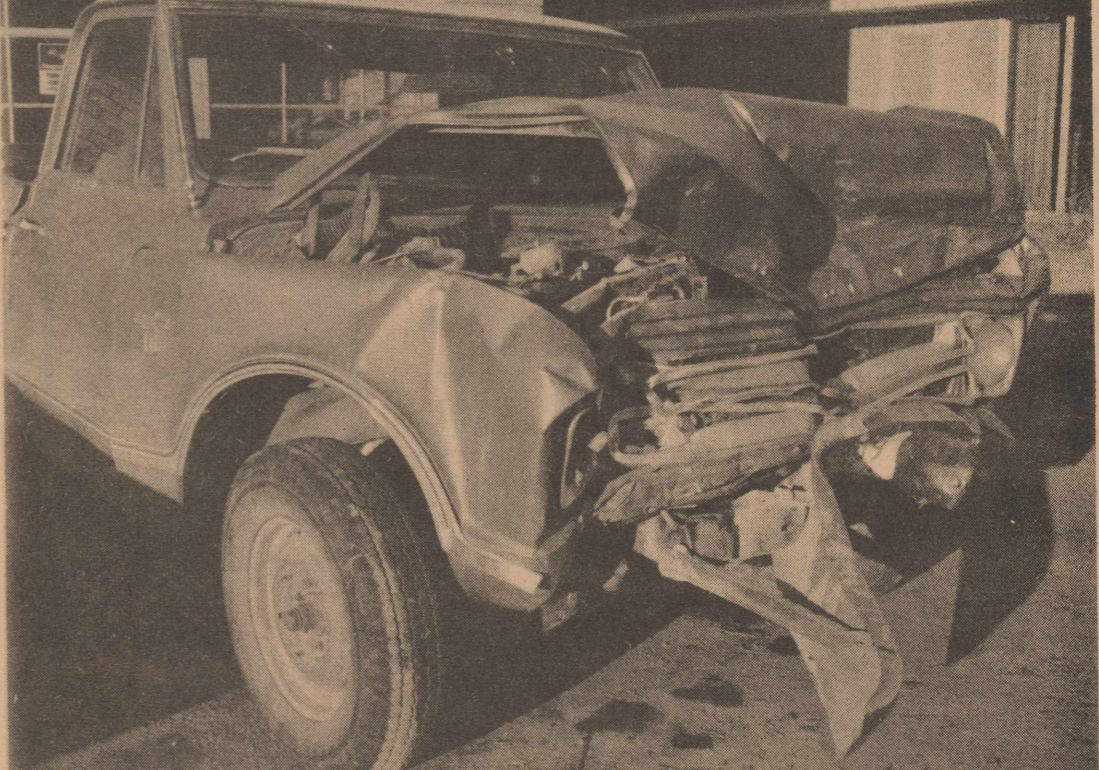
The system will receive gas from 23 wells with an estimated potential of 10 million cubic feet of gas daily. It will be delivered to Coastal States Gas Producing Co. The gas is wet and the purchasers plan to build a gas-plant early in 1973. The system will be operated by Fossil Energies.

"WHERE DID WE GO WRONG?"

Parents who find that their children are using drugs often ask themselves this question. Social workers tell them that it is not their fault. But, says a Stanford University research team, it usually is their fault.

Their study of 101 families picked at random indicates that "permissive" families are more likely to have drug problems. The researchers, who describe themselves as "more or less permissive," broke down the probability of drug use into 39 high-risk, 29 moderate-risk and 33 low-risk families.

The low-risk ones tended to venerate God, country and family. Discipline and obedience were stressed, as was parental guidance in choosing friends, food and bedtime. These families had fewer pill and medicine bottles around, and fewer liquor bottles.

High-risk families, "fine people" says the report, valued family life little and usually had servants to care for the children. Freedom without guidance was the prevailing attitude toward the young ones. High-risk families had less religion but more alcohol, pills and speeding tickets.

"Just let the kiddies grow" was the prevailing high-risk attitude. This does not work for flowers, corn or money, says one scientist, and "it certainly doesn't work with children." Of the growing tendency of liberal parents to permit children to learn for themselves, trying LSD or marijuana for example, one psychologist says: "That can be costly for the child." It can kill him.

New Year's Eve Party For 4-ers

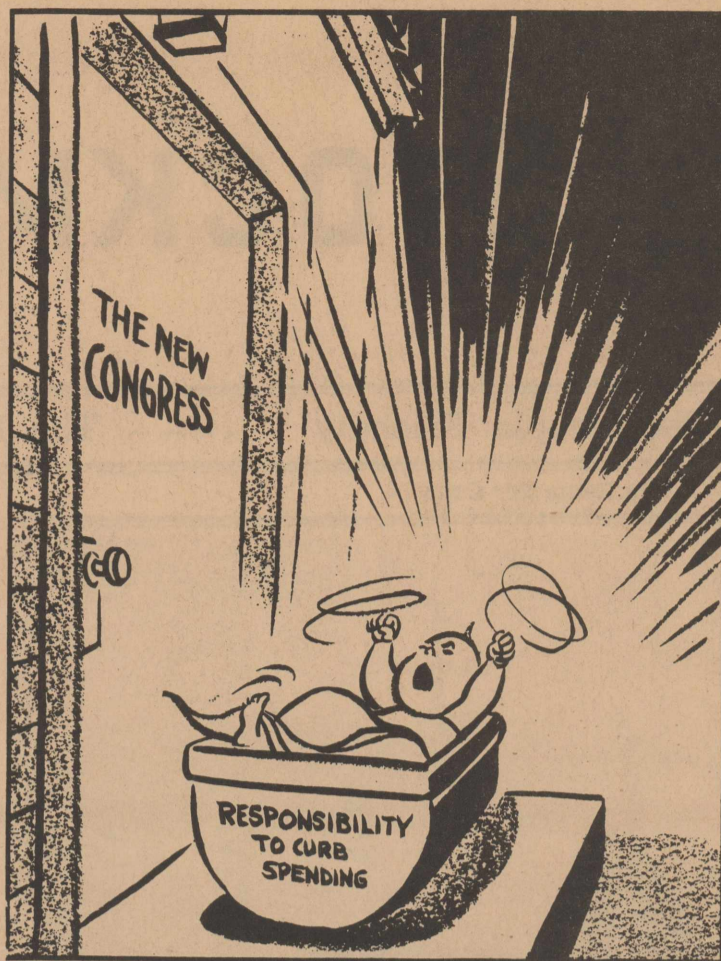

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

Another new year to begin early gardening in order to have a productive and beautiful garden throughout the entire year is upon us, so make your plans now.

The attractive new catalogs from seed and nursery houses have so many new and interesting varieties of plants, trees and flowers, it will take time and planning to select those you need and may want to try.

Few practices promote good gardening more than having beds and borders spaded and manured well in advance of planting time. Our soil can be a problem or it can be productive; humus is the key. Fertilizer can be added quickly without disturbing established plants, but it is difficult to add humus to old flower beds when it has been used up. So now is the time to add good compost around established plants. Work it in liberally where no roots will be disturbed. You can start now when the soil is dry enough between rains or waterings if it remains dry.

To remind you again, winter planting of most deciduous shrubs, trees and fruits is best. Setting plants well ahead of time and warming weather allows them to develop strong roots before hot days begin, which is sometimes early in our area. There are a few exceptions - figs, fruiting pomegranates, banana shrubs, loquat and the large leaf evergreens should be planted after the threat of hard freezes has passed.

Finish pruning grapevines and other fruit trees well in advance of new growth beginning. Also those shrubs that bloomed in late summer should be pruned between now and the end of February. This will encourage thicker and prettier flowering in the summer flowering abelia, althea, butterfly bush, crepe myrtle, elaeagnus, flowering willow, vitex, salt cedar, mallow hibiscus and oleanders.

The three new All-America roses are "Medallion," a hybrid tea medium large delicate apricot; "Gypsy," hybrid tea in dazzling orange-red, and "Electron," hybrid tea, rose-pink flower well perfumed.

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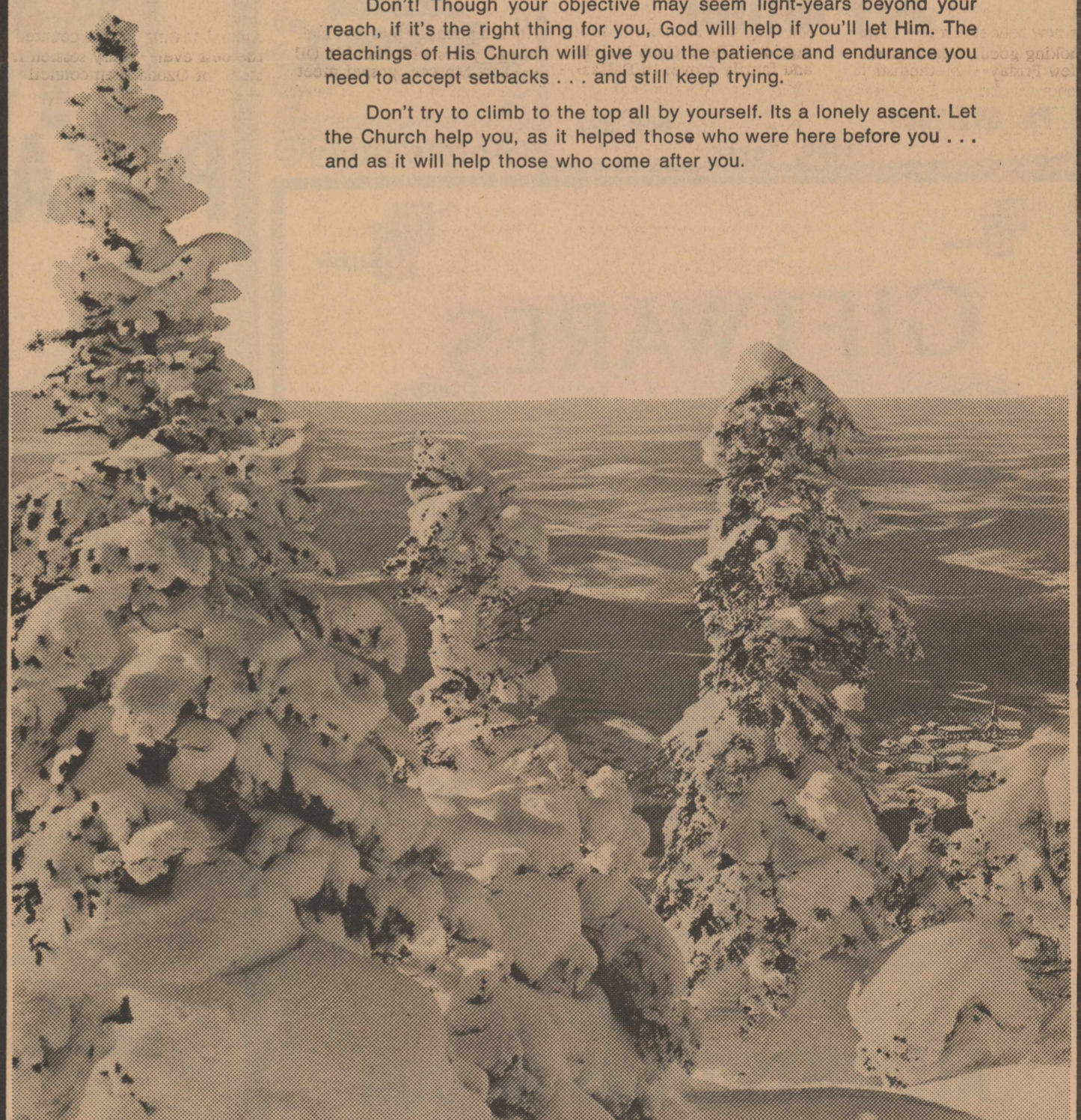
