# **Commissioners Vote Blanket** Pay Hike For Elected Officials

Salary raises for elected county officials was the final item on the agenda when the Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday. However, that item will most likely rank highest on the agenda of the county taxpayers.

The court gave unanimous approval to a \$2,850 per year salary raise for the Commissioners of Precincts 1, 2, 3, and 4, raising their present salary of \$4,350 to \$7,200 per annum. According to County Judge Troy Williams, the four commissioners justified the large proposed raise by contending that although they only meet once a month in regular session, hardly a day passes without their being called out on county business of some sort.

Other proposed salary raises went to county officials who are maintained in offices in the courthouse or annex and spend their working days in office. Proposed raises include

The pay increases will be set officially at the next meeting of the court February 12, barring protest from voters who might attend the meet-

ing for the purpose, or written protest to county officials. Legal notice appears in another part of the paper expressly to notify the public of the court's intention.

In business preceeding the salary raise proposal, regular monthly reports were received including a year-end report from the hospital. The report revealed that Crockett County taxpayers lost a total of \$92,000 on the hospital operation for the year just ended. However, \$14,000 of that amount went to capital improvements.

A letter from J. A. Snell, District Engineer with the Texas State Highway Department was read asking that the county vacate the properties needed for IS 10 by March 1, 1973. The court voted to ask for a six-months extension, due to slow progress on work for the new facilities.

The court voted to install red blinker lights at the intersection of Ave G and 5th Street and Ave. G and 6th

Road employees were voted a \$25 per month each raise, and the court voted to purchase 2 new motor graders with surplus road and bridge funds.

The second federal revenue sharing check in the amount of \$39, 500 was placed on a six-months CD with the first check.

County Judge Troy William. reported that the County can not build a Nursing Home, as such, according to statutes. However, the county is allowed to build an addition to the hospital for the purpose of using it as a nursing home.

This development renders the petition for a bond election. circulated in the spring, void. A new petition will be circulated this weekend and after the statutory 10% of registered voters have signed it, the court will take action on calling an election.

In other action, the court amended precinct lines to place Ozona Intermediate School in Precinct 2 in order that Precinct 2 elections may be held in the school building. Also, the petition of Southwest Microwave, Inc. for a 15year non-exclusive franchise in. Crockett County was approved.

# **Early Ozona Reflected** In Museum Collection

Crockett County Museum had it's beginning thanks to school Superintendent C. S. Denham in the 1930's. He set aside a class room in the high school and gathered together early day county artifacts.

In 1958, Judge Houston Smith, the county judge at that guns and a few relics of the time, found room for a museum in the basement of the Courthouse Annex. The museum is still housed there. The artifacts were moved and set up by a committee of interested especially collected Indian local citizens.

The museum is under the sponsorship of the Crockett County Historical Society, with a board appointed from members of the society. It is financed through dues, contributes to the support.

The museum has out grown itself in the last few years. Museum officials are living for the day they can move into new and larger quarters.

No one could figure out exactly why the mirror had fallen. Nevertheless the diner, painfully injured, filed a lawsuit for damages against the hotel. "He has no case," the man-

agement argued in court. "He

cannot point to any specific thing we did wrong." But the court upheld the man's

"Mirrors do not ordinarily fall off walls," reasoned the court, "unless someone is negligent."



The court was invoking a famous legal doctrine known as res ipsa loquitur—"the thing speaks for itself." This doctrine is widely used when there is no direct, eyewitness evidence of an act of negligence. Weighing the odds, the law decides that an act of negligence — even though unseen probably did occur.

Thus: Using res ipsa loquitur, a court found negligence when a car, parked on a steep slope, started to roll downhill. Chances were good, said the court, that the driver had neglected to set his brakes and cramp his front wheel against the curb.

Also using res ipsa loquitur, another court found negligence when a housewife encountered a piece of glass in a newly opened can of spinach. Chances were good, said the court, that someone in the canning factory had

#### Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Our first snow last Wednesday morning was a little late for Christmas, but it left our city in a fairy land dress for a few hours. I've never seen such a beautiful fall of snow, as though each flake was placed perfectly.

During the next month or two you may be looking for an accent for your hall, living room, or den to brighten up for gloomy days. There are many attractive foliage plants that will do just that if properly chosen and given a minimum of care.

The most important consideration is the selecting a plant that will adapt to the indoor environment. Some that are well suited are the miniature palms, ferns, scheffleras, dracalnas, philoclembrons dieffenbachias and the cordyline austrabs, which gives

a tropicla, palm like effect. It is best to buy these already large enough to be attractive for the place selected. They can be held at the proper size for several years by manipulating growing conditions.

Too much water is probably the greatest single cause for lack of success with indoor plants, so give them just enough to keep them alive and

Also, keep foliage plants out of direct sunlight and away from heating and cooling vents. Feeding plants with a liquid fertilizer every three to six months should be sufficient.

After poinsettias are through blooming, their stems are shortened somewhat and the plants are stored in a dry, cool place to rest. Dry completely and lay on their sides under a bench or in a place

where the temperature is 55-60 degree.

If you haven't watered shrubs small trees and grass lately, this should be done before another severe freeze, for roots are damaged if too dry.



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
