Well, the court meeting has come and gone, and the citizens and the members of the court were evidently operating on different wave lengths.

The members of the court honestly think their raises are essential to good county government, and the opinion of the general public is exactly opposite.

Guess the county judge summed it up pretty good when he said "If the people don't like the way we are running the court, they can always vote us out." I won't be the least bit surprised if that very thing happens.

At the moment I am wondering if the elaborate nursing home wing which is being put to a vote soon is not a bit extravagant. I also wonder if those pushing it have really studied the feasibility of such a plan.

With the hospital operating at a considerable loss each year, I can't help but think that a facility twice the size might incur twice the loss.

I am also curious about the staffing of such a facility. If we find it hard to staff our small hospital, what would we run into with this proposed half-million dollar project?

Even though the court has asked for a revised plan calling for deletion of 24 beds from the original plan, or twelve rooms, this still leaves 37 beds to be filled.

When I discovered that no survey had been taken locally, and that experts in the field had not been consulted, I took it upon myself to check with some experts on the subject and the things I found out in such a short span of time amazed and confused me.

Amazed me, because I could not for the life of me understand why these things had not already been looked into, and confused me because I couldn't for the life of me understand why those with the good of the community in mind did not take the time and effort to discover and present the facts.

Surveys indicate that with the population in Crockett County, a 12-bed facility would be ample, and probably more than adequate for years to come. Other facts about geriatrics wings or nursing homes indicate that people who are able to use recreation facilities and go to chapel do not make their homes in these facilities.

One knowledgeable person suggested that a 12-bed wing be built onto the existing structure with room to expand if necessary. This has not been brought up to my knowledge.

True, Crockett County is rich with oil taxes and other natural endowments, but as we all know natural resources are used up in a span of time and something must give.

## Gas And Oil Activity Increases In Most Crockett County Fields

Heavy activity has been reported recently in Crockett County oil and gas fields, no doubt due to the nationwide energy crisis. Producers have been completed almost daily with other locations set.

An unidentified Permian discovery, Clearfork of Sprberry, was indicated in Crockett County with the flowing of gas at the rate of 400,000 cubic feet daily and the recovery of 400 feet of 35 gravity oil and 81 feet of heavily oil- and gas-cut mud on a drillstem test at Henderson & Erickson, Midland, No. 1 C. W. Meadows, in 7-QR-D&SE, three miles southwest of Ozona, 1 1/2 mile north-northeast of the four-well Clearfork area of the Ozona, Southwest multipay field, but separated by a 3,400-foot Clearfork failure and three miles northwest of the Sprayberry oil opener and five miles northwest of the lower Permian gas opener in the two-well Ozona, South field.

Gas surfaced in five minutes, flowing at the above rate on the 54-minute test taken at 3,319-333 feet.

Flowing pressure was 93-1,506 pounds; 30-minute initial and 1 1/2-hour final shut-in pressures were 1,064 pounds.

Contract depth is 3,800 feet.

Clearfork production in the Ozona, Southwest field is at 3,338 feet.

Clearfork gas production was extended 3/8 mile west in the V. I. P. (Clearfork oil and gas) field of Crockett County with completion of Gulf Oil Corp. No. 1-A V. I. Pierce, 19 miles south of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open

flow of 3.5 million cubic feet of gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 2,182-199 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons and fractured with 20,000 gallons and 20,000 pounds of sand.

Drilled to 6,500 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing is set, it is plugged back to 6,461 feet. Dual completion as a Canyon gas producer in the Ozona field is scheduled.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 3,800 feet from the east lines of 105-WC-H. C. Fryer.

Delta Suburban, Odessa, will drill the No. 1-A Meybin, a 7,890 Pennsylvanian gas test, in the Davidson Ranch multipay field of Crockett County, 3/4 mile northwest of the nearest producer, which is a dual producer in the DePaul (Strawn gas) field 7 1/2 miles southeast of Ozona.

Location is 760 feet from the north and 2,280 feet from the West lines of 34-KL-GC&SF. Contract depth is 8,250 feet; ground elevation, 2,428 feet.

Members of the Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday morning in the district courtroom, and heard protests from a group of citizens concerning the proposed raises for the commissioners and the county judge. The court was also presented with petitions protesting the salary raises. After members of the group spoke to the court, County Judge Troy Williams spoke on behalf of the proposed raises, and said he felt they were justified. In his position,

he said that holding the office of county judge had been a financial hardship both on his ranching operations and his private law practice.

Speaking for the court, Commissioner Bill Black said he felt the raises were justified because of the extra work the commissioners were called on to do throughout the month. He made a point of assuring the group that the court did not spend only one day per month at their jobs, but had county business to attend to

almost every day. The other three commissioners were in agreement.

The raises passed as proposed later in the meeting. Commissioner Jesse Marley made a motion that the raises be made official and asked the other members of the court to make it unanimous, which they did.

Made official was a raise for the office of Justice of the Peace from \$4,260 to \$5,400; the sheriff's salary was raised from \$9,300 to \$12,150; county judge from \$6,750 to \$9,600; commissioners in all precincts were raised from \$4,350 to \$7,200, and county treasurer from \$4,800 to \$6,000. All salaries to be paid from the Tax Funds of Crockett County.

Rev. John Berkley, who first petitioned the court for a nursing home for the county a year ago, presented petitions with 308 signatures requesting the court to call a bond election for the building of a geriatrics wing on the existing hospital building.

John Chiles Allen, Austin architect, presented an elaborate new floor plan for the proposed wing. The plan as presented called for a 61-bed facility, complete with patios, nourishment center, chapel, nurses' station, recreation area. The plan called for an estimated cost of \$450,000, without furnishings.

The court asked for a deletion of 24 beds, or a 12-room wing. The estimated cost of this plan would be \$380,000. Added to this cost would be furnishings, equipment, and architectural fees.

The court posted a notice, as required by law, to have a meeting Monday, Feb. 19, to call a bond election and set the date for same.

Routine reports from the hospital and Civic Center boards were received. New members on the hospital board are Mrs. Tom Mitchell, Mrs. Joe Bean and Mrs. Gene Lilly.

Bids were opened at 2:00 p. m. for the purchase of two graders. Three competitive bids were presented and discussed at length. The court will award the purchase contract at the Monday meeting. Jack Gillet presented bids for a new asphalt storage tank, new gasoline tanks and pumps.

In other action, the Ozona National Bank was approved as depository for county funds and school funds for the next two years.

The county judge read a letter from J. A. Snell, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, granting an extension until July 22, for moving the road department facilities.

## Blizzard Conditions In Ozona Thursday

A February blizzard hit Ozona early last Thursday with heavy snowfall, sleet, and an icy wind making hazardous conditions anywhere outside one's own home.

Several inches of snow fell during the day, covering the town and drifting up to several feet on highways and roads out of town.

A north wind sent snowflakes and sleet on a parallel route and visibility was considerably reduced. The high for the day was 22 degrees and the chill factor was -23.

The storm continued unabated throughout the day and

into the night, causing the closing of the Ozona School System, a most unusual occurrence.

Many travelers were stranded in Ozona and by midafternoon traffic had slowed to an occasional heavy truck. Even trucks were not making very good time through the area.

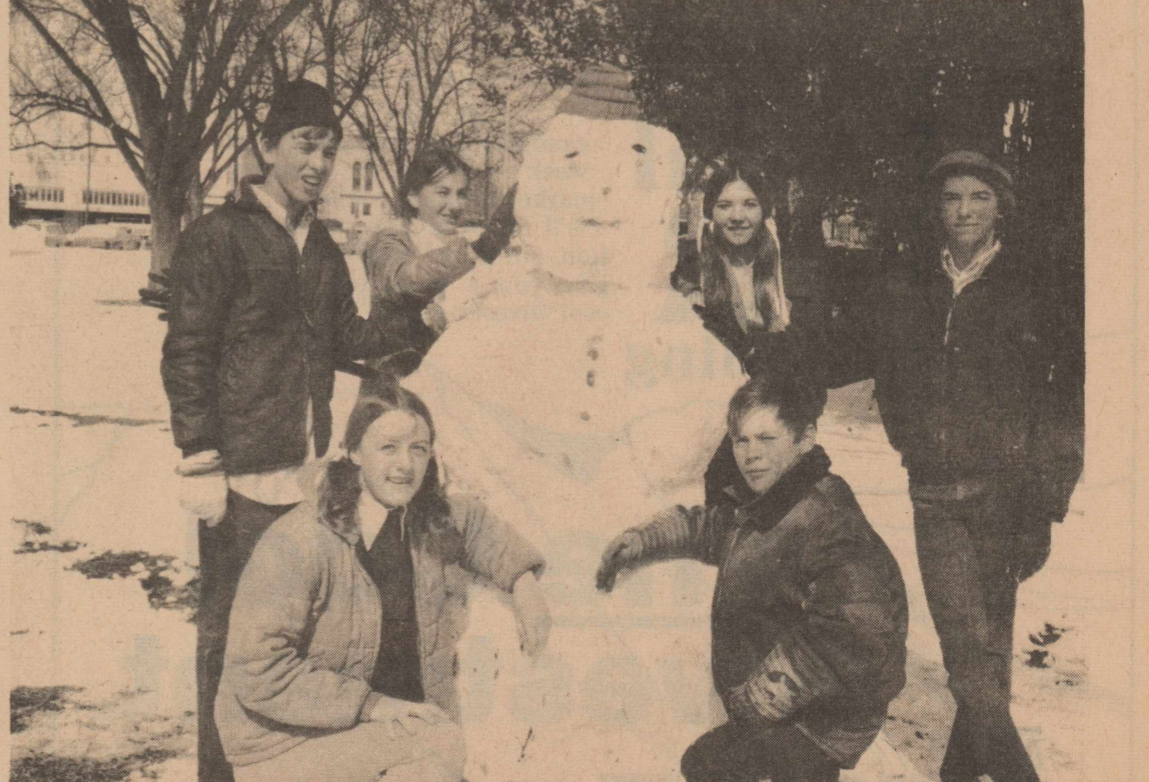
The sheriff's department reported 45 vehicles stalled on Lancaster Hill west of Ozona on Hwy 290, during Thursday evening and night.

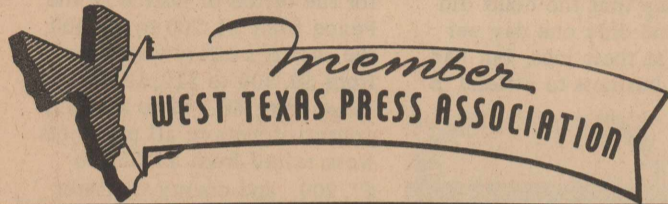

### POLITICS INTO MENTAL WARFARE

When does politics become mental warfare?

When it departs from its function of regulating or seeking to regulate the affairs of government, and enters upon a course of trying to confuse and harass the public mind. When that happens, the political agencies involved have departed from the high purpose of public activity for the public good, and they have embarked upon a course that in the long run must be harmful.

Let us make clear here what we mean. When a molder of public opinion -- that is, a person or an organization, corporate or otherwise -- finds his country, the United States, consistently wrong in foreign affairs over the period of many years, no matter what Administration is in power, something is amiss. A reasonable finding, then, is that the United States can do no right. In that case, where does the citizen turn?

If he has not been so completely befuddled as to be unable to make a decision, he will test the views of the mental warriors against his own solid common sense. For the argument that the United States is always wrong and that it must seek to do penance for the alleged wrongs it has inflicted upon the world is dangerous. It would keep the Government and the public on the defensive and in a condition of added inability to act.

That is politics transformed into mental warfare. It is something to be detected whenever it appears. It is not a matter to be debated; it should be shunned and rejected. It does not improve our condition; it degrades and injures.

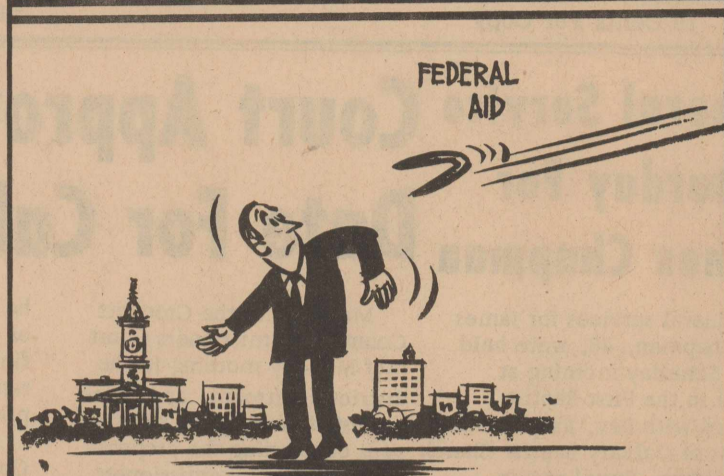
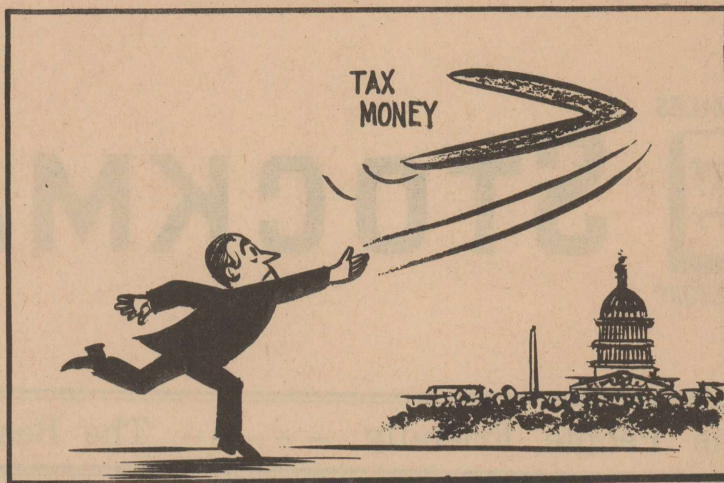

### Washington News Letter

The Congress is moving slowly in organizing its work for the 93rd Congress. Party-wise, there were relatively few changes in the party line-ups in the House and Senate as a result of the Nov. 7 election. In the House, Democrats lost 12 seats to Republicans, and in the Senate the Democrats gained two seats, giving the majority party there 56 seats and the Republicans 43. The House Democrats now have a net majority of 53.

The battle of the budget will enjoy priority of attention during this session, and the House Ways & Means Committee will begin hearings of broad tax reform on Feb. 26. It is estimated the latter will consume at least three months, perhaps more.

Crime gets close to home at times. Although Washington, D. C., has more policemen per capita than other American cities, the net reduction in major crimes has been reduced only 10 to 15 percent during the past year.

An example of how thrill-killers operate occurred on the evening of January 30, when two young Negro thugs robbed Senator John Stennis of 25 cents, his billfold, a wristwatch and a Phi Beta Kappa key as he alighted from his car in front of his Washington home.

After the robbery, with no resistance, was completed one of the robbers said: "Now we're going to shoot you," and fired two shots into the Senator's left chest and stomach, and one of the robbers was heard to boast, "We got him!"

They got away, and an intensive investigation is in

progress. Senator Stennis, after 6 hours of surgery, is at the time of this writing--three days later--still alive. It happened that about 40 minutes before the robbery I stood alongside the Mississippi Senator in a receiving line at the National Guard Association's Washington headquarters where Guardsmen, including Adjutant Generals from the 50 States, were assembled for a social hour. --0--

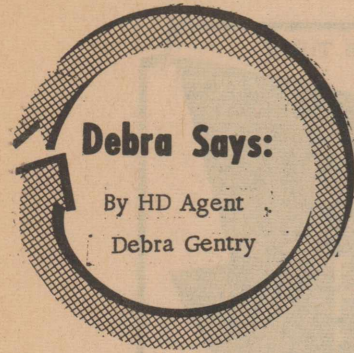

Educationally the first few months of life are almost as important as the early school years. So parents should help baby to learn.

Babies learn by looking, listening, touching, tasting, and feeling. They learn by exploring, watching you and imitating what you do. We now know that babies learn most when they're moved about and held.

The first thing a baby learns to do is look. He learns this during the first three months of life. Since he learns by looking, give him something to see.

Hang a mobile over his crib, or suspend one from the light fixture in the room where he spends most of his time. Make one by hanging magazine pictures, scraps of old material, old costume jewelry and other interesting household items from a clothes hanger. Be certain, however, that it's high enough to be out of his grasp.

Easier still, hang a shiny aluminum pie pan by his crib or a brightly colored picture or piece of fabric. Aluminum foil or bright paper crushed into a ball and hung where it can twist and turn will amuse him.

Anything bright and eye-catching that you can show him helps him learn about his world. Hold the baby in your lap, and let him play with different objects. Talk to him about what he's seeing. He won't understand now, but you'll soon find him listening ever so carefully.

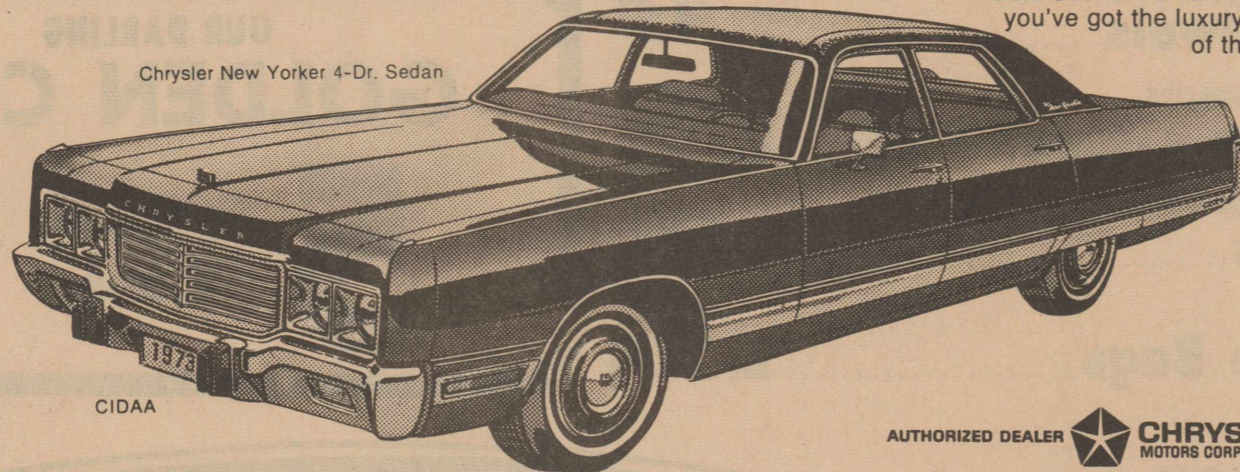

## Spring Fashions Feature Stripes And Separates

Spring's fashion separates will flaunt stripes, one authority predicted.

Marilyn Brown, consumer education-clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, indicated that much "stripe use" is due to versatility.

"Stripes can make almost any fashion statement from bold to quiet.

"Simply looking at the upcoming fashions, one would think that designers had spent time in old-fashioned prison garb," the specialist quipped. From pin stripes to racing stripes, designers are featuring them in vertical, horizontal and diagonal designs.

"Especially new for spring are the half-and-half treatments," Miss Brown continued. "Look for T-shirts seamed diagonally in half racing stripes and half solid color.

"Cardigan sweaters also are available in similar designs--such as one side striped and the other not. Sometimes panels of stripping are done against color panels."

Color schemes likewise vary from bold to quiet--from navy with bright yellow to lavender and white.

Classic combinations--navy and white, or red, navy and white--also appear in the season's garments, she concluded.

### Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

With another week of cold, snow and rain, very few days have been warm enough to make preparations for spring gardening.

If weather permits, all severe pruning of trees and shrubs should be finished this month. When transplanting trees or shrubs, prune the top growth to balance with the root system, which will suffer some shock from being disturbed and moved.

Even though we have had more severe cold days than usual, the spring flowering shrubs and trees are beginning to show buds growth. If you wish early spring blossoms, bring in a few of the budded branches, place in warm water to force bloom in a few weeks.

If any shrubs or trees are infested with scale or other insects, be sure to use dormant spray this month before new growth begins on the evergreens.

Check regularly all bulbs that are being stored. Remove any that show signs of rot promptly, or cut out the decayed part and dust with sulphur.

If you have cold frames or a protected place, they require very careful attention now. They can be put to good use now for growing plants of vegetables and flowers that will be needed for setting in the open ground later. Among these are tomatoes, peppers, onions, dahlias, verbenas, sabra, petunias, snapdragon, aster, colendolas, and many others.

Why not try climbing varieties of the hybrid tea roses if you don't have space for a rose bed. The climbers are profuse bloomers and much more vigorous than the bush rose. They are ideal sources for cut flowers, and can easily be grown against a fence or without support in a sunny location. Some of the best are: Don Juan (red), Climbing Peace, Charlotte Armstrong, Chrysler Imperial, Sutter's Gold, White Dawn, Crimson Glory, and the showy yellow Lady Banksia.

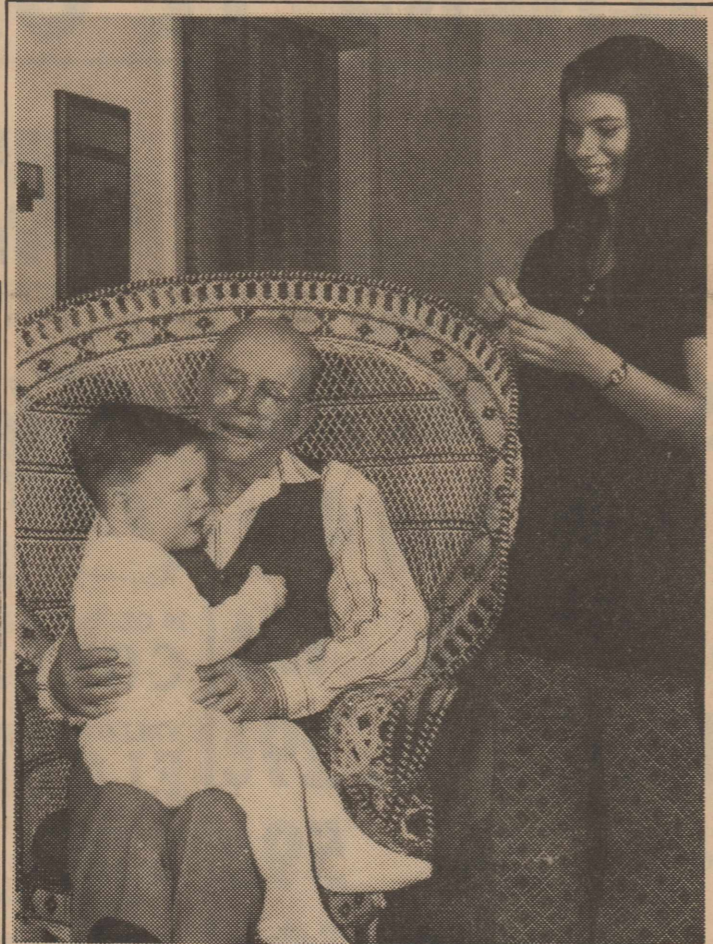

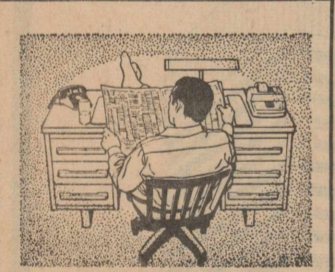

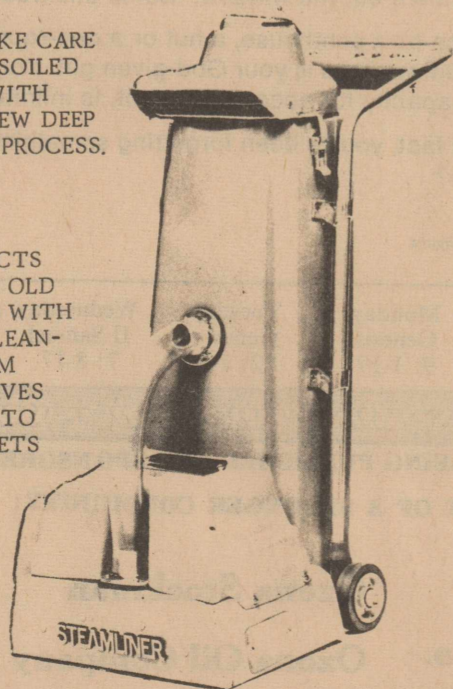
