## In Callahan County Would Build Up A Profitable Industry Thinks Mr. Armistead

Eleewhere President M. W. Armistead of the Callaban County Purebred Livestock Association, isues a call for a mase meeting of livestock men and othern of Callahan and Bastland Counties, at Cieco, on Saturday, January 6, to perfeet hyphenated Purehred Livestoek Association, with memberabip in both conaties, that the breed of cattle, horsess, boga, sheep, poultry ad other farm animals-not exeluding the dogs-may be improved and made a paying, instead of a los. ug propoation.
Mr. Armistead has had a wide experience and therefore speaks with authority. He sags:

There has been a great deal of ood accompliahed by the Callshan County Parehred Livestock Assocition in the firat year of ite exiasaco, white laboring under a greal dieadvantage; yet, we are gratified know that our work hae not been vain. We realize that such organizatione are new and uafamiliar the majority of those who need hem moot.

Misinformed pereons think this work is of no real besefit to them individually. It to like all other organizations which are perfected for the direct financial benefit not only of ite membership but, by examplo and results achieved, to interested outeidere, carrying with it, as it does, all the pleasure of association with aeighbors and feltow citizens, or one common cause, and that the raising of more and better purebred livestook.
"It might be intereatiag to know that wo have in Kaotland and Callahas Conaties approsimately 4500 farme asd on these farme there is leas than five per cent of purebred dairy cattle; hence, leaving 95 per cent of the milk produciag terde the very commonest kind of scrub cathle or milking purposes. The direct profte from these herds would lack at least fifty per cent of paying the cost of maintenance.
' It matters not whether the product derived fromench herds is used or home ues or commercial purposes; as far as the upseep is ece. corned the difference can be calculated in two separate and dietiact
ways: Pirst, profito; eecond, loes. rom the fret your aananit income would be aay $\$ 10$ above the cost of maintenance of dairy cattie of some the eame breed, and the cost of vidual animal.
