



vision network reporters, who strove to work up an impeachment mood and crisis after President Nixon's firing of Archibald Cox, that in itself was not a constitutional crisis: the President had that authority.

A constitutional crisis could occur if the Supreme Court ordered the President to do something he refused to do. The President has moved to avoid that possible crisis by surrendering the controversial tapes of his private conversations. There is no doubt, of course, that those who seek to make the most of Watergate, and who have convicted the President in their minds, see Cox's firing as a terrible travesty. (Lending weight, however, to charges that Cox was a political figure was his behavior in going immediately to the office of Senator Ted Kennedy upon learning of Nixon's decision to surrender the tapes.)

It should also be remembered that the President offered to turn over the controversial presidential private conversation tapes to a Democrat, in a compromise patterned on the Appeals Courts' suggestion of a compromise. Cox, going it alone after the Senate Watergate Committee accepted that compromise, talked of citing the President for contempt. The Massachusetts Democrat gave some the impression he was hell-bent on avoiding a quieting compromise leaving

The elderly who get Social Security checks will continue to receive them along with a second check from SSI if they qualify under the federal program.

Most recipients will get higher assistance payments under SSI. Some, however, will receive less. Residents of nursing homes or institutions will remain eligible for medical assistance

The State Welfare Department will continue to furnish the needy with glasses, dentures, hearing aids, prescribed drugs, medical services and food stamps if they qualify Eighty-four per cent will receive more money; two per cent will lose assistance altogether; reductions can be expected by nine per cent and five per cent will get about the same amount.

This from someone in the Justice Department, even though a special prosecutor, would be hard for any President to tolerate. Cox was, in effect, refusing a type of compromise suggested by the court, and after all the Watergate suffering, abuse, national upheaval and damage to America in so many ways, his star-role press conference rejection was more than President Nixon could stomach.

There is little chance the President will be removed from office as a result, despite impeachment resolutions amid the howls and yapping of a number of Senators and Congressmen, much of it politically motivated, much inspired by the news media hounds seeking the President's scalp and some more solidly based. That President Nixon ever agreed to allow an independent investigator as powerful as the President himself inside the executive department was a surprise to many; that the situation could not work out is not as much of a surprise.

The President had a case in his fight to maintain the separateness and integrity of his office and personal files. In offering to turn his conversational tapes over to a member of the opposite party on Capitol Hill, respected for his integrity by all, to allow him to decide what is pertinent, that should have been enough to end the legal dilemma over Watergate. He has now agreed to turn over the tapes to the court and certainly this should enable the Watergate investigation to be pursued normally through the courts, and the nation to get on with other pressing business.

Back in 1942 American troops made their first thrust at Germany in World War II on November 7th. Hitler had declared war on America several days after the Japanese had sneak-attacked Pearl Harbor in December of 1941.

United States military forces were not ready for war, much less a two ocean war, but there was a desire to do something in the first year. U.S. Marines invaded Guadalcanal in August of 1942 (after the great victory at Midway in June) and U.S. forces landed in French-administered North Africa November 7th. Thus in the first twelve months of the conflict U.S. forces were on the offensive against both its major enemies.

North Africa gave U.S. military forces the blooding they need for tougher fighting that lay ahead. U.S. fighters, P-39's, P-40's and P-38's, were roughly handled by the Luftwaffe's Me 109's. U.S. ground troops suffered sharp defeats in some cases, though outnumbering the enemy heavily. The British Eighth Army was there-coming from the east -to close the pincers and do the greater part of the job.

In landing at North African ports American troops posed French authorities with a difficult decision. The French had to decide on short notice whether to oppose the landings militarily, and vigorously. Though Washington and London assured the French there was no design on their territory, many French military commanders opened fire on the Americans and it required several days to defeat the French.

From North Africa U.S. troops moved on to Sicily in 1943 and then into Italy, one of the enemy countries, and into France and Germany in 1944.

But this forum does not stop there. For the fired prosecutor Archibald Cox, there is a free nationwide, radio-TV press conference; the same for the Attorney General who resigned. Each of the participants has been given full opportunity to explain his side of the conflict.

In light of all these developments, it occurs to me that this is a good time to restate an old maxim: We have long described ours as a government of laws, not men. I would think it more accurate to call it a government of men under

ignore the human factor in government and politics -- indeed it would be foolish and dangerously utopian. Certainly, our Founding Fathers were perfectly aware of this. They designed our government with men's fallibilities and shortcomings in mind. But they also expected that men could curb their passions, could stifle their personal ambitions, could even concede on what was personally felt to be a matter of principle, if the common good seemed to so demand.

I think Attorney General Elliot Richardson's decision to resign was regrettable, but certainly understandable. I respect him even more, however, for his dignified refusal to turn his time.

No doubt the President felt the situation so grave that he wished to avoid any further domestic uproar and confrontation with the courts and Congress over the tapes.

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
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



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### Catfish Is All-American **Food Dish**

"Catfish provided sustenance for explorers, pioneers and American Indians. They also graced the tables of nobility. "

Whether from a lake, fishing hole or modern catfish farm, they provide an abundance of high-quality protein for growth and body-tissue repair

When faced with more than enough fish for a meal, freeze the extras for another day, the specialist advised.

"To freeze, dress fish as if for immediate use. Cut them into steaks, fillets or leave whole if small.

"Place two layers of waxed paper between fillets or steaks so individual pieces can be separated easily.

"Wrap in moisture-vapor resistant material or a plastic bag to make an air-tight package. This prevents the fish from drying out during freez-

ing. "Store in the freezer at zero degrees F. for no longer than six to nine months.

Frozen catfish may be cooked with or without previous thawing, Miss Reasonover said. Allow extra cooking time if frozen.

When breading fish for frying, let it thaw first to make handling easier, she suggested. Thaw fish in the refrigerator in its original wrap.

"Roll fish in cornmeal or a mixture of cornmeal and flour. Fry in hot fat for about four minutes. Turn carefully and fry four to six minutes longer or until golden brown.

"Drain on a paper towel and serve with hush puppies and cole slaw for an oldtime favorite.'

\_\_\_\_\_ **Tips For Gardeners** From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Another November is here and should be a busy month for gardeners.

You may want to consider landscape improvement now, prior to the dormant planting season. Some plants may need to be removed or replaced if they no longer fulfil their usefulness.

When considering the kind of trees to plant, you may be rewarded by selecting one that is long-lived, Superior trees such as the live-oak and the Southern magnolia, along with HOME DEMONSTRATION others, should not be passed up CLUB MEETS because they are considered to be slow growers. When given proper care, these trees need not take so long to reach desirable size.

First determine soil conditions. If infertile, soil can be replaced or modified to better suit the tree's requirements.

Consider the place where you want to plant the trees. Most trees make the maximum treasurer. growth when planted in full sun. Place mulch around the tree to hold moisture and reduce soil temperature. Keep grass away from a newly plannot have to compete for available water and nutrients.

If your drainage is a problem, add a mound of fill dirt to provide a layer of welldrained soil deep enough for good root growth. Add organic matter such as peat moss or compost to increase the water-

holding capacity. Proper care of shrubs this fall will assure their survival this winter and their being in a healthy condition ready for

> growth next spring. Several jobs need to be performed now. First of all, be sure plants get a good supply of water before predicted cold hits our

area. This is especially important if it is unusually dry. Evergreens and new plantings are especially susceptible to cold injury. Water is as important in winter as in the summer for plants lose water constantly. Sunburn and windburn

are primarily caused by loss of water. A mulch around shrubs will help to conserve the moisture.

Major General Thomas Bishop, Texas adjutant general, has said Texas was "accepting the new troop structure with a great challenge. The selection by the Department of the Army for Texas to raise and train a new armored division is a very realistic and long step.

Originally, the 49th Division was formed in 1946 as part of the post-World War II Texas Guard reorganization. As the first National Guard armored division in the nation, the 49th was credited with proving that the Guard could maintain armor with part time citizensoldiers.

Today's reactivation of the division marks the first time in five years that the Army

Guard will maintain an entire combat division in a single

state. In 1961 the 49th mobilized for the Berlin crisis and spent 10 months on active duty at Fort Polk, La. The division was deactivated in 1968 when the Texas Guard reorganized from a two-division force into three separate brigades.
