Crockett Fields Gain Confirmer **And Extender**

One Crockett County field gained a confirmer and another an extender.

The Double R (Crinoidal) field gained its third producer and a 3/8 mile northeast extension with completion of Texas Oil & Gas Corp, Midland, No. 1-17 ARCO, 15 miles southwest of Ozona, for a daily pumping potential of 81 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, plus 12 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 123-1.

Production was through perwhich had been acidized with 250 gallons.

Canyon production was extended 14 miles north and slightly east in the Ozona multipay field with completion of J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 11 Thompson Fee, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles north of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,300,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 13, 140-1. Gravity of the condensate was 58.5 degrees.

LET'S STOP FORCED BUSING

While we are looking ahead to ways of improving things during the coming year of 1974, a good, long hard look should be taken at the practice of forced busing of school children according to the color of their skins.

Some members of Congress have suggested that now, in view of the serious energy crisis and gasoline shortage, would be a good time to discontinue forced busing. However, most Americans would probably agree that if school busing increased academic Governor Dolph Briscoe would ability, or brought about better race relations, or showed some have a second term if Texas other positive results, the program would be worth the extra newspaper editors and publishgasoline and dollars.

The rub is: according to a recent study published by the Indiana Law Review by Professor Jeffery Leech, forced school busing has, in fact, brought about the direct opposite of the goals set forth by the Federal bureaucracy.

The report, based upon a detailed investigation of school busing in ten major U.S. cities, shows that "In every city studied, busing failed to reduce the gap between black and white achievement. In fact, most cities reported that the achievement President Nixon complete his

Professor Leech further reports that the study revealed that "in no city did busing appear to increase interracial contact or no on the question "should better understanding." Mail That Offends

Three years ago, Congress offered a new kind of protection to people who wanted to stop 'sexually oriented" advertisements from arriving in their mail. Anyone so inclined could place his or her name on a special list to be kept by the Post Office. Sending such ads to those on the list was made a crime.

By now, with thousands of names on the list, enough time has gone by for this law to be tested and clarified in the courts. To begin with, the basic idea

However, the court said the statute would simply not apply in those circumstances. There would be no criminal offense, the court observed, when there was no criminal intent.







Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

Though this is the midway month for winter planning, planting and transplanting, January is an exciting time of the

Garden work this month must be limited to mild days between cold snaps like we have been having. On warm days start pruning summer flowering shrubs as needed in winter or early spring in order to keep them in bounds. Rid your garden of plant litter and check plantings to be certain they get sufficient water. The soil is very dry now.

Much of the fun in gardening lies in the fascination we get from watching plants grow, and the change with the sea-

Make a four-month plan to insure a successful vegetable garden. Many profited from these gardens last year and are always furnished more tasty and fresher vegetables as well as a budget saver. Timing is important for success.

January is the time to prepare. Work the soil deeply, adding as much humus as necessary to give good structure. Take a handful of the soil and squeeze it tightly in the palm of your hand. Release your fingers and try to break up the clump of soil with your thumb. The structure is good if it breaks up into many crumbles. But if it feels sticky and hard to break up, add more humus. Let the prepared area lie fallow and absorb the winter rain. If you want a soil sample, take a sample to local agriculture agent for a test. You may need to add limestone or other ingredients for a small area or larg-

If you like fresh figs or fig small fruit trees can be planted now. Choose a fig variety

of your area. Here, the most common recommended varieties are the celeste and Brown Turkey. The celeste is somewhat more hardy and is highly resistant to splitting and souring. It is known by other names. Sugar and Small Brown Turkey has the longest ripening season of any recommended variety. It is also excellent for growing in containers. It is also known as Everbearing or Texas Everbearing. Fig trees grow best in deep, fertile and well-drained soils. Their shallow root system may suffer from drought conditions in shallow soils. They will grow in coarse sand to heavy clay and may either be acid or alkaline. They do need soil that holds moisture well during dry periods. Mulching with compost, pine-straw or other organic materials are beneficial. They should be planted while they are dormant. Figs often grow satisfactorily without fertilizer, but if growth is poor, apply about 1 lb. of 8-8-8 fertilizer per foot of height each year. Divide this into at least three applications: late winter, late May and late July. For highest yields, figs need watering throughout the growing season.


