The election of two directors will be conducted. Terms of Charles Lewis and Harmon Elliott expire this year.

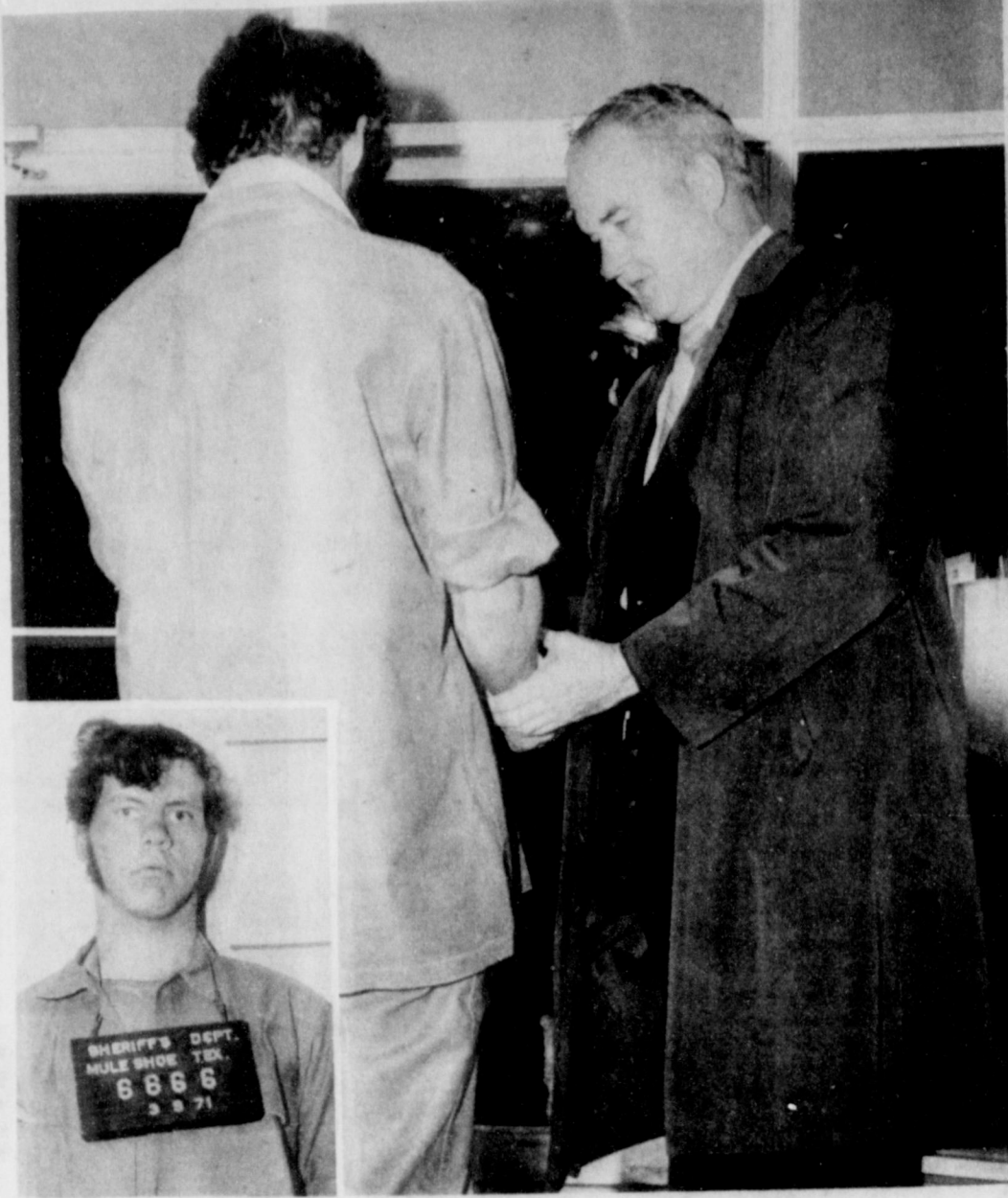

Two minor wrecks on roads in Bailey county damaged three vehicles, but left no injuries during the past weekend, according to Texas Highway Patrolman Joe Young.

Last Saturday, a two pickup wreck involving Jackie Thomas Moser and Pedro Castaneda four miles north of Muleshoe injured no one and a wreck late Saturday night flipped a car driven by Jose Torres Gonzales.

Gonzales lost control of his auto after hitting a dip approximately a half mile north of Highway 70, six miles east of Muleshoe. The car rolled onto its top but Gonzales, who was alone at the time of the accident, was not injured.

## County Officials Approve Raise For Employees

Meeting in regular session and holding discussions until around 11 p.m. Monday night, the Bailey County Commissioners agreed on a raise for county employees. Commissioners agreed to keep elected officials salaries the same as the present level.

The raise was a blanket raise of 10 percent for all appointed employees including motor graders, dispatchers, deputies in the various offices, such as the tax assessor and county clerk, the portion paid by the county to the county agent and home demonstration agent, janitors and part-time help. Excluded were the two male deputies of the county, who received raises from \$375 to \$425 per month, an approximately 20 percent increase of their salaries.

County Judge Glen Williams said the raises were effective March 1.

The commissioners also approved payment of \$500 to Aldridge and Aldridge for representing Bailey County during the re-districting suit last year.

Opening the meeting Monday morning, the county commissioners heard Alberto Danieil and Alfonso (Pancho) Posado, who were requesting that the county officials allow the Community Action Program to re-open in this county.

Danieil told the commissioners that the program was needed "to help people, because they (the administrators of the program) will give us things."

Again, the commissioners refused to commit themselves to begin the controversial program again, reminding Danieil and Posado that the program was terminated in this county

## '71 Vote Tally Fugitive; Juvenile Above 3,450 Sets Record Runaway Jailed

The vote registration for 1971 reached 3,484, including 160 18-year olds following a ruling that registration would continue through February.

A total of 3,401 persons had registered prior to the one month extension which had ended January 31 and an additional 83 registrations were picked up during February, according to records in the office of Bailey County Tax Assessor Jean Lovelady.

Mrs. Lovelady said this was a record in an off-year election when no county, state or federal election are involved.

A 20-year old fugitive from Pennsylvania found it doesn't really pay to come to Muleshoe Monday when he was apprehended right at the west edge of Muleshoe as he came from New Mexico.

George Howard McCartney of Washington, Pa. signed extradition papers to Pennsylvania Tuesday morning following his apprehension by Muleshoe City Police Officer Buddy Black Monday. He is being held in the Bailey County Law Enforcement Center jail along with a 16-year old runaway from Altoona, Pa. who

was with him at the time of his arrest.

It all began around 5:30 p.m. Monday when the police dispatcher at Muleshoe received a radio call from the New Mexico State Police dispatcher at Clovis. The Clovis dispatcher said the duo had escaped from Texico (N.M.) City Marshal Harvey Rowland when he was attempting to check with the National Crime Intelligence Center after stopping the hitchhiking couple.

Rowland asked for aid in recapturing the duo, then found a witness who had seen the couple get into a white automobile with Texas license tags with another man.

Officers, including city, county and state officers all converged in an effort to stop the vehicle.

Texas Highway Patrolman Gene Sisemore was headed west when he saw a white car, but of a different model from the car given by the witness in New Mexico. He radioed back

## Hayes First Team All-District Choice

One Muleshoe Mule varsity basketball player was named to the first team in 1-AAA All-District and two other Mules received honorable mention when the all-district teams were announced last week.

Johnny Hayes was named to the first team. He was the leading scorer for the Mules in district play, averaging twelve points per game.

During regular season, he averaged eight points per game. Johnny's best performance was against the Dumas Demons, when he got a total of seven rebounds, hit eleven of fifteen shots from the field, and hit eight of nine free throws for a total of 30 points.

"Johnny not only scored well, but also was outstanding in breaking the full court press and leading the fast break," said basketball coach Raymond Schroeder.

Johnny is a five foot, ten inch junior, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hayes.

Don Heathington was selected as honorable mention on the District 1-AAA basketball team. Don was the leading rebounder for the Mules, getting a total of 214 rebounds for an average of 8.2 per game.

Don's best performance was against Tulia when he pulled down a total of 18 rebounds. He was also one of the Mule's

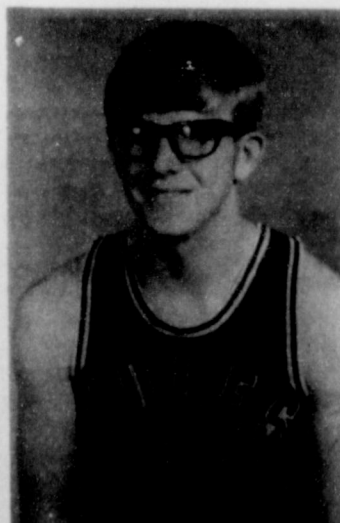
## Rotary To Host Chilean Group In Muleshoe

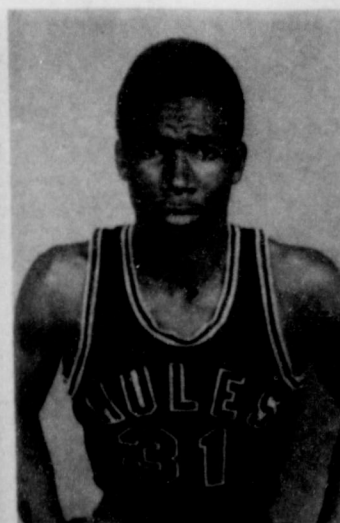

## City Shows 4,525; County Lists 8,487

### St. Patrick's Feature Money Tree

Members of the Businessmen's Activities Committee of the Chamber of Commerce brought 'the wearin' o' the green' into sharp focus Tuesday morning when it was decided to sponsor a money tree on Saint Patrick's Day, Wednesday, March 17.

Greenbacks will be the drawing card, with participating merchants having registration slips for signing by shoppers in Muleshoe. Registrants begin the sign up today (Thursday) with participating merchants.

To be given away at a drawing on St. Patrick's Day will be the loaded money tree which

should have more than \$200. The place for the drawing will be announced later, according to coordinators Iris Clements and Dru Edwards.

Each merchant who participates in the promotion will contribute \$5. Of this amount, \$1 will be used for publicity and printing of registration slips. The other \$4 will be on the tree.

The United States Census Bureau reports the official population of Bailey County in the 1970 census was 8,487, down 6.6 percent from the 1960 figure of 9,090. The official population of the state was 11,196,730, up 16.9 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 9,579,677.

The county's 1970 population was classified as 53.3 percent urban, and 46.7 percent rural. Muleshoe's population is up 654 persons, advancing from 6,871 tabulated by the census bureau in 1960 to 4,525 persons in 1970.

The 1970 census counted 8,048 white persons in Bailey County, 94.8 percent of the total; 291 Negroes, and 148 other persons of other races. In 1960, 95.9 percent of the population was white.

The census also showed 837 children under five years of age; 2,512 in ages five through 17; 4,385 people 18 through 64; and 753 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 4,193 married people, 375 who were widowed, 138 divorced, and 1,246 never married.

In the census, there were 2,504 households, with 8,386 persons; including 310 one-person households. In addition, 101 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 3,075 housing units in Bailey County, 1,542 of them occupied by owners, 962 occupied by tenants, and 571 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970

for the Muleshoe officer to check the car when it neared town, then stayed out where he could watch for the auto of the right description.  
Officer Black saw the wanted couple get out of the car at the west edge of Muleshoe and walk south toward the Muleshoe Church of Christ. He drove up to the couple and stopped them, and brought the duo to the law center when he found they were the couple who escaped from the Texico officer.

Officer Sisemore then clocked the car which had brought the couple to Muleshoe and found he was speeding, so brought him back to Muleshoe to face a speeding charge and questioning about his riders. Officers found the young man who transported the couple to Muleshoe had merely picked them up while hitchhiking and he was released after paying a speeding ticket.  
The Texico officer came to Muleshoe where the duo was questioned and it was found the man was wanted in Pennsylvania for armed robbery and jumping bond. Pennsylvania

officers and the father of the 16-year old runaway were notified Monday night.  
The couple was fed, provided with soap and clean clothing and jailed.  
When apprehended, the couple had no clothing other than what they wore. Allegedly, they had worn the same clothing since their journey across the U. S. began in Pennsylvania exactly two weeks before they were picked up by Muleshoe officers.  
Walter J. Marm, who identified himself as Chief of Detectives in the Prosecutor's office of Washington County, Pa. arrived in Muleshoe around

10:30 p.m. Tuesday night to take McCartney back to Pennsylvania.  
The detective said he knew the youth and he was officially charged at this time with 'armed robbery with accomplice.'  
Marm said he was a 30-year veteran as a law enforcement officer, having served as a Pennsylvania State Trooper for a number of years before joining the Washington County (Pa.) Prosecutor's office as a detective.  
He also added that he had made trips to Texas before, but had been in the Fort-Worth-

Dallas area during earlier trips. He thanked local officers for their cooperation in the quick apprehension of the wanted man.  
Detective Marm also added that McCartney was arrested in 1967, along with his brother, for setting fire to farmer's barn in Pennsylvania. Shortly after he reached Muleshoe, Detective Marm talked with McCartney. According to the detective, McCartney and his juvenile companion left Pennsylvania around February 23. They drove to St. Louis, Mo. where they 'burned' up their automobile. From there, they

erative efforts with all other health agencies, private, state and federal. The Easter Seal Society does not duplicate services, but strives to fill all unmet needs of the disabled, he added.  
The Easter Seal Society is carrying out its forty-second annual Easter Seal Appeal to finance a program of rehabilitation services for crippled children and adults. The Texas Easter Seal Society helps support 20 treatment facilities where children and adults are treated regardless of ability to pay. Physical therapy and speech and hearing programs are offered to help the disabled make their lives fuller, despite their handicaps.  
Crawford urged persons in Bailey County to increase their support of the Texas Easter Seal Society and its programs of services to the crippled children and adults of Texas.

better scorers, averaging nine points per game.

was 50.1 percent, compared with 41.7 percent in 1960.

Among year-around dwelling units there were 2,746 single family houses, 111 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 46 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 15.1, compared with 19.9 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 2,318 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 186 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Bailey County was around \$9,900, compared with \$8,300 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$56 per month, compared with \$61 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

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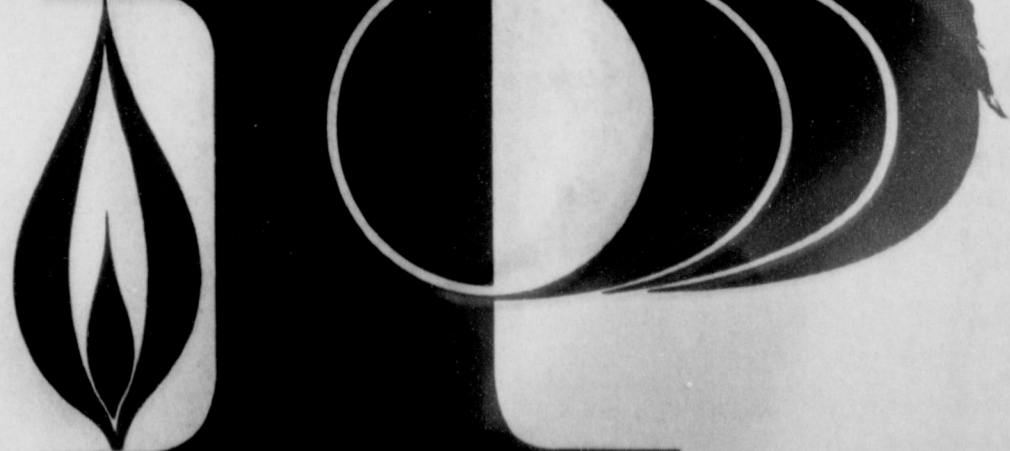


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## "Through The Years" Theme For Bula Athletic Banquet

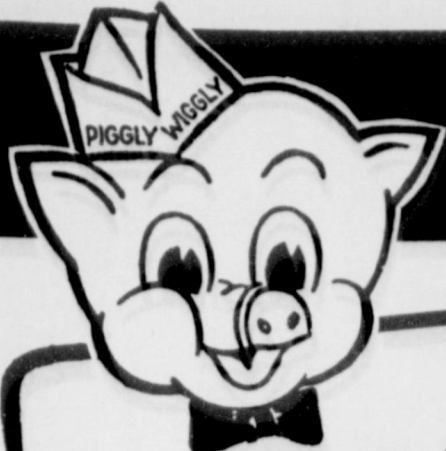

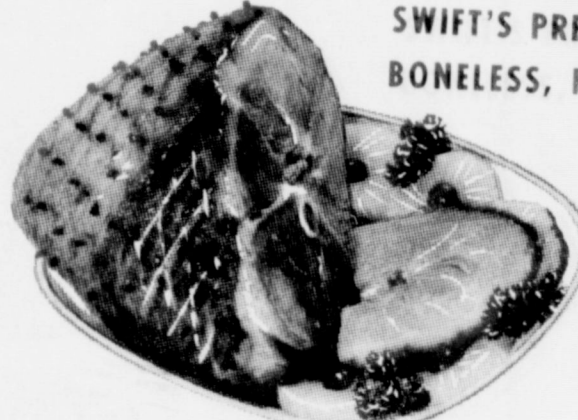

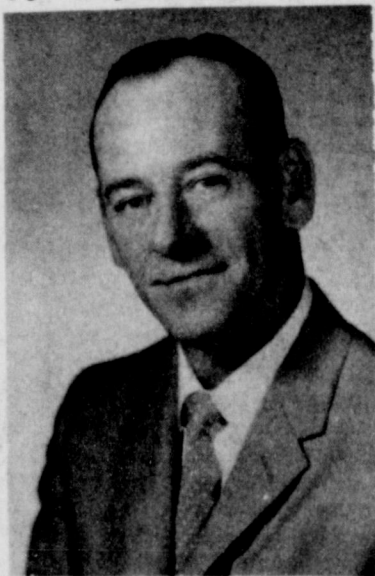

## Congressman Asks '68 Gun Act Repeal

Congressman Bob Price of Pampa has called up Congress to repeal the Gun Control Act of 1968.

In a strongly worded speech Price urged House liberals to face reality and, "consider the fundamental fact that guns and ammunition do not kill people--people kill people," and that, "as long as criminals think they can profit from crimes involving the use of guns, criminals will use guns to commit crimes."

The Texas lawmaker stated that those interested in controlling armed crime and violence would serve their purposes better by focusing attention on reforms of the criminal justice system. "What is needed is upgrading and better equipping state and local police forces, enacting tougher laws to deter potential criminals and to severely punish convicted felons.

streamlining criminal court procedures, and reforming for penal system."

Price also introduced legislation removing Federal restrictions on the sale of .22 calibre rimfire ammunition. The last Congress had passed Price's proposals to eliminate record keeping requirements for shotgun and rifle ammunition, but his specific proposal relating to .22 calibre rimfire ammunition passed the House, then saw no final Senate action.

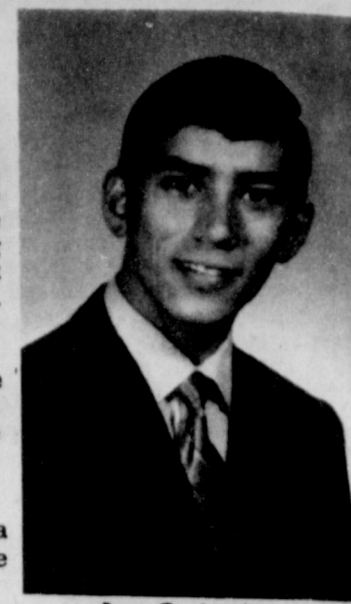
In support of his second proposal, Price cited Treasury and Justice Department reports that in the first two years since the passage of the Act, there was not one single instance where any of the recordkeeping requirements for sporting ammunition proved helpful in law enforcement or led to the successful investigation and prosecution of a crime.

Price declared, "Repealing the Gun Control Act of 1968 would rid the American people of the burdens of a law that never should have been passed in the first place."

"Repealing the remaining restrictions on the sale of .22 calibre rimfire ammunition would remove perhaps what thousands upon thousands of freedom-loving and law-abiding sportsmen and merchants is the most aggravating single feature of the Act itself, a feature that has been conclusively shown to have absolutely no bearing on crime prevention and crime control," he said.

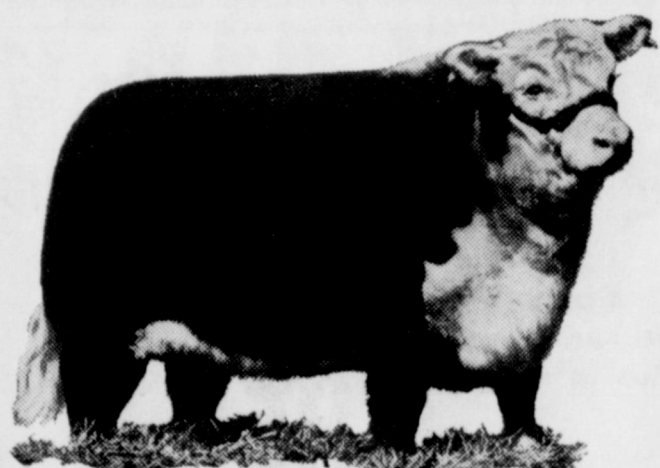

We firmly believe that the attempts to suppress hail in our area interferes with natural rainfall, and therefore, we the undersigned oppose such attempts to interfere with nature.

We further request that the proper officials of this State refuse to issue permits to any individual, group, firm or corporation who attempts, by artificial methods, to suppress the development and formation of atmospheric cloud formations.

It is no concern of the undersigned as to what methods may be used by other counties, so long as the area of our counties is not used as a buffer zone for the hail suppression program.
