I certainly believe in saving energy, especially gasoline and especially since its gone up another few cents. However, I am very much against the 55 mph speed limit for now and forevermore.

In urging states to keep the 55 mph limits, officials declare it is responsible for the reduction in traffic deaths. I just don't see how they can make that statement off the tops of their heads. Traffic accidents were down before that law went into effect, and more than likely the reduced traffic due to inability to get gas was as much or more of a factor in reducing traffic fatalities than the speed limit.

I, for one, feel that the 55 mph speed limit is more likely to cause an accident than the 70 mph limit. You'd think that this would be enough to scare the compact car driver half to death, but he was undaunted. Approaching a hill on a curve with the yellow stripe in his lane, he decides he just has to get around the rest of the cars and does just that. This time, the approaching car took to the roadside. Vacating the right-of-way for IS 10 has been a major project for the county. Crockett County has just recently completed its elaborate county road maintenance facility in the country club area north of town and is now busy constructing Little League and hardball playing fields plus other recreational facilities on countyowned land in the area.

Interested citizens have voiced hope that in the process of development of the new playground area, made necessary when IS 10 gobbled up the long known playing fields, that unused parts of the countyowned land be developed and beautified as picnic and park areas with tree-planting, grass sodding and addition of facilities that citizens might enjoy in the future. This area is located at the north edge of the city, with excellent soil and admirably displayed along the Highway 163 approach to this city. The well kept Texas Highway Department is across the country club street and north of the beautiful new county maintenance facility, and the recreational facilities are to the south.

Construction is also booming in the city proper, with the new nursing wing to the Crockett County Hospital under construction and a new home and medical clinic for Dr. Don Carlisle on the side of the east hill on Fairview Drive.

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WAR CLOUDS OVER ASIA

While the world's attention has been riveted on the Middle East during the past few months, storm signals have again been raised over the possibility of a major war between the Soviet Union and Communist China.

For example, two West German magazines (the influential weeklies DER SPIEGEL and STERN) and Britain's prestigious ARMY QUARTERLY virtually predict the outbreak of war by the end of the coming summer. And the Soviet Union's quarterly publication PROBLEMS OF THE FAR EAST reported in December that the Sino-Soviet talks over boundary issues, which began over four years ago, have reached an impasse while "an atomic bomb is hanging over the negotiating table."

A war between Russia and China would almost certainly involve nuclear weapons. This opens up such hideous and unpredictible possibilities for all mankind that it seems incredible that anyone of rational mind would unleash it. And yet, writer Alexander Solzhenitsyn, who presumably has some feel for the thinking of the Kremlin leaders, is reported to take the possibility very seriously and to have sent a warning to that effect to President Nixon. And it is a fact that since the armed clash on the accomplished thus far on the Ussuri River five years ago, both China and Russia have massed enormous forces along their 4,000 mile frontier.

If there is war it would almost certainly be initiated by Russia in order to destroy China's nuclear potential before the new Chinese 3,500-mile missiles, capable of hitting Moscow, become operational toward the end of this year. This may explain why Red China now has become such an advocate of a strong NATO alliance: anything to keep the pressure on the Soviets elsewhere. last three months by their

A STRANGE TWIST OF EVENTS

Difficult as it is for the average American to understand our foreign policies these days, there is nothing more puzzling than the attitude of some folks toward the free country of Rhodesia.

A number of Senators in Washington who claim that they deplore the act of economic blackmail by the Arabs were the first in line to vote for a measure which would impose economic blackmail on our part against Rhodesia, by banning the import of Rhodesian chromium.

Such a policy, if it should be confirmed by the House of Representatives, would not only force us to depend upon the Soviet Union for our supply of the critical metal, but it will also cost us about twice the price we are now paying Rhodesia. One result, according to experts in Washington, would be that the average family automobile will cost about \$200 more than it does now.

Even stranger, however, is that according to newscaster Fulton Lewis, III, General Motors has directed its lobbyists in Washington to pressure for the passage of the measure which would impose the ban. "The reasoning in this case," says Lewis, "is that although (the ban) would push the price of ferro-chrome steels upward, GM wants to protect its investments in such black African nations as Zaire It is fearful that rejection of Humphrey's bill (which calls for the ban) might cause an anti-American reaction in black dominated regions."

Could it be, in addition to the reason cited by Fulton Lewis, that General Motors also wants to curry favor with the Soviet Union?

Whatever the reason, it might not be a bad idea for you to contact your nearest General Motors automobile dealer, and ask him in turn to ask HIS supplier why the American people should be expected to pay \$200 more per automobile to make things good for General Motors.

The United States, as the phrase goes, is the Saudi Arabia of the coal world. We have enough of the fossil fuel to last for at least 500 years. And, since we already use about 35 percent of the world's energy, we're going to need it.

Even with the lifting of the Arab oil embargo, it will be many DEMO CONVENTION years before the U.S. could become self-sufficient in oil, given the best of possible circumstances. In the meantime, we face the uneasy choice of compromising the ideal environment we want to have and the power from coal that we must have. While other forms of energy such as nuclear power are necessary, clearly it

will be a good while yet before they can supply a large percentage of U.S. energy needs.

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Washington **News** Letter by Congressman O. C. Fisher

By a margin of 293 to 117 the House last week adopted a strong anti-busing provision to the big school aid bill, that would permit busing only as a last resort and then allow no student to be bused farther than the next closest school to his home. But this is nothing new. The

House has approved similar amendments any number of times in recent years, to have the Senate water down the anti-busing provisions and make them meaningless. A showdown on Senate busing sentiment took place in December on a vote to prohibit use of gasoline for busing of school children away from their home schools. Pro-busing won by a vote of 39 to 48. Ultimately the House school aid bill, with anti-busing in it, will clash with a companion

busing compulsion, written into law, there will still be the courts to deal with. The present court, with 4 Nixon appointees, has shown much more prudence and respect for congressional mandates than did the old Warren Court. So, maybe there's a change in the air. ----

Federal minimum wage will soon jump from \$1,60 to \$2,30 per hour, under a recent enactment, now at the White House. Basically, wage levels are determined by production and by essentiality. An employer cannot afford to hire a given worker unless that employee's work produces a profit for the employer. Thousands of enterprises operate on extremely tight profit margins. If the minimum gets too high they turn to automation, reduce the work force, or go out of busi-

ness. Under the new high levels, domestics will be hard hit. So will students, handicapped, elderly, and the unskilled in general.

Then they remembered, and rushed back to Jerusalem to tell his eleven disciples - and everyone else - what had happened.

federal spending, another one of the detrimental effects of the lack of organization in Congress has been that we are continually considering supplemental appropriation requests for new programs long after the fiscal year has begun.

In addition to sponsoring the Congressional Budget Reform Act, I had introduced a Senate Resolution proposing that authorization measures must be reported out not later than one month prior to the beginning of the fiscal year to which they apply. I am most pleased that the bill just approved by the Senate sets May 15 prior to the date for reporting authorizations. Pvt. Martinez

The Congressional Budget Act of 1974 is a serious effort on the part of Congress to regain some form of control over cess. Briefly, the Act sets up a Senate and House Budget Committee, each consisting of 15 members. This committee would be the focal point for all information and analyses rela-

ting to the formulation of recommended fiscal policies and budget priorities. Its principal responsibility would be to consider the input of the House Appropriations Committee, the

Office of the Budget, and then report to the Senate its recommendations on overall spending.

Under the proposed new budget act, the federal fiscal year would be moved from July 1 to October 1. The bill would require the President to submit




