One of the most commonly times highly dependent upon asked questions among home gardeners is what variety of vegetable to plant for the highest yields of good quality pro-

Numerous vegetable varieand many offer increased yields, disease resistance, uniformity and better quality. dards prove to be better. The home gardener can best answer the question of which vegetable varieties to plant, believes Reagor. Both old and new varieties should be tried and compared for yield and performance. No single variety, new or old, will be suitable for every home garden under various growing conditions. 

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### THE ISRAEL - EGYPT - U.S. TRIANGLE

In the volatile Middle East, the chances for renewed war in the near future appear to be slightly less than was the case

The basic reason seems to be Egypt's lack of readiness for war and Egyptian President Sadat's continued unwillingness to pay the Soviet price for an all-out resupply of the military equipment lost in the 1973 war. Thus the cancellation of Brezhnev's Cairo visit in January and Gromyko's apparent lack of results when he preceded Kissinger to Egypt in early February. Rather than rely on the Russians, Sadat is still putting his faith primarily in Washington, in the hope that we will deliver sufficient territorial concessions from Israel to make war unnecessary. If Kissinger fails to deliver, Sadat has carefully left open the road to Moscow.

Kissinger has now openly hinted at what many others have long been advocating: a formal U.S. military guarantee of Israel's frontiers following a withdrawal from some or all of the territory captured in 1967. Israel's response has been understandably cool. Her defense "must rest upon Israel's shoulders alone," according to Prime Minister Rabin. A defense treaty cannot be accepted as a substitute for defensible borders. In that connection Israel has the unfortunate precedent of 1967 when, after Egyptian President Nasser proclaimed a blockade of the Straits of Tiran, the U.S. welched on the commitment it had made to Israel in 1957 to guarantee freedom of navigation through this vital waterway. There is also the current spectacle of the U.S. Congress welching on the commitment of the U.S. government made to South Vietnam in 1973, to wit, that we would replace on a one-for-one basis weapons and ammunition.

Peace or war still hangs in the balance in the Middle East and just to get over the first hurdle involves three factors: territorial concessions by Israel, some form of evidence of peaceful intent by Egypt, and some form of satisfactory assurance to Israel of continued U.S. support. Reconciling these three requirements is still Dr. Kissinger's unfinished task.

### DEREGULATION OF NATURAL GAS

President Ford has proposed to increase badly needed U.S. supplies of oil and natural gas by deregulating the price as of 1 April 1975. Decontrolling of the price of oil can be done administratively, but deregulating gas requires legislation by Congress. Incredibly, not only is Congress balking at such deregulation, but on the contrary, many lawmakers are pushing for regulation of intrastate gas sales as well, so as to bring down the price of gas sold within state boundaries to the regulated price of gas sold on an interstate basis.

This Congressional attitude comes against a background of a new report put out by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences. After a two year study the Council estimates that U.S. oil and natural gas reserves are sufficient for no more than the next 25 years.... This is a considerable reduction from the 40 to 60 years forecast by the Federal Energy Administration and casts doubt on the hope that Project Independence can free the U.S. from foreign energy sources by 1985. This hope is based on the assumption that the U.S. will almost double output of oil and gas in the next 10 years.

In view of these goals and the new, less optimistic estimates on reserves, it seems all the more important to do everything possible to stimulate production rather than to diminish it. As an example, take certain marginal gas fields in Texas where well production may be on the order of 250,000 cubic feet of gas or so per day. Before they will drill on such properties, drillers require a payback of drilling costs on a successful well within about 27 months. This is to allow for mechanical failures in completing the well, "blow outs" which may burn down the drilling rig, and the like. To achieve this rate of return, they require a minimum price of about \$1.25 per thousand cubic feet. Since intrastate prices for gas in Texas now run about \$1.50, they can afford to drill. But if the price were regulated and brought down to the \$.65 paid on an interstate basis, such fields would no longer be economic to produce. This production would then be

Obviously, what is needed is deregulation of interstate gas sales as well. Every possible incentive is needed to speed up the finding of new energy sources and the adequate exploration of those reserves already discovered. We hope Congress will come to its senses on this vital matter.


### FLIGHT FROM THE DOLLAR

A massive new vote of no confidence in the American economy is being registered throughout the world as speculators sell U.S. dollars against other, relatively stronger currencies. The price of gold, that infallible barometer of economic stability and ultimate store of value, is once more on the rise.

The reason is the ever more obvious prospect that, in order to try and bring the U.S. out of the deepening recession, the Administration has opted for a major new round of inflation.

Walter Frey, general manager of Swiss Bank Corp., told a London conference that a new wave of inflation, "probably worse than anything we have seen so far," will drive more people to buy gold.

AUSTIN-A Texas presidential preference primary bill finally limped through the House of Representatives after two days of bitter debate.

Opponents assailed it as a winner-take-all measure, disregarding national party regulations aimed at assuring proportional representation among state delegates of presidential candidates.

Proponents argued it will give average voters a more direct voice than they now have in the presidential nominating process.

Impetus for the bill (HB 679) by Rep. Tom Schieffer of Fort Worth came from supporters of U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas for president and citizens weary of the political convention

Fierce opposition came from Democratic liberals who want to retain the "reformed" convention system, from George Wallace supporters and a few who have little enthusiasm for Bentsen's candidacy. Most Republicans also voted against the bill -

As sent to the Senate, the measure calls for a vote in May on slates of delegates committed to presidential candidates who file. Elections would be held by senatorial or congressional districts (depending on decision of a state party's executive committee).

Seventy-five percent of Texas' allotted delegates to the national party conventions would be elected directly at the district level, 25 per cent at the state con-

### SCHOOL PLANS IN

Governor Briscoe's school finance revision plan hit legislative hoppers this week, and committees of both houses prepared to begin hearings on the high priority topic soon.

Briscoe's bill calls for a "weighed pupil" approach to distributing state aid and would cost \$589.9 million during the next biennium

(\$919.9 million overall). Cost compares with \$2.7 billion for the Texas State Teachers Assiciation school finance bill and about \$1 billion for one proposed by Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, former House Education chairman.

Briscoe proposed to increase teacher salaries from \$6,600 a year to \$7,430 during the next year and \$7,840 the next. TSTA is aiming for a \$10,000 a year starting teacher salary and Kubiak

recommended \$8.400. The Governor saw his bill as "a proposal to guarantee quality education to every child in Texas, regardless of the income of his parents or the wealth of his community."

tected from moisture by a surface coat of wax, silicone, paint or oil. Howas these coatings wear off, from frequent use, they must be treated again and again.

Dampness in the air, dew, rain and spray all create rust. Saltwater spray and the saltwater itself are, of course, most damaging.

Perspiration, because it is slightly acidic, is another cause of rust. All perspiration marks and other dampness should be wiped from any iron or steel items to keep them rust-free and in perfect working order.

stored in warm areas when possible. Maximum protection against rust is achieved

equipment should be

by applying a thin coating of oil to the metal, from time to time. Wrapping the object in a soft oily rag is an excellent idea. Sewing-machine oil is preferred, but any type lubricating oil will do in an emergency, as will vaseline. Just don't overdo it. A thin coating is all that is necessary.

Other items to be so treated should include all firearms. These should be wiped clean after every outing and another thin coat of oil or silicone applied immediately. Then by wrapping each firearm separately in a soft, oiltreated rag, preservation is certain. If wrapped and stored in a gun case, in a warm area, don't zip the case tight. Leave room for a little warm air to pene-

Tools heavily coated with rust should be given a hard scrubbing with a wire brush following a good soaking in a liquid rust solvent. Solvent will loosen the rust deposits so that the brush scrubbing

If rusty tools, such as pliers and scissors can be disassembled and each part treated separately, rust removal will be easier, more complete, and more effective. Once the unit is thoroughly cleaned apply a coat of silicone to each part and reassemble.

It's a good idea to completely empty the tool box from time to time and clean it thoroughly. Then spray the inside with WD 40. Before replacing the items taken from the tool box, spread a clean, soft oily rag in the bottom of the tool box. Rust remover, nut and



Throughout our area where some of the first trees and shrubs are in full bloom you may think winter is really over. But very few years get by without a severe freeze or two in March or April.

You may have prepared soil in your flower beds and gardens to plant early vegetables. Although you want to as possible, you may be making tiful flowers I received while a mistake if you start working the soil too soon. If too wet or frost is in the soil it would be better to wait on the area not needed for onions, etc. If the soil has much clay in it and worked too soon, it will form huge, hard, dry lumps that are difficult to break up. To test the soil, shape a handful of freshly dug soil into a ball. Squeeze the ball; if it crumbles, it's safe to cultivate. in her home last week. If the ball sticks together, leave garden undisturbed for a

while longer. Don't forget to prune crepe myrtle as severely as you need to before new growth begins this spring. Remove some of the less sturdy stems at ground level, and top back the remaining branches in a staggered shape, taller in the

If you are bothered with nematodes in the garden or to treat the soil to reduce their Is Scheduled numbers. The chemical available at nurseries and garden supply centers for nematode control may either be applied to the soil before planting or used around established plants. Be sure to read the label thoroughly and follow instruc-

One evergreen that grows well in our area and adapts to a wide variety of usage is podocarpus. The species most commonly found in the south are yew podocarpus and often called Japanese yew. They require either sun or partial shade. Depending on the way it is pruned, it may be used as a hedge, a foundation plant, a single or multi-trunked tree, asking for "Enterprise 2058." a specimen shrub in a border or in a container, or it can be espaliered on walls and fences. The long, narrow, dense foliage podocarpus has an attractive green color.

Fill it with a good loose soil mix such as: 1 part top soil, 1 part sand, and 1 part organic matter (compost, peat moss, or

manure) and 2-3 pounds of good fertilizer such as 10-20-10 or 12-24-12 per 100 square

This soil can easily be

mixed by first wetting the organic matter in a pile on the driveway. On top of this, shovel the sand and on top of the sand the soil. Add the fertilizer and begin turning to form a new pile. After turning the pile 3 or 4 times, it will be fairly well mixed.

Try to encourage children to plant things they like to eat and then let them help prepare the vegetables for the table. Chances are if they grew it There's a special excitement they'll probably eat it, too.

Freshness is the key to keeping fruits and vegetables good tasting and nutritious, one foods and nutrition specialist said this week.

"One way to hold them at their peak of freshness is to store them properly at home, " Sally Springer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said.

"Except for onions, potatoes and bananas, produce can be refrigerated. Also, separate bruised or decayed produce before putting it up and use it as soon as possible to avoid loss of nutrients."

She reminded consumers that another way important vitamins and minerals are lost from fresh vegetables is by overcooking them in too much water.

Reviewing specific directions, the specialist said, "Bring about one-half cup of water in a saucepan to a full boil. Add the vegetable, cover and cook only until tender crisp.



Interest Drops

The maximum interest rate GI home loans was dropped from 9 per cent to 8.5 per cent effective January 21, 1975, it was announced today by Richard L. Roudebush, Administrator of Veterans Affairs. Roudebush, who established

the lower VA rate after consultation with the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, noted that the reduction was the second since last November 24 when the maximum interest rate was 9.5 per cent. The new 8.5 per cent rate will also apply to FHA home loans, he added.

The 8.5 per cent rate is the lowest since April 1974 when the rate was increased from "fuel conscious" throughout the 8.25 to 8.5 per cent. The rate was increased to 9 per cent last July, then to 9.5 per cent last August, and then was cut to 9 per cent effective November 25, 1974.

The half per cent decrease would mean as much as \$9.90 per month savings to the typical veteran home buyer, and over the 30 year life of a \$27,500 VA loan, the total saving could be as much as \$3,535.

The VA Administrator said the VA home loan market was greatly expanded under legislation approved by the Presi-

Ozona High School's junior varsity track team placed seventh in the Eden track meet Saturday. They were participating in their first meet of the year against varsity teams of Class A schools.



"First requirements for trying to avoid debts is a realistic view of actual income available. The lifestyle of young adults should be based on net income, not on how much can be charged," the specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said.

Just existing from paycheck to paycheck with no plan usually results in ending up short of cash with debts piled up, she said.

"One problem the young adult frequently faces is that of buying a home. Adding to this problem is his desire to fill the new home with new furniture, new appliances and an endless list of wants--causing an equally long list of bills to

Mrs. Chenoweth pointed out that unrealistic standards in relation to income is a treacherous trap for young adults.

"Some people feel they should immediately have the standard of living that their parents worked many years to achieve, " she noted.

## **Fertilizers For Turf Grasses Important**

With the present world food crisis and fertilizer shortages, should fertilizer use be restricted only to crop production?

"Absolutely not, " argues Dr. Richard Duble, turf specialist for the Texas Agricultural ranked 'green grass and trees' Extension Service. "Fertilizer plays an important role in maintaining grasses in lawns, parks and golf courses, and these areas make significant contributions to the environment as well as having aesthetic and recreational values.

"For instance, " says Duble, grasses release oxygen to the environment while filtering many harmful pollutants. Sulfur, a major air pollutant in industrialized areas, is readily absorbed and utilized by grasses. Plants also thrive on carbon dioxide exhaled by humans. Furthermore, turfgrasses significantly reduce temperatures, glare, dust and noise in urban

environments." Another major function of grasses, according to the Texas A&M University System specialist, is that they reduce soil erosion and water runoff, two major problems in many areas.

What about the aesthetic and recreational aspects of

"Turfgrasses are essential for the health and happiness of people in urban surroundings, contends Duble. "In a recent national survey city dwellers as essential for their wellbeing."

Green belts and open area developments, such as parks and golf courses, are becoming increasingly popular, according to the turf specialist. 'Golf courses have replaced lakes as the major attraction for land developers for the sale

of home sites, apartments and

condominiums. Rather than restrict the use of fertilizer for turfgrasses, Duble urges efficient use of plant food materials. He also suggests the use of slow-release fertilizers that are especially formulated for use on



### Livestock Stamps Effective Industry

Effective March 1, food new coupons, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The coupons will be of \$1, \$5 and \$10 denominations. The 50-cent and \$2 coupons will be discontinued.

USDA's Food and Nutrition Service said the larger denominations were prompted by the volume of coupons needed to meet increased food stamp allotments, paper shortages and increased production and shipping costs.

The new food stamps-sophisticated design to deter

FNS said that food stamp users must spend their current food stamps by June 30 of this year since retailers will not accept any old coupons after that date.

Authorized food stamp stores will use the \$1 coupon for making change instead of the current 50 cent coupon less for change under \$1. Books will be signed by the food stamp customer on the inside front cover, instead of on the

back of the book. The ivory-colored coupon books are in amounts of \$2, \$7, \$40, \$50 and \$65.

FNS advised retailers to redeem the current food cou-49-4tp pons as soon as possible. Banks will continue to accept them for redemption until August 1 of this year.
