

Boll Weevil Less Serious In Narrow-Row

(Editor's Note: This is the sixth in a series of news articles on narrow-row cotton production.)

What special effects narrowrow cotton may have on insect populations are yet to be determined. Cotton insect problems are generally minor on the Texas High Plains where the move to narrow-row cotton production is gaining momen-

'We began to study the effects of narrow-row cotton on insect populations only last year," points out Dr. Dale Bottrell, reasearch entomologist at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extendata is inconclusive to this point, creased protein content. but our long-range research program should uncover some definite findings. As expected, insect populations per acre were larger in fields planted to narrow-row cotton compared to cotton planted in conventional 40-inch rows. But, the insect about the same.'

Damaging populations of insect pests were not encountered during the study last year in the Lubbock area,

"We plan to expand our research project this year to include studies at two locations in the Rolling Plains," adds the "Our greatest entomologist. interest is to determine the influence of the narrow-row production system on boll weevil pulations.'

Narrow-row cotton may prove fit into current schemes aimed at fighting the boll weevil, contends Bottrell. Since cotton in this manner produced matures earlier and allows for an earlier harvest, diapausing boll weevil populations may not build up so rapidly during the fall months. This would mean fewer overwintering weevils, the main goal of the High Plains Diapause Boll Weevil Control Program,



Cultural practices to produce higher protein in hybrid grain sorghum crops is the aim of a grain sorghum quality test to be conducted this year at High Plains Research Foundation.

To determine how cultural practices affect protein in sorghum, scientists have designed a test that will compare double-rowed and single-rowed sorghum under two irrigation methods, two rates of herbicide application and 18 different fertilizer treatments.

Included in the fertilizer treatments will be experiments to determine if sulphur applied with nitrogen will increase the amino acids now deficient in sorghum.

Scientiests at the Foundation point out that cultural practices, as well as genetic factors may be a key to increasing protein quality of irrigated sorghum due to the higher protein content in dryland sorghum.
