WHAT IS GOING ON AT AUSTIN

AT THE PRESENT TIME

Legislatige Potpouri and News Ger erally from Our Capital City.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 20, 1890. The fight in the Texas House of Representatives this week has been on the making an appropriation for the Confederate Veterans' Home. The constitutional lawvers of the house made war on the bill from a standpoint of constitutionality

alone. The proposition now comes up that if this Legislature can stretch its conscience for this appropriation which according to the strict construction of the Constitution is no doubt unconstitutional, what does it propose to do about an appropriation for an exibbit at the World's Columbian Exposition in 1893 at Chicago. One is surely as constitutional as the other. And while one is dictated largely by sentiment, the other should be made from a purely patriotic standpoint. The vast resources of Texas should be developed, and how can it possibly be done, so well as ad-

vertising them to the world? The bill introduced by Gresham of Galveston to carry out Gov. Hogg's recommendation to invest the permanent school fund in railroad bonds will be reported favorably by the House Judiciary Committee, and when it comes up for consideration there promises to be several verses of Wagnerian operatic music floating around the hall of the House, and lodging in the deep red drapery overhanging the galleries. It may pass and it may not. Farmer Shaw, of the Texas Farmer, is still here camping on its trail and the Mercury people are

working for its adoption. The commission bill is finished and as Senator Johnson of Smith, and Hon. Tom Brown of Grayson, have adjusted differences and pooled issues they will now proceed to lead the fight for the passage of the bill of which they are joint owners. There will be a fight made on it, but it will pass, of course, with perhaps a few amendments. Your correspondent has heard some very severe criticisms passed upon certain sections of the bill, since it has been printed, and they were not

Your correspondent heard a member of the House say that since the Senate was so anxious to go on record as afraid of a pass that the House Committee would amend the bill, striking out the Judiciary and the House and let the law apply
