Nelson Morris is the owner of the C ranch, which is about twenty-three miles northwest of Midland, and covers 300,-000 acres, the grass on the ranch was dry and yellow and afforded UNFAVORABLE CONDITIONS,

General Dyrenforth found upon his arrival that the ranch house was situated in the middle of one immense prairie, and the winds almost constantly swept over it with great force. As the scheme was to send up many balloons filled with explosive gases and to take observations from other balloons connected by telephone with the earth, these winds were a serious obstacle to contend with. PUBLIC ROAD BUILDING.

How Good Highways May Re Mad Very Cheaply. Talking to Mr. William Hufter, of Maryland, who has been building roads between Baltimore and the upper Potomac, he gave me the following information: "The latest thing is a road grader drawn by 6 horses, which excavates, alls holes and makes in general the grade conformation of your road: it does the work of about forty men and men who work ou roads require some competition of this kind, especially when the politicians control the roads. The best machine of this kind is made at an obscure to three hundred dollars. Counties are procuring the machines which are especially effective for regrading old roads and opening new roads. Of course they will not pull out stumps nor go through solid rock, but you can dispense with many a cart and horse and wheelbarrow with such a machine. I have recently been making a turnpike about six miles long from a little village called Downsville to Hagers town; the usual discouragements of men of public spirit came from men of that surly, gossiping class of neighbors who would rather smile at your failure than to see you help the community.
