"ALL HANDS ON DECK." ACTIVITY OF NAVAL OFFICERS NOTICEABLE. These Are Being Urged Forward to the Utmost in Getting Ships Ready for Sea.

WASHINGTON, January 18.—The navy department today was still the scene of great activity. Mr. Tracy was in frequent consultation with the chief of ordnance, chief of navigation and chief of construction and occasionally called for the chief engineer. Other chiefs also flitted back and forth through the doors, giving outward and visible signs of the real work that is going on.

But in the office of chief of the bureau of navigation Commodore Ramsey bustles the greatest. Three or four assistants have been detailed to transfer the ciphered dispatches and they are kept busy putting messages into cipher for transmission and making intelligible cablegrams that come in from the South.

The greatest press, however, is being brought to bear on the ordnance bureau, which represents the fighting arm of the navy. The chief of that bureau is getting most satisfactory results from the gun making plant at the Washington yard besides stimulating steel manufacturers to their best effort in rapid production of material.

The greatest activity has prevailed in the bureau of naval intelligence, the agents of which are said to have been at work on a plan of the possible campaign, besides collecting all imaginable information from abroad.
