A Fine Speech by Mr. Cookran Before Tammany's Hall.

Ladies and Gentlemen. Brethren of the Tammany Society, Democrats on the Eve of a Great Contest: I regard this welcome which you have given me as a proof that you accept the assurances which I had the honor to make to you on the Democratic Convention at Chicago [applause] that it was not necessary to send an embassy to Tammany Hall to bespeak its loyalty to the Republic in its system. I believe that we are now engaged in a contest of such far-reaching importance that we may even suspend the truce that usually prevails on the day when we celebrate the foundation of our independence, and that we may turn aside from the non-partisan discussions which have usually distinguished these celebrations long enough to consider that in the outcome of this contest is involved not alone the prosperity of the people of this country, not alone the material wealth of the men and women who compose its citizenship, but the very existence of the free institutions stands ready to be decided by the result of this contest. [Applause.] We are not, here in this campaign-to-day merely discussing the fiscal question. We are not, in this year 1892, merely engaged in the question involving the disposition of a surplus in the Treasury; not merely the stimulation of trade, but above and beyond all, the very existence of representative government in these United States. The issue to be decided here in this contest is the question whether representative government shall continue to be the right of the American citizen, whether it shall be the corner stone of the Government of this Union.

Already the President of the United States has proclaimed his purpose to stand in this contest by what is known as the infamous Force bill, which the country rejected in 1890. Now, ladies and gentlemen, throughout the months that are before us, throughout the long days of arduous toil and vehement discussion, the character of this measure will be spread fully before the American people. I have often heard it said that there is nothing new in vice, that there is nothing new in crime, that he who violates the moral law seldom invents a new dissipation. And I believe there is nothing new in the attempts to overthrow free governments throughout the world. The Force bill is not a Republican bill. The attempt to control elections is just as old as the contest between autocracy and democracy. This attempt to give to local Boards of Supervisors the right to control the House of Representatives is but the old device which was adopted by the English kings when they attempted to stifle the voice of Parliament, and for which one King lost his head and another his throne. In this broad land of ours, in this republic where we have tasted the fruits of free government and enjoyed them, where we know the blessings of liberty and prize them—there is not in all the world not in all the vaults of all the banks and trust companies of civilization, not in all the corruption funds the beneficiaries of a protective tariff can subscribe, not in all the powers of rhetoric, sufficient power to induce the American people tamely to place their necks in the yoke of the Force bill when it involves the destruction of the Government of the United States.

In the presence of such an issue as this it is not partisanship but patriotism that induces us to discuss it on the day devoted to the celebration of the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. I believe that the Declaration of American Independence was valuable not alone for the driving from our shores of a foreign invasion, not alone for the establishment of our Government by a written Constitution, but it was valuable because it gave to the spirit of American liberty and American virtue the opportunity to erect over all this land a growth of constitutional liberty under whose beneficent shade virtue could flourish, every degree of prosperity could be attained, while no tyrant could breathe its atmosphere. Wise as were the fathers who framed our Constitution, deeply laid in politi-

THE POLITICAL SITUATION.

Feeling of Great Confidence in the Different States. New York, July 28.—Some sanguine republicans have been claiming one or perhaps two Southern States for Harrison. The electoral vote of the South seems certain to go solidly for Cleveland. The so-called Southern States have 159 votes in the electoral college. These, with the 67 electoral votes of Connecticut, 16; Indiana, 15; New Jersey, 10; and New York 36, make a total of 226 for the democratic candidates, or three more than the 223 necessary to elect. But the Harrison republicans claim that Harrison carried Indiana and New York in 1888 and can carry them again this year. This claim ignores the marked changes that have occurred since the last presidential election. Mr. Cleveland is stronger than he was four years ago. Mr. Harrison is weaker. The fight against Mr. Cleveland within his own party has been fairly fought out, and those who were his opponents are honestly, earnestly and will be enthusiastically in favor of his election. Hence there is no good ground for concluding that because Mr. Harrison carried democratic New York four years ago he will carry it again this year. As to Indiana, Mr. Harrison is notoriously weaker there now than he was in 1888, when he carried the state by 2348 in a total of nearly 540,000 votes.

The States that may be certainly counted upon as republican are as follows: Idaho, 3; Maine 6; Michigan, 7; Minnesota, 9; New Hampshire, 4; Ohio 24; Pennsylvania, 32; Vermont, 4; Washington, 4. Total, 92.

If New York and Indiana are excluded from the democratic column, the democratic states are: Alabama, 11; Arkansas, 8; Delaware, 3; Florida 4; Georgia, 13; Kentucky, 13; Louisiana, 8; Maryland, 8; Mississippi, 9; Michigan, 7; Missouri, 17; North Carolina, 11; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee, 12; Texas, 15; Virginia, 12; West Virginia, 6; Connecticut, 16; New Jersey, 10. Total 182. Indiana and New York added to these would increase the total democratic vote to 233, and would elect Mr. Cleveland with ten votes to spare.

DOUBTFUL STATES. The following States are doubtful, with a strong possibility that some of them will give Cleveland pluralities: California, 9; Colorado, 4; Illinois, 24; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10; Massachusetts, 15; Nebraska, 8; Montana, 3; Nevada 3; North Dakota, 3; Oregon, 4; Rhode Island, 4; South Dakota, 4; Wisconsin, 12; Wyoming, 3. Total 119.

North and South Dakota have been republican, but the republican pluralities have been steadily decreasing. Wyoming is very close. Still they are perhaps more likely to remain on the republican side than to change over unless the independent movement affects them. California and Oregon are claimed by the republicans, but without any good foundation.

The other doubtful States all voted for Harrison in 1888, but since that year they have undergone a remarkable political revolution, as will appear from a comparison of the pluralities they cast for Harrison in 1888 and their democratic plurality in 1890, the second year of Harrison's administration. The following are the figures:

Table with 3 columns: State, Harrison in 1888, Demo. pl. in 1890. Illinois: 25,104 vs 30,802. Iowa: 22,268 vs 24,929. Massachusetts: 32,997 vs 3,865. Kansas: 99,102 vs 51,078. Nebraska: 27,973 vs 62,531. Rhode Island: 4,229 vs 1,782. Wisconsin: 31,081 vs 30,722.

In Kansas and Nebraska the pluralities in 1890 were of the democracy and farmers' alliance combined over the republicans. This year, through the strong movements of the independents, many thoughtful republicans admit that they are in danger of losing both these States, as well as Colorado, Montana and Nevada.

On the grounds thus set forth many shrewd observers predict a political revolution this year that will sweep over the country east and west as in 1890, and may change the political standing of several of the States.

Farmers' Alliance Men for Cleveland. CHARLESTON, S. C., June 27.—The Elko Farmers' Alliance of Barwell county in this State today adopted the following resolutions:

"We have learned, with disappointment and regret, that the recent Democratic National Convention failed to embody in their platform several measures which have been urged by the Alliance, and which we consider of importance to agriculturists.
