For The Commissioners' Court.

During the past two years we have on several occasions urged upon the late commissioners court a change in the system of building bridges. At present they are built by the overseers and at great expense to the county. As now constructed bridges do not last longer than three to five years. Freshets, soft lumber and unskilled workmanship combined render it necessary to have new bridges on an average of three to five years. The plan we have repeatedly suggested to the last court and which we renew again to the new court is to classify all the bridges of the county. Divide them into first, second and third-classes according to the width of stream to be spanned. The first-class should include all the long bridges in the county, the second class the next longest and the third class those across branches and washouts. The court should require the overseers to build all third-class bridges but the first and second-class should be let out to contractors under sealed bids, the contractor to file a bond guaranteeing to build the bridge according to specifications furnished by the court or the county judge and further guaranteeing, if necessary, that the bridge shall last a given number of years. We again call the attention of the court to the importance of making a change in the system and urge on them the economy of the proposed plan.

Navigation of the Trinity. We clip the following from the Dallas Times-Herald: Work on construction of the snag boat is progressing and will be complete in twenty-five days. Then one trip occupying 20 or 30 days clearing the river of remaining snags and overhanging limbs will place the river in good boatable condition. By February 1st at latest, it is expected to get a boat of freight up the river, and a load of cotton or wheat down to deep water. Then the railroads should, and we don't doubt will give Dallas water rates on the railroad. This only now is needed to put Dallas right before the great southwest as the commercial and shipping center of this great and fast growing wheat, corn, cotton, and meat producing country.
