Hicks said it was extremely difficult for persons to show hostility to a person who was the same as they were, as he observed the self-conscious persons who found themselves virtually unable and unwilling to stare down their table com-

panions. "What makes a good educator?" asked Hicks, "The first rule is organization. Number two is enthusiasm for your work and exhibition of the fact that 'I like what I'm doing. The third prerequisite is love, soul or empathy, showing that 'I care about you and what you think

about me.' "Teachers and educators should be willing to change their methods for new-unwanted kids in school and relate your scheduling to their needs. Show that We're integrated-we're American-we'll look the part and we'll act the part," he added. "This sounds good, but is it being done. 





AUSTIN, Tex.--Legislative Board met here August 24 to begin consideration of state senatorial reapportionment.

Shortly after the Board announced its meeting date, Gov. Preston Smith issued a sharplyworded statement calling on the Board to forget "political considerations" and start work on a House of Representative redistricting bill also.

Smith noted the fact that Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin's appealing a district court decision invalidating the 1971 legislative act which attempted to reapportion the House does not preclude the Board from preparing for any eventuality.

Supreme Court of Texas, Governor noted, may uphold or over-turn the district court's August 2 decision that the Legislature illegally divided more than 20 counties. In either case, he said, the Board should be prepared with a House as well as a Senate reapportionment plan to avoid the need for a "million dollar" special session of the Legislature.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, a member of the Legislative Redistricting Board, expressed surprise at Smith's blast. He said the Board has made no decision not to consider House redistricting and, indeed, has not even discussed the issue.

Board has just 60 days to draw the reapportionment after its initial meeting which means its lifespan expires in late





Cool, Rainy Weather Hampering Cotton

Some maturity time has been lost since August one that can never be completely recovered. The prolonged cool, rainy spell will have some important effects on cotton the remainder of the season points out J.K. Adams, co-agent. First, vegetative or top growth will take place at the expense of fruit development. The thick canopy of leaves that prevents sunlight getting to the lower parts of the plant will cause many young to shed and slow development of bolls which have set near the bottom of the plant, Excessive shedding of squares and young bolls can also be expected after a prolonged, cloudy period points out Adams. Shedding of small bolls usually occurs three to ten days after white bloom, but the completion of the shedding process is slowed by low temperature

etative growth usually follows excessive fruit shed. Producers can expect to see an increase in the wilt diseases since weather conditions have been ideal for infection to develop during the last two weeks. Symptoms will become more evident as warmer weather returns and plants are. subject to greater moisture

and may not be too evident until the temperature rises again. Bolls that are ten days older

will seldom shed. Rapid veg-

A boll set from a white bloom in late August will require 60 to 70 days to open depending on temperature. Thus bolls being set now will not reach maturity begore November one points out Adams. Lower than normal temperatures would lengthen the boll period and bolls set after this date would be more subject to severe damage by first freeze.


The micronaire of fiber from late set bolls will be low and recent cool weather has likely reduced the micronaire of fiber in the earlier set crop. No doubt, the overall micronaire of the crop can be expected to be lower than usual. Very little effect on staple length is expected. Wet, cloudy weather would tend to increase fiber length slightly while lower temperatures would likely reduce length. Thus, two opposite effects on fiber length have been in operation. It is unlikely that fiber strength has been

changed. With a normal or higher temperature and normal freeze date much of our cotton has an op-

The cool, wet weather has im- portunity to make good yields of acceptable quality fiber. careful attention to proper insect control programs. Producers should consider herbicedes for layby weed control rather than mechanical cultivation. Frequently, root pruning from tillage increases fruit shed and wilt disease. So in view of our present maturity situation this year's crop will demand our best management during the short time remaining before frost.
