THE FULL COMMITTEE IS NOW WRESTLING WITH THE TARIFF QUESTION.

A Comparison of the Probable Revenues Under Several Propositions—They Talked All Day About a Street Railway in the District of Columbia.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The senate finance committee had the tariff bill up for consideration yesterday. Mr. Aldrich moved a resolution fixing workingmen, farmers and manufacturers five days in which to be heard upon the bill, but it was defeated by a strictly party vote. Ten articles of the bill were passed without change. The committee was supplied with a tabulated statement prepared by the treasury department showing in detail the amount which it is estimated will be received under the senate bill if it should become a law, also giving the estimated amount of the returns from the treasury department under the present law for 1893. The statement also gives an estimate of the increase in the internal revenue under the senate bill, which is as follows: Income tax, \$90,000,000; spirits, \$20,000,000; cigars, \$9,000,000; sugar, \$1,600,000; playing cards, \$5,000,000; total increase, \$165,500,000. The estimated duties of the senate bill as compared with those of the present law, and the returns thereunder, are as follows: Cigars, \$198,373,432; house \$124,693,044; senate, \$163,903,771. The average duty on cigars under the present law is 49.98; under the senate bill, 35.52; under the tariff bill, 34.19. The comparison of the sugar schedule shows that during the last year 15,490,022 gallons of sugar were imported, upon which no duty was paid, but which under the senate bill would produce \$302,815. During the year 1892, 15,219,987 gallons of sugar were imported at \$14,959,570, would be imported free. Upon this the senate bill would yield a revenue of \$1,043,413.

POLICY UNCHANGED.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH IS BRIEF AND POINTED.

London, March 13.—Parliament resumed its sitting yesterday entering upon a period that is of the greatest importance to the empire and marking what may prove to be the beginning of a complete reorganization of parties. In the speech from the throne the queen said: "Negotiations are in progress with the United States for the purpose of executing the award of the court of arbitration in the question of the fisheries of the Behring sea. Two collisions accompanied by lamentable loss of life lately occurred in the French colonies in west Africa. I await the result of the inquiry in regard to these deplorable occurrences with full confidence that they will be examined in a calm and dignified manner. I also await the result of an inquiry into such an occasion." Lord Rosebery then delivered an address.
