RAILROADS AND PUBLIC LANDS. ANTI-MONOPOLY LEGISLATION. The policy which culminated in the passage by the last legislature of laws defining per petuisies and preventing land monopolies by corporations, regulating the issuance of city and countr bonds, and the issuance of stock and counts bouds, and the issuance of stock and bonds by railway companies, though conscientiously and bitterly opposed at the tims, will in my judgment, be accepted by the great majority of the people as just and salutary. Monopolies in any form or for any purpose are odious and those which would the uplands in perpetuity and prevent their use and free alienation arrest the progress and development of a state. Our constitution but gives voice to this truth in declaring that "perpetuities and monopolies are contrary to the genius of a free government, and shall not be allowed." In evasion of these provisions, corporations have so uniformly only colorably alienated their lands that the framers of the present constitution specially made it "the duty of the Attorney General, in every instance where alienations have been or hereafter may be made, to inquire into the same, and if such alienation has been made in fraud of the rights of the State, and is colorably only, the shippers. Commissioners in sympathy with the policy should be secured who hear such characters for ability, integrity and impartiality that rates fixed by them will carry if possible the weight of a judgment by our suprems court. The statute requires that the rates established shall be reasonable and it should be enforced resolutely and in good faith. This requirement is not only eminently just in itself, but absolutely necessary to keep the faith upon which our existing railways were constructed and to promote and encourage the building of others so essential to the development and growth of our state. DEMOCRATS UNITED.

THE SENATE ASSURED.

Hall is the Only Traitor. Washington, D. C., May 3 .- The good news which was circulated about the senate end of the Capitol early this morning, to the effect that 43 senators had announced their intention to support the demcratic tariff bill to be brought in by the Finance Committee, was confirmed tonight.






