

MILLS AS A STATESMAN.

NOT A MAN FROM TEXAS HAS ATTAINED HIS BANK.

His Tariff Speech Will Bank With the Greatest in Current Years.

Washington, April 29.—Last Tuesday Senator Mills closed the general debate for the Democrats on the Tariff Bill in a speech that will rank with the greatest this generation has heard.

Mr. Mills is one of the few men who can make the subject of political economy entertaining to the average mind, and for the two hours and upward that the speaker's galleries were crowded with attentive listeners and every Senator in the city was in his seat.

His career in the Senate has greatly aided Mr. Mills' fame. No man that Texas ever sent to the National Councils, not Houston, not Wiggall, attained the rank as a statesman that Mr. Mills has.

In the first place, nature endowed him with a superior mind, and a capacity for long, continued and laborious study; in the second place, he is indexibly honest, mentally and morally, and in the third place, he is endowed with superb courage, mental, moral and physical.

More than any other man in public life Mills regulates his course as a statesman by principle. If he is unable to find justification for a policy in the works of Jefferson and no man since Jefferson himself has been so familiar with those works he opposes that policy.

and ought not to be marred by any such commonplace considerations. I suppose our friends were going to let the emigrants provide the vessels for themselves.

"Now, of the non-agricultural population of the United States one-third are manufacturing laborers. Let us assume that one-third of these will be one-third of 54,000,000 will be 18,000,000, who have to come and be supported by manufacturing labor.

"Again, by the same division of our population, one-third that makes 6,000,000 laborers who have to come here in one year. Six million of manufacturing laborers have to be brought by the McKinley law to this country.

"The above is a sample brick from this powerful speech, a speech, which if read and studied by every wheat grower in the United States would settle the tariff question for good and all, and settle it right.

Then he goes on to show that according to the Republican doctrine the \$5,000,000,000 (five billions) worth of surplus manufactured products must be consumed at home, and there would be a most delightful kettle of fish.

Here is another sample of this great speech that made the far fly. Read it and ponder it: We do not import the thing we produce. We import woolen goods but not the kind we make at home.

"In one ton of steel rails the labor cost is \$3; the tariff is \$13.44. "In 100 worth of outley the labor cost is \$44.24; the tariff is \$80.11. "In 100 worth of silk piece goods the labor cost is \$22.54; the tariff is \$60.

"In 100 worth of pearl buttons the labor cost is \$39.69; the tariff is \$143.61. "In 100 worth of tanin the labor cost is \$16.34; the tariff is \$119.47. "In a ton of coal the labor cost is 40 to 50 cents; the tariff is 75 cents.

"In \$100 worth of common window glass the labor cost is \$38.00 the tariff is \$98.39. "In one ton of pig iron the labor cost is \$1.50; the tariff is \$6.72. "In one ton of bar iron the labor cost \$4.57, the tariff is \$52.98."

"This statement was unchallenged by any Republican Senator, and it can not be challenged. They for whose benefit is the tariff? Who gets the bounty? It is as clear as the sun in the heaven that the tariff is for the man who owns the product, and not for the laborer who makes the product.

He closed with a discussion of the income tax features of the bill as able and as eloquent as anything that he had said before. He literally skinned the speech Hill had made some time before.

"The editor of the Texas Farm and Ranch gives Texas is all right, and thinks good reasons for thinking so. He says: Agriculture is the basis of prosperity, and if we consider the value of our agricultural products in a single year, the conclusion forces itself upon us irresistibly that the possibilities of Texas are simply incalculable.
