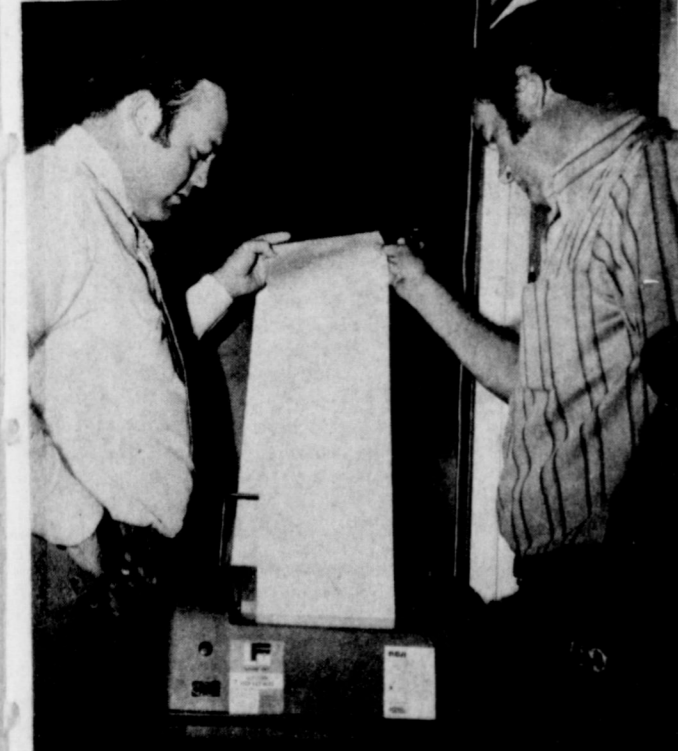

Muleshoe State Bank Offers New Services

Two new customer services have been instituted at Muleshoe State Bank recently, according to information checked with President Bill Loyd. One new service is a recently-acquired teletype to receive current market information and quotations from Kansas City. The teletype is installed in the entrance foyer of the bank and Loyd said the bank has subscribed to the commodities section which is the section of local interest. Information received from Kansas City included quotations on cattle dress beef, beef cuts, choice beef cuts, bull beef, steer

beef, heifer beef, fat stock and stocker cattle as well as fresh pork, hog bellies and hams, along with calves and hogs. Also received on the teletype are quotations on corn, milo, soybeans, wheat, potatoes and treasurer bonds quotations, and many others. Other information includes information with any bearing on agriculture, as well as releases from the agriculture department in Washington and from the president of Farm Bureau and other farm and agriculture-related sources. The 10 most active stocks on the New York Stock Exchange are listed along with the Dow-Jones averages and quotations from the New York Stock Exchange.

Each morning, the world monetary changes are outlined, including quotes from Japan, Germany and other countries. Loyd said that with the new teletype service, Muleshoe State Bank will have immediate information on the current agriculturally related markets at their fingertips and available for interested persons. The second new service at the bank is the Survivor Option Service (SOS) which will be handled by Bob Finney. He has received special training to enable this service to be conducted. Finney said that with the SOS operation, he will not act as an attorney, but will merely advise survivors in a death, the systematic way to approach a death in a family as far as collecting benefits which may be due the survivor. He stressed that the service is not limited to Muleshoe State Bank customers, but is provided free of charge to anyone in the community for the dual purpose of helping the com-

10 Years Ago
September, 1961
"The old gray mule, he ain't what he used to be", because now he isn't gray at all. He has stepped out of the back lot and right into high style, all dressed in bronze. Or at least that is the plan for him. With headquarters in Muleshoe, the Mule Memorial Association is determined that the passing of the mule from the modern scene shall not go unnoticed or unremembered. So far, the story of the Muleshoe Mules Association fund has seen print in such far-away places as the New York Times, the Ft. Worth Star Telegram, papers in Chicago, Atlanta and so on.

And it all started, for Muleshoe, when a fourth grade class at Richland Hills Elementary School heard of the plan by Dr. J.B. Barnett, Marlin, to build a monument to a mule. "Mrs. Middlebrooks fourth grade students of Richland Hills School are writing you in regard to the Monument to the Mule. We would like very much to have it in our town. The part of West Texas that has Muleshoe for the County Seat was a ranch in the early 1900's. The town got its name from the Muleshoe Ranch. We have 5,320 citizens, some cats, dogs and three mules. Our boy's football team is called the Muleshoe Mules and so is their basketball team. The girls' teams are called Mulettes.

We want to make a contribution to help build this monument. Please put the monument here in Muleshoe where we believe it belongs and where citizens would look at it with pride. Signed Mrs. Middlebrooks Class."

Location for the Mules has not been decided on, but there are several possible sights. The monument is expected to cost about \$15,000. Muleshoe Fire Chief Earl Ladd this week congratulated 50 local people for their efforts in studying civil defense procedures. Ladd said the 50 persons had just completed a 12 hour course in civil defense, involving a plan of survival in case of total war or any other emergency. Included in the course were radio, fallout shelter, foods and storage, chemical, atomic and hydrogen warfare protection.

20 Years Ago
September 1951
John Gammons and Lee Pool carried off top honors in the whirlwind membership drive conducted by the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce last Friday.

Working as a team, Gammons and Pool signed up 16 new members who pledged a total of \$1,100 in the drive that netted 48 members and added almost \$3,000 to the operating budget. Jim Cox and Herb Covin ran the leaders a close race to capture second place with 15 members enrolled for pledges totaling \$798.00.

Closely bunched behind the leading teams were Houston Hart and Loyd Roberts who won the distinction of signing the largest single pledge received during the short intensive campaign. Also competing were Harvey Bass and Jeff Peeler and the Morris Childers-W.Q. Casey combination. Bailey County's first bale of cotton from the 1951 crop will be auctioned off at a public sale to be conducted on Main Street in Muleshoe Saturday, September 15. A local cotton classer will sample and class

the bale prior to the auction. Alex Reid, who farms about four miles southwest of Baileyboro is the grower of the first bale to reach a gin in this county this season.

As has been the custom for several years, Reid will receive recognition and a special bonus for his achievement.

At the request of the ginners, Shafer and McDonald, and several of the business houses in Muleshoe, the Chamber of Commerce will arrange the presentation event. This will be in the form of an auction sale to be conducted at 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon on Main Street. At this time, qualified cotton buyers will grade the sample and bid in the bale at its true market value.

The representatives of participating business houses will raise the price a cent or more a pound, paying only the difference between their bid and the price immediately preceding their bid.

September 1941

If residents of Muleshoe and vicinity are sufficiently interested, a 24 hour first aid standard Red Cross school may be conducted here, Rev. R.N. Huckabee, Red Cross chairman, said this week. Tentative plans, contingent upon the amount or interest shown provide for holding classes one night a week at the county courthouse.

The official Red Cross textbook would be used, and certificates of credit given those successfully completing the course. Men and women over 16 years of age, are eligible for such courses. The number of sessions each week would be decided by members of the class.

Such first aid courses should be taken by all prospective service men and prospective emergency nurses, as well as workers in shops and factories, and all who might be called upon at home or on the highway to render aid in emergencies. Grocery specials this week included coffee, 20 cents for a one pound can; cookies, two, one pound bags, 25 cents; Cut Riet waxpaper, six cents a roll; rice, 23 cents for a three pound bag; peas, two cans for 9 cents; beef roast, 21 cents a pound; milk, six cans for 25 cents; flour, 48 pounds for \$1.63; and hominy, two cans for eight cents.

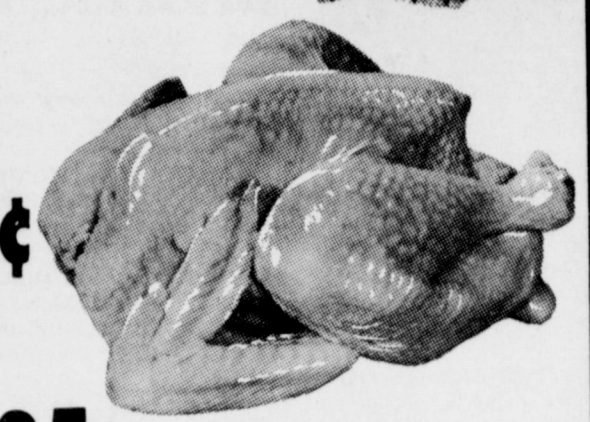

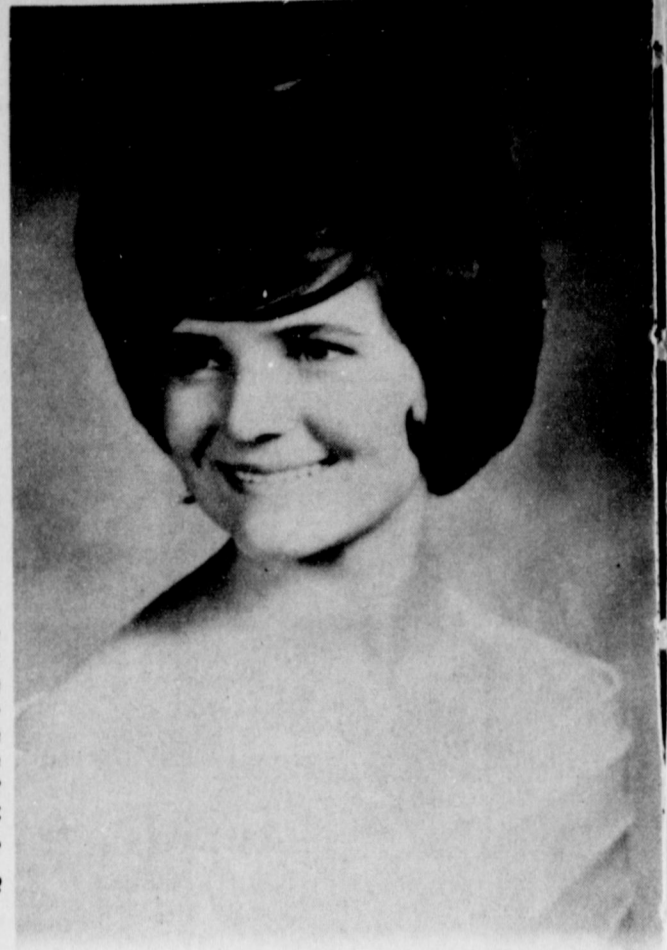

"Who Says We Can't Move Beyond Confrontation to Share Problem Solving by Studying the Family, the Community, Education and Human Relations" is the topic for the year of the Muleshoe Elementary P-TA. The Parent-Teacher Association met Monday night, September 13, at 7:30 p.m. in the Mary DeShazo Cafeteria.

Mrs. Don Harmon introduced Corkey Green, local attorney as the first speaker on a panel of citizens who discussed local problems during a rap session. Green is the chairman of the Clean-Up Campaign in Muleshoe. Using the subject "Who Says We Can't Have a Clean Community", Green told of several pending actions being done to accomplish this. He pointed out that publicity was the first step necessary in order to make the general public conscious of living in a clean community. Surveys were made about the signs that are located on the edges of town. Some

needed to be redone or taken down and some needed repainting, he said.

Green reminded the audience that "we do have a junk car ordinance; the action line can be used to let the Chamber of Commerce know of any problems that need action taken. The Clean-Up Campaign is not something that can be done by a few people-everyone needs to support and co-operate with this effort - a clean city gives a better impression to people passing through", he concluded.

Ben Gramling, counselor at Muleshoe Junior High School and Muleshoe High School, was the next speaker. His topic was "Dropouts are a Community Problem". He reported "Most kids seen downtown during school hours are dropouts. These kids are untrained, unskilled and unmotivated. This is so because in some way, we fail these children.

The problem is sociological and economical as dropouts earn less than the average high school

graduate. Prisons contain vast majorities of people that have less than a high school education", he said. "These children are angry and frustrated and are determined failures by our own standards. While the individual is at fault to a certain extent, we are at fault to a certain extent as we impose our system on them."

Gramling explained that "vocational education in one answer to this problem-everyone needs to feel worthwhile and that the job he does is dignif-

ied. Bi-lingual education is something that helps in early grades."

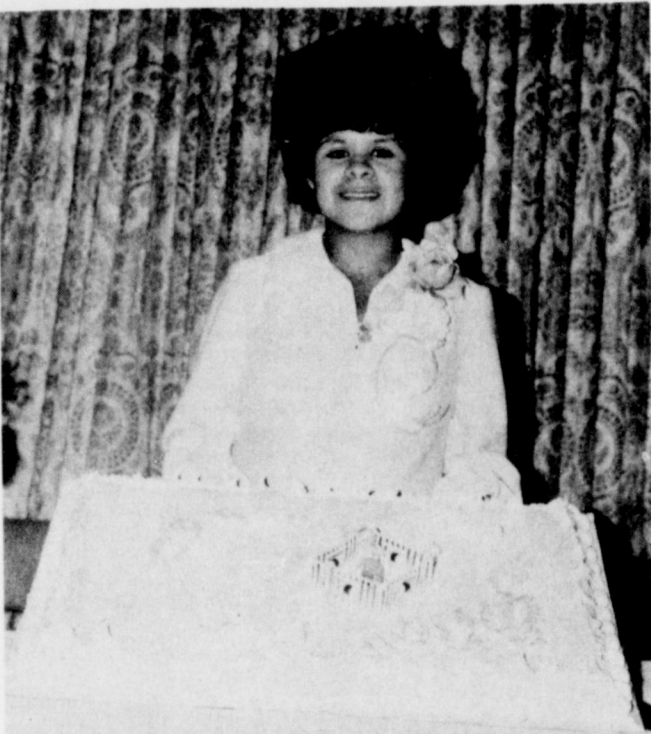

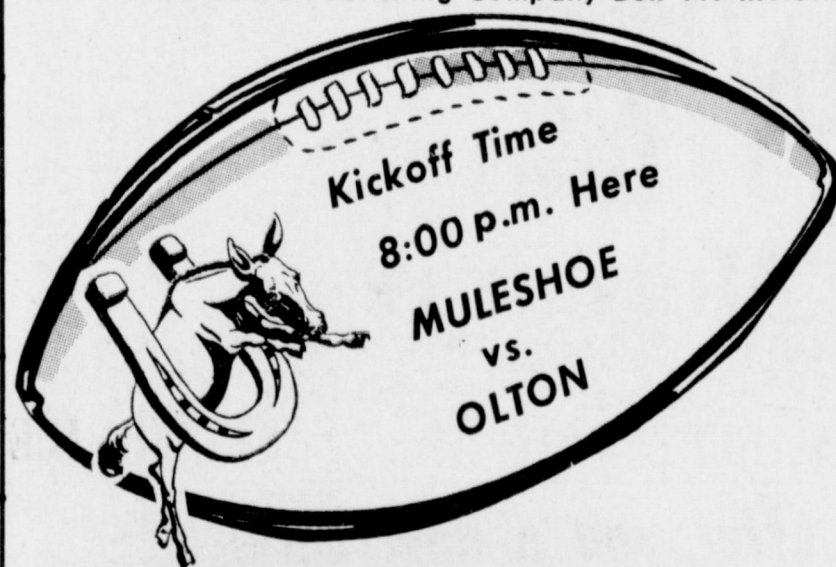

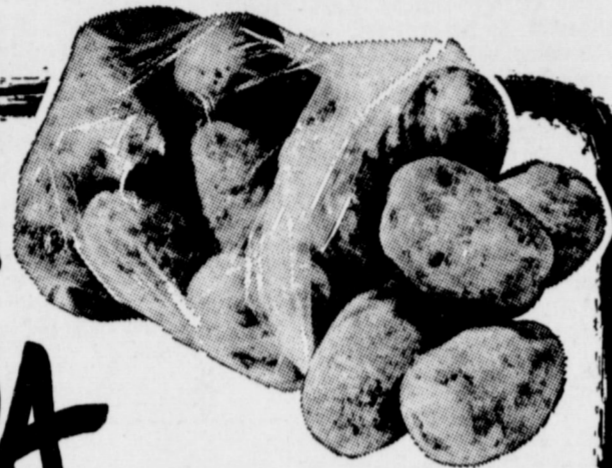
