



The vote in this congressional district stood Cooper 23,273, Coulson 16,223.

The legislature meets the 8th of January. The inauguration of Governor Culberson will follow about a week later.

EX-GOVERNOR ROSS has accepted appointment on the railroad commission. The appointment gives general satisfaction.

GOVERNOR HOGG retires from office with a deficiency of seven hundred thousand dollars. He is bequeathing a legacy of woes to his successor.

All Crockett needs from now on is a broad-gauged liberal policy on the part of the city government. Given this, and in two years the population of the town will be 5000.

GOVERNOR ELECT CULBERSON has made some admirable appointments. He has also made, we fear, some mistakes in removing a few of the present officials.

GRAPELAND is growing rapidly. They already have a population of 600 and still they come. The people up there are talking of incorporating and electing a Mayor and Council.

JUDGE BURNETT qualified at Palestine last week. About the first thing he did was the appointment of the following jury commission: G. R. Cooke (Rep.), B. F. Chambers (Pop.) and G. W. Hudson (Dem.).

GOVERNOR ROSS' friends generally hope that he will not decline the appointment on the Rail Road Commission. The selection is an admirable one and all classes of citizens have confidence in his ability and fair-mindedness.

Houston county will be in it from now on. Immigrants are coming this way and enterprise and capital too. Already work has begun on one railroad that passes through the county and another is headed this way which will run to Crockett or very close to it.

If the present congress will reform the financial system and give the country more liberal banking facilities, the condition of things will be vastly improved. One trouble has been the difficulty of organizing banks under the system as it now exists.

The writer spent Monday in Grapeland. The growth of the town in the last five years is indeed remarkable. The people there claim with good reason a population of 600 and are agitating the matter of incorporating the little city and electing a Mayor and Council. It is gratifying to note the evidences of progress to be seen there on all hands. Handsome residences are going up on all sides and elegant churches are being built by all denominations. The people are live, energetic and enterprising and extend an open hand to all who come. They have a fine school taught in a fine school building and largely patronized. We put in the day there pleasantly and at night attended a Christmas tree given by the ladies of the Christian Church. The exercises opened with a very neat and appropriate address by the S. School superintendent, Walter Stone, followed by some choice selections of music rendered by the following ladies: Mrs. Annie Aldrich, Miss Minnie Meriwether, Miss Stella Hollingsworth, Miss Cora Martin, Miss Nannie Hollingsworth, Miss Eva Hollingsworth and Miss Ada Brimberry.

The great business done by Crockett this season should make a profound impression on the Mayor and aldermen of the town. The lesson taught by it is that the growth in population and trade of the town calls for a liberal and progressive policy on the part of those in charge of the town's affairs. It has been evident for two months that the square and the streets leading there are not large enough to accommodate the trading and travelling public. It is not possible for the Mayor or the Council to enlarge the public square but they can do something toward keeping the approaches to it free from obstructions and thereby give more room. They can have steps and galleries and trees and other stumbling blocks removed and the side-walks put in a safe and comfortable condition. The side-walk leading by the post-office and on is a public scandal. It is not possible in daylight to travel it with any comfort and at night it is simply impassable and dangerous. If the city council has authority to pay out a hundred dollars, more or less, for the side-walk leading to depot, why can't they do something for post-office street that has ten times the travel on it the other has?

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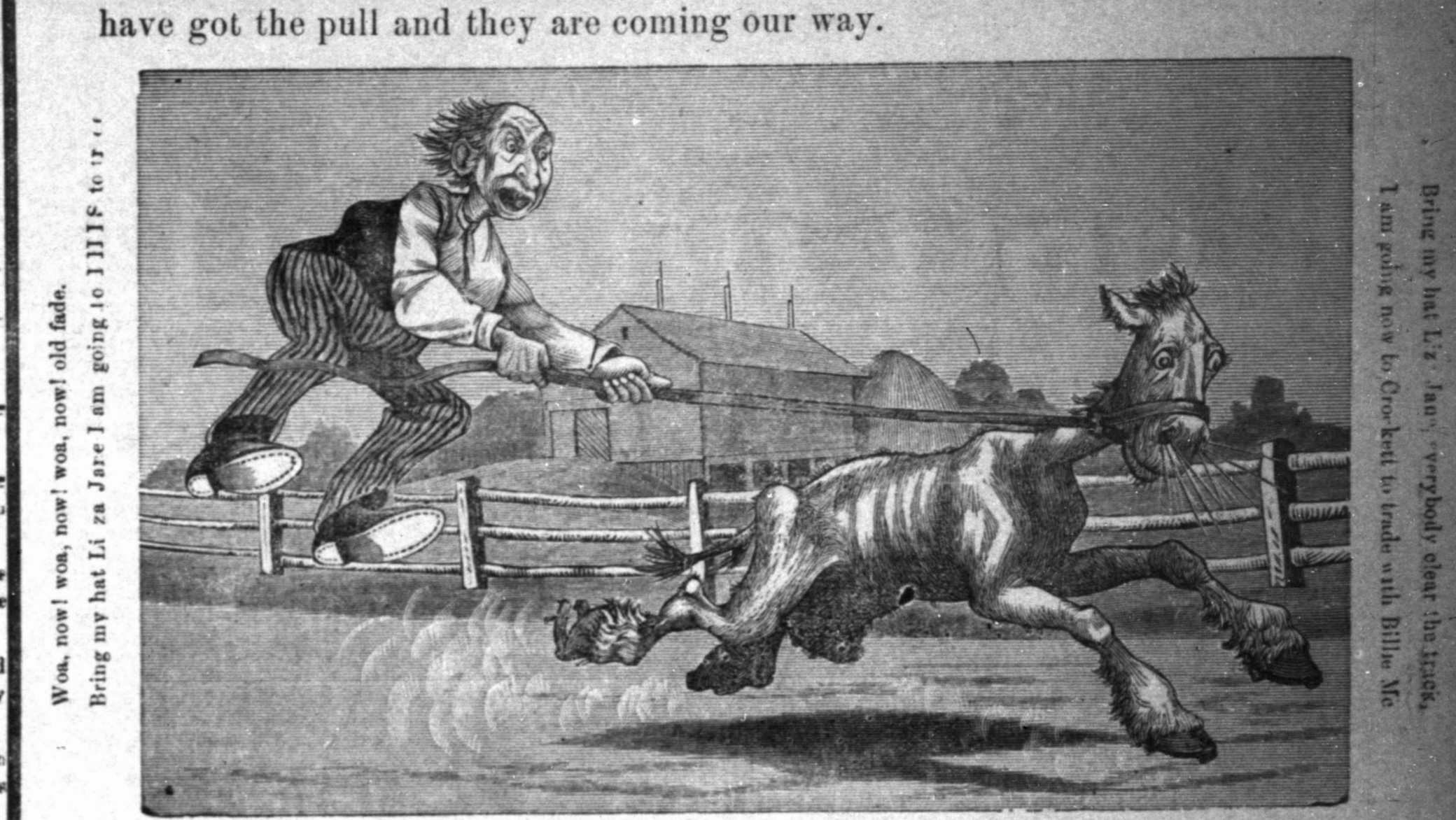
