## ENTOMOLOGY

A Necessary Adjunct to Scientific If we think a moment nothing impresses us more forcibly than our ignorance of our own eavironments. We can' learn much in a short life compared with the sum total of modern science, and should would be more thal known, w woula be more appalled at our ig sorance manh now.
still there are branches of science so intimately connected with certain occupations and of such vita iuppraice to men so employed, that they cannot afford to work without some practical knowledge of such subjects.
Such is the relation of entomology to agrieulture. Entomology
may bo deflued as thet may bo deflued as that division of natural history relating to insects. Many insects are destructive to crops. To combat them success fully we must stady their habits. Let us examine for instance, elass of insects that uudergo two transiormatloase of insect life belong batterflier, moths, house flies, beetle, bees, ants, wasps, elc. sowe of lhese are his atuf while othere supply his his surf, hicious honey - hectar fit for the gods.
An insect of thes clase when it frrst hatches from the egg is a larva. If the larva has lege and is capable of loosmation it is a caterpillar. The cotton worm, tobacco worm, boll- worm, and web worm are common examples. If the larva is withoen legs it is a grub or a maggot.

The larve of ants, bees, house flies, etc. are familiar examples. The lerve of butterflies are citerpillars and are very greedy. They grow rapidly and devoar a prodigous anount of food. One boll worm I captured when about half grown literally gatted ten large green cotton bolls I fed him before he attained his growth. I believe bolls of cotton during his entire existence as a caterpillar
The first change in the metamorphosis of the insect is when the larva becomes a pupa or chrysalis. It is then the caterpillar thickens up and grows shorter. Sometimes the worm weaves a cocoon or nest, or as we express it "webs up" as the cotton worm. Others simply suspend their bodies, head downward from a leaf or twig. The form of the animal is changed and the legs disappear. Some chrysales are very beautiful. The pupa is incapable of eatirg anything; but its inertia is only an armistice, not a permanent peace. In a brief perlod, varying as the insects differ, the second change occurs and the metarmorphosis is complete. The pupa bursts forth an imago. The worm has turned to a butterfly. The grub becomes a beetle. The fish bait has changed to a wasp and is flying aroung with his "stinger out" looking for the be that threw stones at his nest.
Of all the insects of this class, caterpiliars are, perhaps, the most destructive. The pium crop in this rection was ruined and many

ericosas.)

The ent or web worm is the larva or a bown butterfly. The female deposits her eggs in a waterproof capale or nest encircling a wig of the ruit tree in the summer. Here the eggs remain until the tree begins to nut out in the spring, when bree to five hundred caterpillars hatch out and begin to eat the folaze or blooms. They spin themelves a lent or nest where they assemble to rest in a fork of the ree. When he goes out foraging, aterpillar spins a fine thread as he goes out which guides him in returning to his "tent," I have
known a single nest of these worms o strip a tree in a few hours. The only sure way to fight them is tolgo through the trees carefully in the winter when the leaves are off and take the eggs off the twigs. If evry nest of eggs is removed not a eb worm will appear. You ask how I know what hatterfly is the imago of the web worm? How Ice Uame To a Liontsiana "Talk abont hailstorms," said Col. Marin of lafourche the wors
hailstorm I ever saw occurred in my parish several weeks sgo and without exaggeration the hail tones were the largest on record at least in the annals of Lafourche parish.

A peculiar feature of the storm was the tact that upon the Arcadia platform of Mr. Price, the stone were as large as hen's eggs, completely stripping the cane and other growing staff, breaking the slate upon the shed $\backslash$ and sugar house, and causing severe injurie to a number of the negrós who were in the fie!d. The droppin of the hail sounded like the bom bardment of a battery of artillery, and when the storm ceased it wa ound that neariy eighteen inche of hail had falten in a partioutar spot upon the plantation. This was ascertained by a measurement of the deposits in several cane carte which were in the storm. In orde to preserve as many of the enormous stones as possible Col. Will Price had the hands shovel severa tons intn his cold storage room and they are still there, although
more or less frozent into an almost more or less frozen intoan almos indistinguishable mass of ice.
