## War Reminiscences.

CBy W. D. A. Cind Croctel, rexas. 1 About the first of Oct., 1861, we
moved from Man assas to Camp moved from Manassas to Camp McCloud, near the quaint old town of Dumfries situated on Quantic Bay, an arm of the Potomac Riv Wr, that reached up into Prince Wiluan Co. Va. D settled by the Scotch in the earl day and at this time showed evidences of its antiquity, as 1726 on their corner stone. below the mouth of Quantico Bay Evaneport we had erected a bat tery, bghind the undergrowth thist lined the river with the hope blockading the Potomac. Whe it was completed with three heavy guns ready for action the bushen were cut away and exposed to the enemy a formidable barrier to the river's navigation. Our regiment was ordered to the support of this battery and took position near by at what was known as Camp Guantion with instructions to pre vent the landing of any froes on our side of the bay'aa approach wa only acoessible from that side. It was here wo heard our first big guns. When it became know that a gun boat was coming dow the river Capt. Currie ordered the writer to take a position on To bott's Hill, overlooking the rive and report the movements of the boat, with addtitional orders to keep under cover and not expose our presence. After crawling the top, he took position behind large rock, and waited develop ments. Soon a large vessel was seen coming down, and was eri dent we were going to have some heard heasy firing great mas the heard hoavy all The writer be axpechanly all. This single shot was enough for both infantry and artillery. All ran to cover and when reported to company created quite a sensation. It seemed that this shot was a signal to a boat that was to follow. So intense was the ex citement that our men forgot al d with and soon the hill was cover thing but the grand and awe-in apiring scene before them; indiffer ont to the bursting and screaming shells about them theyfollowed each hot from our gallant little battery as the splinters flew from the ves-
sel's side proving their nerve and sel's side proving
accuracy of aim.

Our men on the no reaults. ©ur men on the contrary went tne ball skipping on the wa ter and almost every shot whld We learned afterward she was struck with 18 shot and sank the mouth of Acquis Creek, miles below with the loss of seyer al men, while our loss was only the ammunition used. This battery proved troublesome to navigation and whes a few weeks later another battery of four guns was put in at Cock Pitt Point, 3 miles above, all the traffic on the river was virtuilly stopped. The efforts of boats to run the blockade in fogs and at nights kept the batteries on the alert, and many paid dearly for their rashness. Shortly after this blocknde was established, the enemy sent a small boat, the "George Page" to protect their shipping. She lay off the Maryand shore, opposite Evansport and popped awav wich her little guns in the vain effort to silence our battery. We soon grew tired of this and one dark night 3 boats with muffled oars stole silently across the river and before the enemy were aware of their presence, boarded and captured her without

## Taxes Must be Paid

 by January 1st.In view of the fact that the procedure for seizure and sale of landd property for taxes has been entirely chaiged by the provisions of hapter 42, laws of the Twenty-Fourth Legislature, youare respeetfully dvised as follows:

The collection of taxes by levy and sale, by tax collectors, of pernal property, for all delinquent taxes due by the owner thereof, is sed for by the following law:
Ses arthcle 4746, act of 1887, page 128 and brought, forward in the Revised Statute
