Report of the Finance Committee. To the Hon. John Young Gooch District Judge
The committee appointed by your Honor to examine into the financial condition of Houston eounty and the manner in which the business of the county is conducted by its officials, herewith submit our report: We have carefully gone over the books and accounts, of the different officers, proverne we asve fouad former finance committee there are still many matters that are irregular and should be corrected. In examining the books of the county clerk we find he has not kept the finance ledger as required by Art. 824 , Revised Civil Statutes, and yet continues to draw the amount of $\$ 100.00$ a year for servies not rendered. It is impossibie to get any information as to ty from the ledger as tept coun ty from the ledger as kept, and it should be a complete recurd of al the financial transactions of the county. Art. 2495i of the Stat utes requires certain of the county onicers to keep a detailed state ment of the fees and commissions collected by them, and we find that only one of the county officers has complied with tais law. The county elerk has filed a report of feem
and commissions collected by him but it is not kept in detail as the law requires, and we doubt if it correct. If a correct detailed statement of fees and commission were kept we believe there would be a balance due the county from this office. Art. 2495 g provides a penalty for fallure to make these
statements. Art. 824 a requires the county elfrk to make a quarteriy state ef court of all money received dd paid out by the county treas the county clerk to make an annuIf statement of the financial condi ticn of the county and have same laws have not been complied with by the clerk so far as we can as certain.
We called on the county clerk to ehow us the bond filed by par ties, who build a number of bridge Ior the county under contract, and aiso the bond filed by parties who depot, hut they could not be found.

We found bills for atationery had been allowed al the November and February terma of the court thas could not possibly have been for the use of the county-being blank land notes, blank deeds and bonds for title anounting to about tharty-five dollars.
We attach the invoices of this stationery to this report showing the county officers who bougnt, or to whom this stationery was shipped. Sucb negligence on the pari of the court in allowing these bill deserves the neverest condemnation. Other extravagant and useless bills have inen allowed, one of which
a bill for $\$ 16.00$ for writing and printing four bonds. From what we can learn this is an enormously bigh price for thit work and while of itself it is me a invere amount, it of itwelf it is ner a-arue amount, it court has been in allowing bills against the county. We will state in justice to all parties concerned that the money refunded to the County Judge by the commiscioners' court at the November term for errors in the report of the last finance committee was done in good faith, they baving acted on copy of the report certified to by the Dist. Olerk. Ths amount of $\$ 3.00$ should have bren refunded, but the errors of the Dist. Clerk made it \$17.00.
We wish to again call attention to the fact that the commiseioners' court allow themselves $\$ 2.00$ tor letting contract for any bridge and $\$ 2.00$ for receiving same for which there is no authority of law so far as we can ascertain.
We do not find that the county attorney made a quarterly report to the commissioners' court as the law requires.

The bonds of the county shousid be retired as rapidiy as just to get to pay interest on them.
There is over eleven thousand ollars in the permanent sebon fund uninvested. An order ha been passed by the commiseioner court instructing the County Judge 0 invest five thousadd dollars this and the Judge tells us step have been taken toward carrying ut the order. All of this money should be invested as early as posnible.
One of the heaviest items of ex pense to the county is in the mal ler of building bridges and buying lumber for same. A great part of the present debt of the county wae made by building bridges, in many ases needless ones.
We would suggest to the com rissioners' court that they curtail his part of the county's expens at least until its finances are i etter shape.
The books of the $\operatorname{tax}$ collector we found in good shape, he being the only one of the officers wh was able to make a correet state ment of tees and commissions lected.
No settlement has been made by The sheriff for the last sale of land or delinquent taxes.
