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According to the national agricultural department, the average condition of winter wheat in Texas on April 1 was 63 per cent.

W. A. Chambers of Valley Mills sold 157 head of cattle to Burch & Kellbaln, who, in turn, sold them to Adams & Odle of Meridia.

Matt Zoliner, near Chisholm, Rockwall.county, is planting 800 acres in cotton. Thirty cotton planters were there at work at one time on his farm.

W. E. H. Featherstone of Henrictta purchased of Loving cattle company 28,000 acres in Jack and Young counties, and 4000 head of cattle. The consideration was \$200,000.

According to official statements, France is using large quantities of fresh meat from the United States, notwithstanding her prohibition of importation of cattle on foot.

For the summer season of 1900-March 1 to Nov. 1-the western packing of hogs was 23,600,000 head, or 1,400,000 more than the preceding year, and within 51,060 of the high record two years ago.

The recent storms in the northwestern range states will result in considerable loss to the stockmen, as cattle which have come through the winter on grass alone, are not in condition to weather severe storms.

There is a tobacco transplanting machine in operation in Lavaca coun ty. It is drawn by two horses, and with it a man and two boys can transplant five acres of tobacco plants daily.

Jno. M. Shelton, the well known stockmen of Mobeetie, has just bought from Ira H. Evans of Austin 32,849 acres of land on the north fork of Red river, in Wheeler county, and adjo.ning his other ranch property for \$65,000.

Strawberry shipments aroud Tyler last year amounted to about eighty carloads. Growers estimate this year's crop at 200 crates per acre, and place its value at from \$60,000 to \$80,000. Smith county's entire strawherry crop will probably bring nearly \$200,000.

According to the records of the Kansas City Stockyards company there were 29,910 head of cattle from the state of Texas marketed there during the first three months of the year. During the same period in 1909 receipts from Texas were 17,289.





TIME IS GOLDEN.

Opportunity Is at Hand for Induction of the Western Idea--Suggests Plans for the Inauguration of Railroads and Other Improvements.

New York, April 15 .- H. T. Bosman of Hong Kong, accompanied by his wife and servants, is in the city. At home Dr. Bosman is better known as Mr. Ho Tung, and he is one of the leading merchants of his native city, as well as one of its most extensive property owners. Mr. Bosman, though an Oriental, is a British subject and a justice of the peace in his majesty's service.

Mr. Bosman is deeply interested in the trend of events, politically, in the Far East. To a reporter in an interview he said:

"I believe that this is the golden opportunity for the induction of Western ideas in the Chinese Kingdom, and the disagreement of the powers as to the amount of indemnity to be paid for the Boxer disturbances should lead to some sort of compromise having for its object the development of undeveloped Asia rather than the levying of a mere monetary fine, which could be raised by additional taxation, and in the end perhaps leave the situation of the country unchanged. I have a plan in my own mind which I think worthy of attention, but it would only be a civilizing influence: Let the powers agree upon the amount of indemnity to be paid and then contract among themselves and with the Pekin government, say on the \$200,000,000 basis, for building of railroads and for other internal improvements in China under the joint control of the powers, to be operated by them until the full amount of the investment is returned and until China is in a position to become. by purchase, the sole owner of the improvements.
