The Future of the Negro. abhington Times. Probably no man, white or Slack, in the United States has Cone or is doing so much for the levation of the negro race as Booker Washington. His life is an inspration to his people, an his educational work is of inestimable value to them. If all of those who assume to be the friend of the negro showed the same liberality of spirit as Mr. Washington does, and labored alons smilar lines, the problem woul be very much simplified. Inher ently $i t$ is not so difficult as is generally believed. A large portrom of the trouble has resulted ate manner in which it has he treated. False elements have bee injected into the question. Some well-meaníag people have thought. and still think, that the negro can be put upon a, plane of socia ee put upon a, plane of social
equality with the whites by mere abstract moral reasoning, while others, not so well-meaning, have prejudiced the cause of the colored race by attempting selfish .

Closely analyzing the allege wrongs of the negro, we find tha they all connect with and are the immediate outgrowth of the fact that he is not recognoized by the whites as an equal. Much is said about the lynchings in the South, but those unfortunate happenings are merely incidental to the main proposition. Negroes are not ynched because they are negroes. White meb are treated in the same way, although the cases may not be quite so numerous. When a colored man is thus put to death without a trial it is beccuse he is believed to have committed some heinous crime. It is not always a crime against womanhood, but there can be no doubt that the frequency with which such acts are committed intensities the feelings of the whites and makes them readier to resort to lynchings in other cases where the crimes are of a serious character. bleck, stop committing erime and lack, stop committing crime and ynchings will cease. If the blacke as a class will act upon the advice of Booker T. Washington, educat hemselves and mprove their morals, they will have little or nothing to complain of upon this core.
It will not, however, be so easy tor them to attain the position of social equality with the whites. Nor can it be said that their inablity to do so affords legitimate ground for complaint. The whites themseives divide up socially, and there are many exclusive sets. They also have their grades of so ciety. There is no way of forcing the whites to accept the negro as a social equal. By the cultivation of his intellect and his morals th latter may overcome very much of the feeling which now exists, bu it is scarcely possible that the black man can ever entirely bridge the gulf which separates him frum the white. There is a race difference and antipathy which will exist in spite of intellectual or moral qual ities. But this need not rende the future of the race hopeless by any means. Its happiness doe not depend upon an interminglin with whites as social equals. As mayor of fact, the negroes of th United States have egen now mor opportunities for advancemen and the improvement of their con ant the improvement of their con dred millions of white people living is Earope.
Those who have constituted themselves the champions of the oolored race have generally as sumed that its future depends en tirely upon the elective franchise and that any limitation of its priv ileges in, this respect makes it drancement impossible. As a mere abstraction, this ould not have been so bad, but he practical effect in many cases was to make the negro the politial master of his former owner. People may moralize about it as much as they please, but the cold fact is that it is not in the nature of the Caucasian race to stand it. We may grant, arguendo, that he Fifteenth Amendment being he law of the land, no one has a ight to set it at defiance. This, hough, does not prove or tend to rove that the future of the negro lepends upon his immediate en. pyment of the elective franchise. Considering the matter philosophcally, it may be fairly urged hat if his voting privilege is made o depend upon his educational atinments, it will stimulate his de ire to obtain the necessary educa on, and thus inure to his advanige. If he is denied the ballot ecause he is ignorant and not by eason of his color, te has no moral right to complain, and nobody else has a mortal right to complain for him.
