POWERS CONVICTED.

Given a Life Term in Penitentiary-A Motion for New Trial Overruled-Appeal to Be Taken.

Georgetown, Ky., October 26 .-Ex-Secretary of State Caleb Powers was to-day again convicted as accessory before the fact to murder of Governor William Goebel in January, 1900, and the second time sentenced to imprisonment for life.

The second trial began October and has continued with three sessions daily, court adjourning late at night. The present term expired to-night. Arguments were limited, so that the case went to the jury at 2 o'clock this evening, and a verdict of guilty soon followed.



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

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
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
