# The English Are Growing Tall.

"No nation is increasing in height and weight so rapidly as the English," says a British journal. The proof of this is shown in statistics recently collected of the height of 10,000 boys and men. "At the age of 17 these averaged 5 feet 8 inches; to the age of 22, 5 feet 9 inches; at 17 they weighed 10 stone 2 pounds; at 22, 10 stone 13 pounds. In fifty years the average has gone up for the whole nation from 5 feet 7 1-2 inches to 5 feet 8 1-2 inches. The average height of the British upper classes at 30 years of age is 5 feet 8 1-2 inches, of the farm laborer 5 feet 7 3-5 inches. The criminal class brings down the average, as their height is but 5 feet 5 4-5 inches."

"The recent great storm in Cleveland," said a man from that city a day or two ago, "was a most remarkable one in many respects. First of all, the city is on such a high bluff, nearly forty feet above the level of the lake, that it seems preposterous to imagine for an instant that any rain storm, however severe, could inundate the streets and force the people to use boats. One would think that the water would quickly run off into the lake. On the highest ground the water did not attain a depth of more than a foot at any time, but this great volume of water, reinforced by the long downpour and the veritable cloudburst that lasted for nearly three hours, played havoc in the lower section of the town, to the east, where the finest residences are. Quite a little ridge along shore prevented the overflow from reaching the lake, and the water thus was forced inland. In some streets it became six feet deep. The sewers were utterly incapable of carrying off such a great mass of water. The fury of the storm finally abated, but not until tremendous damage had been done by the water. Great gullies were washed out of the cemetery on the lake shore, where the remains of Garfield lie. It was at first reported that his tomb had been damaged, but this report fortunately proved untrue. The tomb is on a high hill, and is very solidly constructed of granite. Still even that could not have withstood the rush of waters if they had reached that high. The people of Cleveland on that high projecting bluff of land far above lake level never expected any danger from a flood, but for once they were surprised."





His leading counsel, ex-Governor Brown, fought long and earnestly for a continuance, which the court refused. At that trial, which lasted some fortyfive days, he was found guilty and sentenced to the penitentiary for life by the jury. He got a new trial from the court of appeals, because the judge in charging the jury in Scott county used the singular instead of the plural in speaking of accomplices. The second trial was called, and a bitterly contested fight was made by Powers' attorneys for a continuance again. The Kansas City, Mexico & Orient The court overruled the motion to continue. The trial proceeded The evidence, to my mind, appears to be overwhelming against Powers. There can't be any doubt of his guilt. It seems a pity that a young man of his promise should be sentenced to death, but there any escape from that result as the evidence now stands. The trial judge has been very fair. He has been criticised very much because he would not stop to listen to an affidavit by Mr. Powers' attorneys on Saturday afternoon, the 12th.
