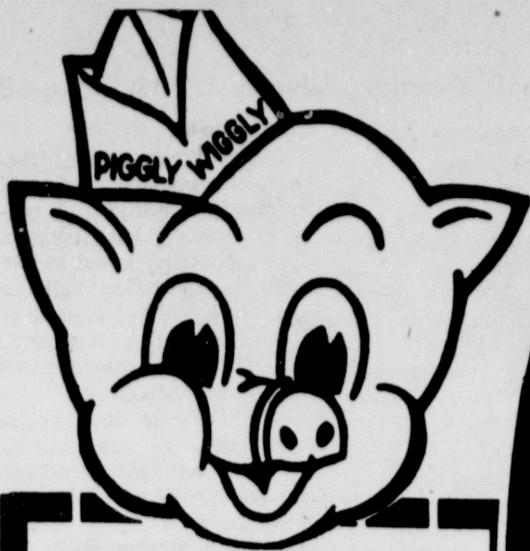

According to Mr. Jimmie Crawford, who is the Easter Seal Representative for Bailey County, over 22,000 handicapped Texans received Easter Seal treatments during 1971.

"Despite medical scientific advances," Mr. Crawford explained, "the ranks of the crippled are growing. This is because of population growth, increased number of accidents and medical treatment which saves victims of crippling di-

ered the grand champion barrow for 11 consecutive years and 14 years in the last 18.

Dwain Menefee and Larry (Butch) Fairchild of Friona are co-chairmen of the show. Redge Priest of Friona is superintendent of the steer show, assisted by Calvin Niessner, Farwell and Phillip Weatherly, Friona.

Darrell Mason, Lazbuddie and Johnny Miller, Friona, are in charge of the sheep show, and Joe Tarter is chairman of the barrow show.

The barrows will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. Friday, February 18. The sheep judging begins at 1:30 p.m. that day. Steers will be judged beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday.

Weigh-in time for barrows and sheep is 2-6 p.m. Thursday, February 17. Steers are to be weighed in between 7 and 8 a.m. Saturday, February 19.

Trophies and rosettes will be awarded to the top animals, courtesy of the Parmer County Farm Bureau. Showmanship awards are awarded to each of the show's three divisions.

An auction sale of all of the top animals will be held beginning at 1 p.m. Saturday, February 19. The sale annually ranks among much larger shows for the gross amount, exceeding \$40,000 the past few years.

Show officials urge entrants to be prompt in having their animals weighed.

Judging the sheep and barrow shows will be Jerry Stockton of Frensh High School, Justin McBride, Deaf Smith County Agricultural Agent will judge the steers.

The Easter Seal Campaign, which provides funds for continuation of these services, begins February 28 and continues through April 2, Easter Sunday.

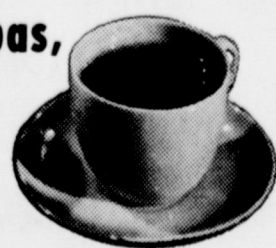

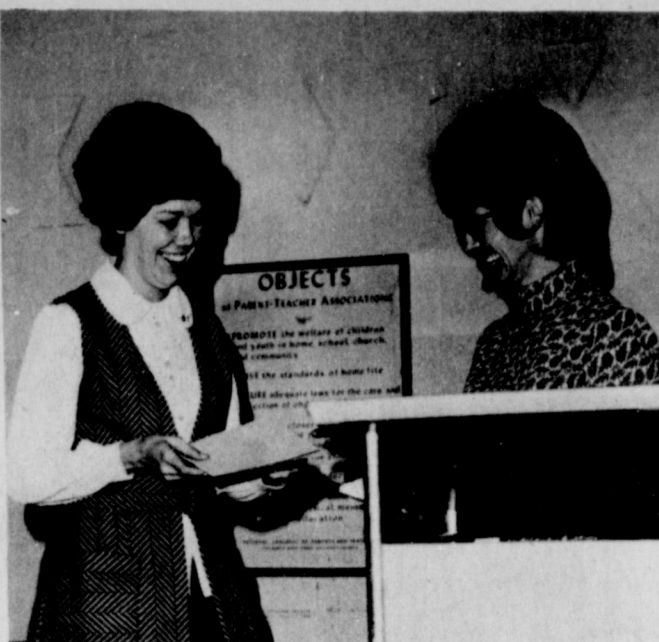

Effective Family Communication

COLLEGE STATION—Ever feel like you're just not getting through to someone in your family?

You've got to know how to communicate effectively if you want to be understood and want to understand someone else, according to Jane Fleischer, family life education specialist at Texas A&M University.

"Only as you accurately understand and are understood can you achieve successful interpersonal relationships," Miss Fleischer said. "Communication is a process or a tool. And the degree of success with which we use it helps determine the degree of success achieved in family relationships."

The specialist suggested some ways to improve family communication: "Respect the personality of each person as an individual. Answer the simple, direct questions children ask. Listen to what the person says—both in words and gestures or expressions."

Try to prevent outbursts of anger and thoughtless remarks. If they do occur, follow with a sincere apology. When disagreements arise, talk them over before the molehill of bickering becomes a mountain of stony silence or an erupting volcano," she suggested.

Miss Fleischer said that each husband and wife and every family member needs to discipline himself in the early stages of anger to avoid any ridicule or nagging. "The opposite of these—thoughtfulness, appreciation, courtesy and gratitude—are like showers on parched land."

Another suggestion Miss Fleischer made for communicating effectively is trying to see things from the other person's viewpoint. "For example, the wife who insists on changing plans for some activity when she sees her husband is tired is a wise wife, indeed. A husband is also wise when he senses that his wife has had a rough day and decides to take her out to dinner."

"And finally, be as courteous to members of your family as you are to casual acquaintances. Give praise for a sincere effort from the other person; show appreciation for a favor, no matter how small."

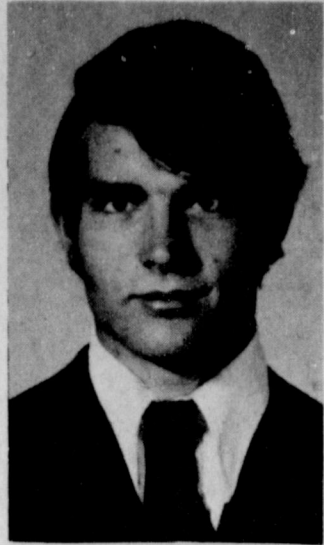

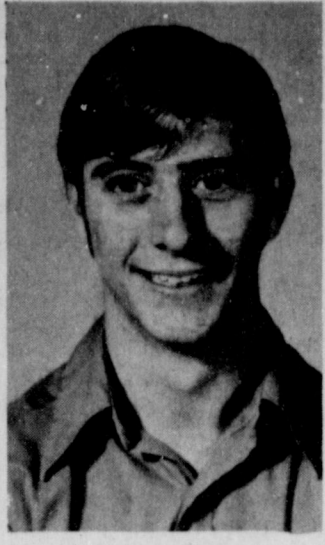

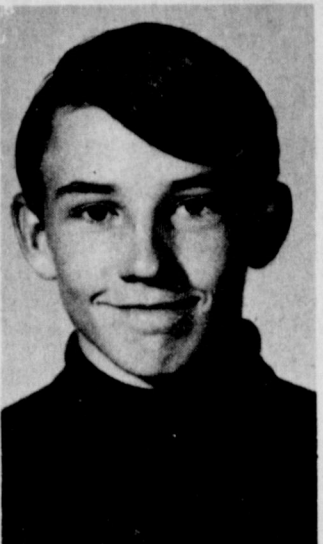

AUSTIN, TEX.--The complex question of financing May and June primary elections is heading for a final legal test. Comptroller Robert S. Calvert asked Atty. Gen. Crawford

C. Martin for an official opinion on Secretary of State Bob Bullock's plan to pay for the party primaries with state funds.

Bullock forced the issue to a head last week by handing Comptroller Calvert \$73 worth of initial pre-primary bills and asking him to pay them.

Calvert balked and took the

matter to Martin for advice. "I will not pay anything out of the treasury for this unless I have a written opinion from the attorney general or an order of the court," said Calvert. He added he does not think Martin will advise him to pay the bills submitted by Bullock. "If the vouchers are, for some reason, not approved, I

intend to place this question before the Texas Supreme Court at the earliest possible moment so that the entire matter of primary financing can be adequately, equitably and finally resolved," Bullock stated. He moved with court authority to formulate rules for the primaries after a three-judge federal court January 20 struck down the filing fee law relied on to finance the spring elections. Gov. Preston Smith proposes to transfer to him more than \$1 million for paying primary bills if the plan is finally cleared by legal authorities.

Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine accused Smith and Bullock of pre-empting prerogatives of the legislature, and said the governor should call an immediate special session to give lawmakers another whack at resolving the problem. Reps. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty and Jim Nugent of Kerrville defended Smith and Bullock and charged Price was trying to further his House speakership campaign. Daniel and Nugent are also seeking the speakership.

PRIMARIES CROWDED--A total of 55 candidates for statewide office entered the Democratic primary before the February 7 filing deadline. There are contests for every office on the statewide ballot except four judicial places.

Republicans fielded only 10 state office candidates--and seven of them are running for governor.

There are 10 Democratic candidates for governor, five for U.S. Senator, nine for lieutenant governor, three for attorney general, nine for comptroller, seven for treasurer, two for agriculture commissioner and four for railroad commissioner.

Republicans have only one candidate each for U.S. Senator (incumbent Sen. John Tower), treasurer and railroad commissioner.

Former Sen. Ralph W. Yar-

borough and Barefoot Sanders of Dallas are the leading Democratic candidates for senator. Governor Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and State Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi will stir most of the action in the governor's race. Three state senators and a newspaper executive are battling for a runoff spot for lieutenant governor.

HOSPITAL FUNDS APPROVED--Loan guarantees with interest subsidies totalling more than \$23.8 million have been approved by the Texas Board of Health for 14 Hill-Burton hospital construction projects. Another \$450,000 was set aside for the Ranger General Hospital pending completion of a feasibility study of its new building program.

Subsidies were approved for Texas Medical Center Laundry Co-op Association, Houston; Scott and White Memorial Hospital at Temple; Henderson Memorial Hospital; Eastland Memorial Hospital; Freestone County Hospital at Fairfield; Heart of Texas Memorial Hospital at Brady; Decatur Hospital at Amarillo;

Marshall Memorial Hospital; Bailey County Hospital District at Muleshoe; Red River County Hospital at Clarksville; Nona Hospital Authority; King's Daughters Hospital at Temple; Richards Memorial Hospital at Rockdale and St. Anthony Hospital at Amarillo.

Twenty-six other applications will be considered at a March meeting.

COURT SPEAKS--Texas Supreme Court ordered a district court trial of an Andrews property owner's suit to force his local school board to tax bank stocks.

The High Court also held a 57-year-old woman who received a broken leg after being butted by a "petting zoo" goat cannot collect damages from Six Flags Over Texas.

The State Court of Criminal

Appeals reversed convictions of three El Paso men for possessing obscene material (girlie magazines) for purpose of sale.

For the second time, the Court of Criminal Appeals reversed lower courts and ordered a new trial for a man arrested with a truck load (567 cases) of cigarettes which had no state tax stamps.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled out a suit by parents of a blind boy who drowned at a school for the blind swimming pool against the institution.

APPOINTMENTS--Robert B. Gilmore of Dallas was reappointed to a new six-year term on the Texas Water Development Board.

Governor Smith made these appointments to the Criminal Justice Council: Harmon Schepps of Dallas, Kent Hance of Lubbock, Mayor Ken Ritter of Beaumont, Mrs. Ray W. Willoughby of San Angelo, 148th District Judge Noah Kennedy of Corpus Christi, W.E. Haynes Jr. of Laredo, Dr. I.T. Hunter of Tyler, Mrs. Carroll Koch of Quanah and Police Chief William Harold McGee of Texas.

Fred Toler of Austin was named executive director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education.

Theodore Ziller of Austin is new head of the Texas Highway Department Construction Division.

DRAFT LOTTERY CUT-OFF IS 200--A temporary draft lottery cut-off number of 200 has been set for the 1972 first priority group.

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, state director of Selective Service, said the number is subject to downward revisions as manpower needs change. Local boards were authorized to reclassify all draft registrants of the first priority group for 1972 with lottery numbers 201-365 in Class 1-H.

AG OPINIONS--District clerks are required to report to vote registrars felony convictions where probated sentences are assessed as well as other convictions, the attorney general has held.

In other recent opinions, the attorney general concluded:

*Texas laws do not limit the number or amount of bail bonds a corporate surety may make.

*State employees must work a minimum 40 hour week, but can be assigned to 10 hours a day, four days a week.

*Law regulating sport of falconry applies to imported as well as native falcons.

PWC HEAD REPLACED--

Governor Smith, in a surprise move, relieved Pearce Johnson of Austin of the Parks and Wildlife Commission chairmanship and appointed Jack Stones, Wells banker, to replace him.

At the same time, the governor designated Parks and Wildlife Department Executive Director James U. Cross to succeed Johnson as state-federal liaison in parks matters.

The action came soon after a federal circuit court of appeals threw out a lawsuit filed by Johnson to block purchase of Mustang Island property for a state park. However, Smith's office said the shuffle followed a policy of rotating chairmanships and had nothing to do with the prolonged Mustang Island wrangle.

Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for January, 1972 shows a total of 500 accidents resulting in nine persons killed and 217 persons injured as compared to January, 1971 with 467 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 235 persons injured.

Also during 1971, Lubbock County's 511 traffic accidents was the highest number recorded by any county of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region. Parker County ranked second with 429 accidents.

The nine traffic deaths for the month of January, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Lubbock, 3; Palo Pinto, 2; Cochran, Garza, Gray and Wheeler, one each.

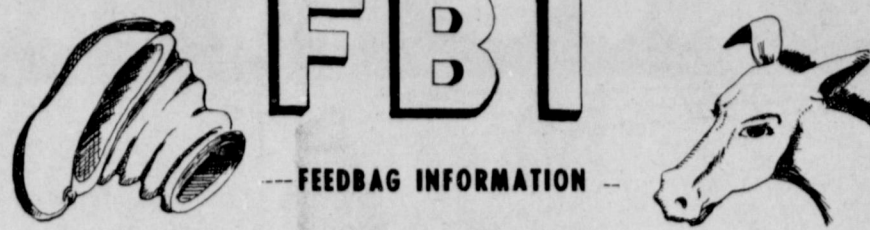

ASCS Briefs

Producers interested in updating their corn, grain sorghum or barley bases will have until March 10 to file their request. If producers have changed from one commodity to another since bases were established, they should check with the local ASCS office to see how updating bases will effect their farm. Each cotton producer must submit a record of his 1971 cotton production before 1972 cotton yields can be computed. Cotton yields can be computed. Each producer has been mailed a card to carry to the gin for certification of the total number of bales and the net weight.

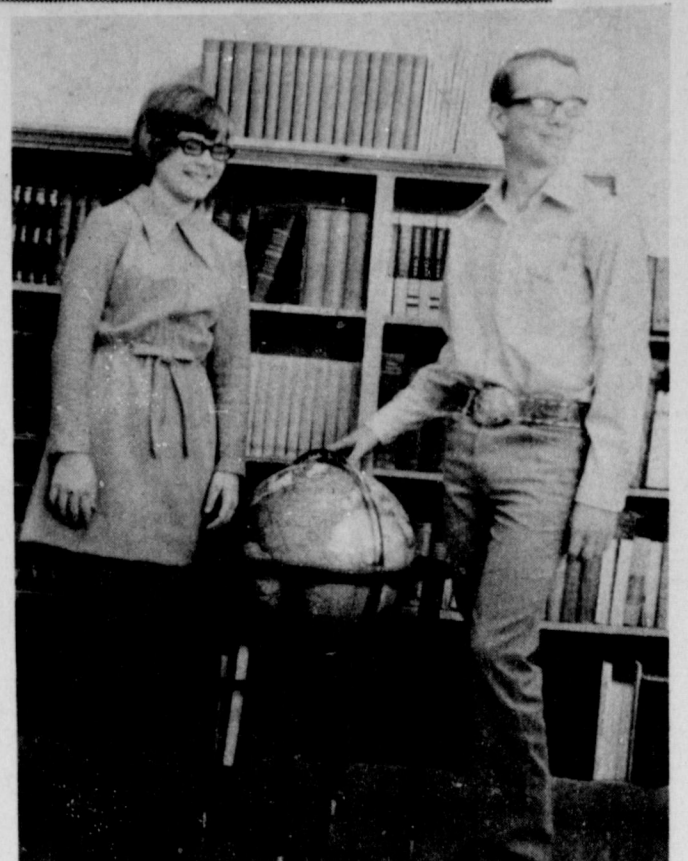
1972 Cotton Allotment transfers will be accepted through May 3, 1972. The Bailey County ASCS Committee has approved transferring cotton allotments out of the county by sale or lease.

The state did not hold a reserve for new farm peanuts for 1972. This means there will be no more new grower peanut allotments. This will not effect the one acre provision or allotments already established. Skip row rules are the same as in 1971 with the exception of peanuts. Effective for 1972 any area planted to peanuts will be considered as entirely devoted to peanuts regardless of the planting pattern.

Wool producers are reminded that they must bring sales documents for shorn wool and unshorn lambs to the ASCS office by not later than January 31, 1972.

Designated set-aside acreage must be at least equal in productivity to other cropland on the farm normally planted to crops for which payments are to be made. Wet low-lying areas, turnrows, droughty knobs, and other areas which normally would not produce a crop are not eligible for set-aside.

"As a major supplier of world food and feed grains, this country cannot afford to be out-manuevered, regardless of the cause," contends Seibert.

Texas' Grain Economy Slowing Decline

COLLEGE STATION--"Reduced grain exports from Texas ports are costing the state's grain industry millions of dollars," says John J. Seibert, grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"The impact is already being felt throughout the total industry, from the producer to the handler, transporter and exporter. Furthermore, the situation will contribute to our balance of payment deficit."

Most often the producer takes the brunt of the load when exports decline, explains Seibert. He is not represented at the bargaining table, so his price is generally discounted at the time of sale. This reflects reduced demand in the marketplace.

last six months, resulting in a loss of more than \$25 million.

Seibert lists several factors contributing to the reduction in grain exports. First, large world supplies of grain offer stiff competition to U.S. produced grains. Price relationships with competing U.S. grains, along with prices of grains from other countries, are also a factor. A third cause is dock strikes. These have reduced sales in addition to prompting our stable customers to look elsewhere for reliable supplies, notes the specialist.

"The recent dollar devaluation has created a favorable competitive position for our grains when compared with other suppliers," he adds. "Yet some competing suppliers abroad are devising tactics to nullify any gains made in this financial arena. These include increasing import duties, tariffs and import restrictions."

"As a major supplier of world food and feed grains, this country cannot afford to be out-manuevered, regardless of the cause," contends Seibert.
