It was determined that the mayof each town in Texas shoul e requested to appoint a commitee of three representative citizens of his city to attend this conventon and now we desire that you immediately make such appointments and advise the committee as quick y as possible your appointees.
As it is desired that as wid publicity as possible be given to this subject and to the convention proposed to be held, we request deas you advise us brieny your f our having same published genrally throughout the state. W lso desire that you have this comnunication published in your loca papers, together with your views on the subject, and in every way possible assist in creating the seniment in favor of the passage of mmedrate laws to assist the coton growers of Texas, which sentiment is absolutely necessary in order for the desired resnlt obtained.
The ravages of the boll weevi have already cansed such incalcuable destruction to a large portio of our state that the commit ee do not feel it necessary more than call your attention to the immense gravity of the situa ion. Those sections of our state which have not yet been visited, can expect to be reached with absolute certainty within the next two years.
