D. 1903, for a local or special law to authorize said International& Great Northern Railroad Company to purchase, own and operate as a part or parts of its line, the railroad constructed or to be constructed of the Houston, Beaumont and New Orleans Railroad Company and also the railroad constructed or to be constructed of the Houston, Oaklawn and Magnolia Park Railway Company, or either of them, as defined in their respective charters, together with all franchises and property incident or appertaining to said railroads or either of them; and to authorize said Houston, Beaumont and New Orleans Railroad Company and said Houston, Oaklawn and Magnolia Park Railway Company each to sell its railroad as defined in its charter, together with all franchises and property incident or appertaining thereto, to said International & Great Northern Railroad Company, and to authorize said International & Great Northern Railroad Company to issue and negotiate its bonds secured or to be secured by mortgage or mortgages, subject to the laws of the State of Texas governing the issuance and negotiation of bonds by railroad companies; and to authorize said International & Great Northern Railroad Company to construct, own and operate, as a part or parts of its line, the unfinished portion or portions of said railroads, or either of them, between the termini as defined in their respective charters, and to construct, own and operate, as part or parts of its line, extensions and branches of said railroads, or either of them, under or as authorized in and by the charter of said International & Great Northern Railroad Company or any amendment thereof made or to be made in pursuance of general laws of the State of Texas; to regulate reports relative to the railroads, franchises and property, authorized by this act to be purchased and sold, and the operation thereof; and to prescribe the conditions upon which said purchases and sales shall take effect and be dependent; and to authorize said Companies and each of them to execute all necessary contracts, agreements and conveyances to accomplish said purchases and sales.

SURVIVAL OF PIRACY

SEA ROBBERS STILL MAKE OCEAN TRAVEL UNSAFE.

Unchecked by the Government, Fighters Under the Black Flag Practice Their Vocation Off the Fukien Coast of China-Slay all Who Oppose Them.

Mail advices report that piratetraft are now thicker than ever off the Fukien coast of China, which is at the present day a most dangerous highway for junks traversing the coast between Canton, Swatow and Amoy. Piratical junks, well manned and well armed, cruise about the Tunganhsien coast in squadrons of threes and fours, lying in wait for trading junks laden with rich cargoes bound from Amoy and neighborhood to Swatow or Canton or vice versa; in some cases stripping the merchant craft of all their cargoes, sails, rigging, food supplies, armament, etc., and leaving the crews just so much as to enable them to navigate their junks to the nearest seaport, while in other cases landing the crews at rome spot on the coast, and taking away the junks and all that is in

Resistance means death at the hands of the pirates, who seldom massacre the trading junk crews, unless the junks show fight and cause severe loss to the pirates. there is no mercy shown; every surviving member of the trading junk's crew being thrown into the sea. Hence, unless well armed and strongly manned, merchant junks seldom show fight to a superior force of pirates, preferring to show their sterns to the latter, if they can. If, however, the forces are equal, two te two, or three to three, a battle often ensues, and if the resistance be a stubborn one, small chance is left to the junk's crew to survive the conflict should they be worsted by the pirates.

The custom, therefore, is to show fight, and if the pirates persist in fighting to a finish, the traders generally heave to and prudently allow tne pirates to board them and "do whatever may seem best in their sight," for more often than not reinforcements for the aid of the enemy sail in sight not long after a battle ir commenced. This, has, therefore, encouraged the pirates of the Fukien coast, between Amoy and Swatow, to make that place their constant ground, so that unless it be stopped, the junk trade between Fukien and Kuangtung provinces will soon be a thing of the past, so great is the terror inspired by the pirates in the crews of trading junks.

The cause of all this is the absence of government ships and war junks. Before the war with Japan (1894-95) there was a respectable number of war junks quite able to cope with the formidable sea pirates, but since then "retrenchment" has been the motto of the Fukien officials, and a cruising squadron of war junks on the Fukten coast has of late years been rather the exception than the rule-except the annual cruise (in a steam sloop) of the "admiral" of the Fukien province, whose headquarters are at Amoy—and he usually cruises away from the pirates' preserves.-Portland Oregonian.

CHARGED WITH MURDERING HIS MOTHER.

CRIME FIVE YEARS AGO.

A Jury was Secured Quickly and Agree ment Made to Use Stenographer's Notes on Certain Testimony.

San Antonio, Texas, Dec. 9.-Virgil Gallagher, who has been in jail five years and four months, charged with the murder of his mother, Mrs. Kate M. Gallagher, in Galveston, on August 15, 1897, was arraigned in the Thirtyseventh district court this morning, the case having been brought here from De Witt county, where it had been taken from Brazoria county, to which court it had been taken from the Galveston district court on the alleged ground that a fair and impartial trial could not be had in either of the countles named.

PALMER IS TO ACT.

WILL NOT PERMIT THREATY TO GO TO THE HOUSE.

IT WILL BE SIGNED SOON

This is Understood to Be a Hostile Body, Hence Reason for Refusing to Let It Act on Measure.

Havana, Dec. 6 .- After a conference with Secretaries Zaldo and Montes last night, President Palma said: "My commissioners, Zaldo and Montes, will sign the reciprocity treaty with General Bliss probably on Monday or Tuesday next. It will then be sent to Washington, where the treaty will be signed by Secretary Hay and the Cuban minister, Queseda. After confirmation by the United States senate I will send the treaty to the Cuban senate for approval. I shall not send it to the house of representatives, because the executive has, with the approval of the senate, the right, according to the constitution, to make a treaty which does not affect the tariff. This agreement provides for certain reductions in the duties from imports from the United States, but the tariff on these articles is not changed. After the approval of the treaty I intend to send a message to the senate and the house of representatives, asking for a revision of the tariff, in order to keep up the revenues, which necessarily will be lessened by the treaty."

A senator who supports the administration gives as his opinion that the reciprocity agreement must be approved by the house of representa-

The matter of issuing a loan of \$35,000,000 is again before the senate.

Washington, Dec. 6 .- The message from President Palma that he will sign the reciprocity treaty has greatly relieved the members of the administration, who had been informed that the matter was practically lost and would be referred to the Cuban house of representatives, which has a majority hostile to the United States. AMERICAN MUTINEERS.

Shot Two British Officers and Escaped on a Raft in Midocean.

Queenstown D.ec. 6.-The British ship Leicester Castle from San Francisco arrived here yesterday. Her commander reported that on Sept. 3 three American seamen mutinied and Captain Pettie and his second officer were shot, the latter fatally, after an encounter with the mutineers who left the ship on a raft in midocean.

The captain gave the names of the mutineers as W. A. Hobbs, Earnest Sears and Turner. They were all shipped in San Francisco.

The second officer, Nixon, was shot while attempting to rescue the captain. In the darkness the mutineers got a few planks and coops, formed a raft and launched it from the ship, which was then about 300 miles north of Pitcairn islands. The captain searched for the raft the next day, but

mised that it went to pieces. Captain Pettus added that Hobbs was the actual murderer of Nixon, whom he shot through the heart.

it was not sighted, and it was sur-

The captain himself was shot twice, but he had quite recovered when he arrived here.

When the chief officer discovered that the three men had mutinied he mustered the rest of the crew on the poop, intending to await daylight and capture the mutineers, but the latter escaped in the interum.

The captain is unable to account for the mutiny. He supposes it was the intention of the mutineers to murder the officers and the men who refused to join them and take the ship to Pitcairn islands. It is said Hobbs came from Illinois, Sears from Idaho and




