contracts were recently awarded at a rate corresponding nearly with the average of the Brooklyn bids, and to companies associated witi the national àsphalt combination.
In Philadelphia, these same

contract for asphalt paving at an verage of $\$ 2.58$ per square yard -more than $\$ 1$ in excess of th sate charged in New York. Thi The price of a palic robbery. The price of aspbalt paving in Philadelphia has doubled under the present administration. In other words, where competition i dmitted, it has remained at the old figures or has been reduced Competition is deliberately exclud ed here by confining the bids to asphalt from certain specitied lo calities controlled by the Mack trust. As there can be no outside hidders on these specifications, the Mack interests fix their own price. In New York, where the standde paving is at least as good as
in Philadelphia, there is simply
no such hinitation. The require
nent is simply for a certain quali y, not for any particular brand of asphalt, and as a result the city gets its paring done at the mar ket price. The same interests ar content with $\$ 1$ less per yard of paving than the Ashbridge ad ministration gives them. This margin is bold plunder, allowed and proyided by the thrifty polit ical organization that controls all branches of public activity i Philadelphia.
The relations of the asphal icipality will afford the new Mayor an opportunity to "do his duty she shall see it."

cept as otherwise provided in this act.
Art. 2. The Cómmissioner Court of Houston county she at its regular Nov. term in each year apportion the various hands road precincts of said county The said court at said term sha appoint one competent road ove seer for each rond precinct, whic overseer may be appointed from among the hands subject to road doty in said road precinct, or if working of the publio roads of said courty, may appoint an over seer for any road precinct in the seer for any road precinct in the
county from any other road pre einct or portion of said coundy; einct or portion of said county; pengg the intent of this act th place the roads in the hande and road constructors.

Art. 3. It shall be the duty the Commissioners of each com missioners' precinct to annually
review the roads of his commisreview the roads of his commis sioners' precinct and for his services in so doing, shall receive the sum of $\$ 8.00$ per day for not more than twelve days in each year, and shall make an official report to the November term of the Commissioners' Court of said county, stating the condition of the roads in their respective commissioners

Private donations are hereby solicited to be expenided upon the public roads of said county, and when a private dona tion is made for any road precinct in said couuty, the Commissioners' Court may immediately set aside from the Treasury of said county, out of the road and bridge fund, an equal amount to the amount dion anded by such private subscrip the private donation shall be ex pended upon the road precincts of such fund.
