> Ocean Cliffs Set on Fire by Waves. It is not often that the waves of the ocean can set cliffs afire, but they do sometimes. 

ROBERT E. ROWELL SHOT IN BACK AND BURIED IN FIELD.

#### SHERIFF LOGANED MURDERER.

John Goff Told the Sheriff He Did It, and Pointed Out Spot Where Body Lay-Is in Jail.

Emory, Texas, April 13.-Last night the body of Robert E. Rowell was found buried in a cornfield about five miles from Emory.

Rowell was in Emory last Monday attending county court, and left town for his home, about six and a half miles distant, late in the day. Two men saw him about night going in the direction of Mrs. Drehers. He had not been seen since. His horse returned home riderless Tuesday evening. Suspicion being aroused it was learned that John Goff, a son of Mrs. Dreher, about 18 or 19 years of age, had told different people that if Rowell ever came to their house again he would kill him.

Last night Sheriff Osborn accused young Goff of being the slayer, whereupon Goff broke down and took the sheriff down into the cornfield and pointed out where Rowell was buried. The body was found, and will be properly buried today. Rowell was a married man about 30 years of age, and a good farmer. Goff says that he had sent Rowell word by different men that he would kill him if he ever came to see them again. Goff says he shot Rowell twice in the back with a Winchester, then buried the body in the field, plowing the field next day. Goff is in jail.

Hong Kong: An explosion has occurred at the Canton arsenal powder factory. Fifteen hundred persons are reported to have been killed.

BACOLOD WAS CAPTURED.

Captain Pershing Defeated a Force Moros, Killing 100.

Manila, April 11.-Captain Pershing's force captured Bacolod, Island Mindanao, Wednesday. It killed 100 Moros and wounded many others. Three Americans were wounded.

Pershing's force consisted of the Twenty-seventh infantry, Patrick's troop of the Fifteenth cavalry and Chacuacis battery. Pershing was surveying the west shore lands when the Bacolodians opposed an advance and provoked a fight. Pershing surrounded and attacked the stronghold, first shelling them and rushing the troops forward, charging gallantly. After crossing a deep moat and entering the fort the Americans engaged the Moros with bayonets against krisses. One hundred defenders were killed, including Datto Panandungan, and many were wounded. After the capture of the fort it was destroyed. The Basoold leaders and a majority of the people of that district have been hostile to the Americans and encouraged the attacks on the American camps. They rejected tenders of friendship. It is expected the defeat of the Bacolodians will result in all the Moros acknowledging American sovereignty. Pershing's column is going to Marahua which is also hostile.

#### Another Blowout at a Well.

COSTLY STONE IN OREGON.

Discovery of a Mine of Jade in the Far Northwestern State.

A very important mineral discovery has just been made in the Althouse listrict of Southern Josephine county, consisting of the finding in considerthle quantity of the sacred and rare tone, jade. Several miners visited lrant's Pass recently, bringing samoles of the stone with them, says the Kansas City World. These samples were positively identified as jade by Jnited States Mineral Surveyor H. C. Perkins, of this city. The discovery s of great geological importance, from the fact that jade has never before been found in any place in any of the mineral districts of the North American continent. The miners who have come in from the scene of the discovery report that many large pieces of float jade of beautiful color and fine texture have been and are being found both on Althouse and Indian creeks.

Jade is the sacred stone of the Chinese and is used by them in making bracelets, rings, vases, etc. It is a tough, compact stone. Its color varies from an almost pure white to a dark or pale green. Jade was one of the first materials used in the making of weapons and utensils during prehistoric times. There is a coarser or more common variety of the stone known as jadelte that was used in making axes and weapons. The jade was and is highly prized by the people of the Orient for ornamental purposes and carvings. The Chinese name for it is "yu-shih," which means "jade stone."

For ages past the main and principal supply of jade has come from the Kara Kash valley of Eastern Turkestan. It is also found to some extent in New Zealand, the islands of the Pacific and South America; but this is the first time that it has ever been found on the North American continent. The discovery in Southern Josephine county will be thoroughly investigated by interested parties. It is of especial interest to the geological world.


