Remedies for Boll Weevil Failures. Agosinn, Tex., August 27.-The committee of five practical farmers, which was appointed by Gov. Lanham to witness the demonstration of the different mechanical devices and remedies for eradicating the cotton boll weevil, submitted by those who are seeking the reward of $\$ 50,000$ that is offered by the state for a successfut and practical method or remedy for the pest, completed its labors to-day. The experiment and demonstrations were conducted at three different places in the cotton belt. The committee found all of the proposed devices and remedies to be unsuccessful, and no award will be made this season.
Owing to the advanced growth of the cotton plant the committee will not resume its tests until next season. It will then begin when the cotton is very small and thoroughly test all the devices fhat may be offered. Members of the committee express the opinion that a successful and practical mechatical device for removing the weevil from the cotton plant will we invented next season plant will be invented next season and that

## ow to Combat the Mexican Cotton

 Boll Weevilin Summer and Fall.E. Dwight Sanderson, state Entomologist

The known methods of satisfactorily controlling damage by the boll weevil may be classed under two general heads; viz.:(1) Grow-
ing an early maturing crop, and ing an early mataring crop
(2) Destroying the weevils.
The first step is to plant early 15 maturing varieties or northern grown seed as early as possible, in wide rows, running them east and west. Next hoe the cotton to a
stand as soon as possible, leaving stand as soon as possible, leaving
good distances in the rows; never good distances in the rows; never
less than 18 inches, and in hottom less than 18 inches, and in hottom
lands, two and a half to three feet or in checks.
$\begin{array}{ll}20 & 00 \\ 80 & \text { The growth of early maturing }\end{array}$ cotton and hastening the ripening of the crop is advocated for two reasons. (1) It has been found that where injury by the weevil is serious the main part of the crop iset before the middle of July, or in other words before the second brood of weevils appears in force, as this second brood is sufficiently numerous to destroy most of the squares and young bolls. (2) To check the increase of the weevil and to destroy as niany as possible before they go into hibernating quarters for the winter (as des cribed below) it is desirable to des troy the stalks in the fall befor the first frost, whether there be prospects of a top crop or The crop should be crop or not. The crop shouid be grown to ripen early so that the planter will not depend on the late pickings to make a proitablep crop,

In securing an early maturing cotton much might be done by a simple intelligent selection of the seed during the previous season. Texas growers may well give considerable attention to the building up of improved varieties, maturing earlier, with larger bolls, and better staple. The originator of such a variety may well be called a true patriot. Few planters give any consideration to the selection of the seed. Far too many take their seed from a public gin-late in the season, thus securing the very poorest seed as far as the production of an early crop is concerned.
Plants are subject to the same general laws regarding the transmission of characteristics frou parent to progeny as are animals. The cattle breeder improves his crossing. Plants may be improved by the same methods and none are more susceptible to improvement than is cotton. Though many improved varieties have been secured by cross fertilization or hybridization, the great majority have been secured by simple
selection of individuals and the selection of individuals and the
continued selection of the seed oi continued selection of the seed of
their progeny toward a desires their progeny toward a desirec
standard. It is probably becabs 난․ is due to crossing, etc., that more do not attempt to improve their seed. For a most excellent de scription of the methods of select ing cotton seed consult an article in the Yearbook of the United States Department of Agriculture for 1902, The Improvement of Cotton by Seed Selection, by $\mathrm{D}_{1}$. Herbert J. Webber, pages 365 to 386. Every intelligent cotton planter should carefully read this article. We quote from it the ollowing as being most applicable the great, majority of Texas planters:
"A Short Method of Seed Se-eution.-Select careful pickers that remain on the plantation rom year to year and train them o recognize the best plants, that is, those most productive, earliest n ripening, and having the larg. est, best formed, and most numer ous bolls. Each year before the econd pickiug have these select pickers go over the field and pick he cotton from the best plants only. These pickers should be paid by the day and not for the paid by the day aud not for the
