There is enough in the presen development, as respects our cotton crop, to evoke the most anxions reflections upon the gravity
of the situation, when we reflect of the situation, when we reflect
that the cotton crop is the great money crop of the South, and that no part of the country has been more dependent upon it than our section and our country; not, it may be said, from absolute necessity, but from habit. To change the habits of a people in their in-
dustrial affairs is no easy task. A dustrial affairs is no easy task. A sudden change, from necessity,
means much hardship, suffering means much hardship, suffering
and distress. People become eduand distress. People become edusuits, in their daily avocations. They may not call it education. They may not really be conscious of the slow process by which they learn to successfully grow and market any given prodan, in any new field of industry, they will realize how sadly they are in need of experience. All the common labor of this country have learned by every day experience how to grow cotton- and They have an experience that a German, an Englishman or a Frenchman were transplanted to this country and at once required to grow cotton.
What else can the great mass of our farming people do at this time? To stop growing cotton at once and change, all of a sudden, to the - cultivation of some other product, make difficulties of no small degree. Besides all this, the cotton erop is the most important crop of this country, and, for that matter,
of the world. It is indispensable of the world. It is indispensable
to furnish cheap clothing for the to furnish cheap clothing for the
millions of earth. It must be grown-it will be grown-notwithstanding the difficulties that intervene. And let us not forget that the increased production of cotton was barely keeping pace with increased consumption. Texas has for the past few years been producing about one third of the American crop. NowTexas is
threatened with the boll weevil; pest that, so far, has evaded all efforts at its destruction, and its ravages are so overwhelmingly destructive that we are appalled at the present and future conse.

I can remember, when a boy, the army worm was a scourge to the cotton farmer. It came, and and the cotton crop was ruined.

- It all depended on the question whether it came early or late; if whether it came eariy or late; if well, if early it ruined the crop. A remedy was discovered and the army worm has almost been for-
gotten. Now, this new pest has gotten. Now, this new pest ha
come, and has spread over the great cotton belt of Texas, no equally destructive, so far, in
North Texas, but it is there all the same; and there to multiply and scourge the people as elsewhere.
It is also in Louisiana and will, It is also in Louisiana and will,
doubtless, soon be in Mississippi and Alabama, and other Souther States. Its effects at present ar
sufficient to levsen the yolume o sufficient to levsen the volume o
cotton produced, and thereby to
epasance the price.
The cotton production witl by
short of demand, from this on, till a remedy is discovered to destroy it as to lessen its ravages.
This is said with a view to indi cate that lessened production may provided we can manage to pro duce a small crop of cotton. Can his be done in the boll weevil disrot? I think it can. But to do there must be a waking up o he sleeping energies of our people. There mast be organized oncerted action in every neigh
borhood. borbood.
A county organization shoul e formed; and this should be ex ended into a district convention and so on-for it, nust not be over looked that no one man can make this fight; his neighbor's neglect may bring all the boll weevil eeded in his neighborhood; an djoining county may furnish the est for those of another county ear by. Besides, the best intel igence of the country should be consulted, and the best experience nd the sam carefully considered hus, methods will be evolved that will aid us, if they do not accomphsh all that we desire.
Also diversification should be studied and practiced in all cases where practicable. Near railroad tations truck farms and orchards hould be adopted as rapidly as possible; iv aft places attention and other animals; selection of reeds and methods, including eedstaffs, need much eare. Al hese things should be the subject of discussions at
A committee should
A committee should bu forme o gather all information attainable along these lines. A fund hould be raised to defray expenses, so that the burden of this ons. There are many too oner annot be dare many details that Houston county is one of the first in the State, with greatest ariety of soil and products. It destined to be unsurpassed in poople, now, to say how long be ore the realization of this antici patıon.
When I think of the courage ad energy of our people in the reat struggle from 1861 to 1865 and the further struggle with new conditions from 1865 to 1876, and of their steadfastness and unted efforts, for this long period, I cannot imagine the children of those brave men can get their consent to hrow up their hands in despair, bug, called the boll weevil.
Courage, determination and concerted, intelligent and organ ized effort is what is needed now the movement.
If others take this or a simila view, and are prepared to act long such lines, then a meeting hould be called some day in Octo ber, and let the ball be put in mo tion. Don't wait for other people to

ecommend that the farmers put
out open pans as basins of kerosene oil and a light directly over it, and thus ascertain if we can catch the boll weevil in this way. If this can be done it is valuable information for future use. Let us give it a fair trial now before the season is gone and the opportuni lost for this year.
