Our conclusions are, sfter a thorough investigation and study of this question, that it is the most serions problem that has ever confronted the people of this country. At every place we went could be seen evidences of the destruction which these pests have wrought, basiness completely paralyzed, and many people in actual want for the necessities of life. To ful ly realize the gravity of the situation one mast go, as we have gone, wrought by these rapacious insects. We feel that our command of language is inadequate to picture and describe this awfol situation and describe this awiul situation, year is estimated by the president year is estimated by the president of the Cotlon Growers Association at $\$ 60,000,000$. Therefore from our personal observations and in-
vestigations, and from information vestigations, and from information gathered from those why hâve studied this question, made practical experiments and obtained good results therefrom, your committee would make the following recommendations and suggestions to the farmers of this county:

1. The cutting and burning of all stalks, both cotton and corn, sorghum stubble, grass, stumps,
dead trees and trash, in all of which the weevil hibernates.

As an illustration of the advan tages to be derived from the plant ing of early varieties of cotto seed from a more Northern latiude, we were told in Taylor of two men, who had large farms near that place, that ordered an early cotton seed from North Carolina and planted them in the same tive seside hand planted with oawere there, A few days before we pulled up ten stalks of each. The native cotton averaged eleven bolls o the stalk and the early averaged hfty-four bolls to the stalk, both kinds having been planted at the same time, received the same cultívation and were planted on he same quality of soll.
Upon the other hand, every field we saw, we beheve, without a single exception, that was planted late and with the ortinary native seed, was absolutely and en irely destroyed by the weevil
In conclusion, it is our opinio bat those who intend to follow just as well abandon now all hope just as well abandon now all hope of receiving any reward for their
labor; but by adopting these suggestions and others that experince may develop, the damage may be hedged against and reduced until a remedy of extermiantion can'be found.
