Tyler, Tex., Oct. 12, 1903.-To the Tyler Commercial Club: The undersigned, a committee appointed by your club to visit that portion of the State infested by the Mexican boll weevil and investigate the existing conditions with regard to the damage upon the cotton crop and ascertain what methods, if any, had been adopted to exterminate or check them in their ravages, would respectfully report:

Our conclusions are, after a thorough investigation and study of this question, that it is the most serious problem that has ever confronted the people of this country. At every place we went could be seen evidences of the destruction which these pests have wrought, business completely paralyzed, and many people in actual want for the necessities of life. To fully realize the gravity of the situation one must go, as we have gone, and see the terrible destruction wrought by these rapacious insects. We feel that our command of language is inadequate to picture and describe this awful situation, by reason of which the loss for this year is estimated by the president of the Cotton Growers' Association at \$60,000,000. Therefore from our personal observations and investigations, and from information gathered from those who have studied this question, made practical experiments and obtained good results therefrom, your committee would make the following recommendations and suggestions to the farmers of this county:

1. The cutting and burning of sorghum stubble, grass, stumps, dead trees and trash, in all of which the weevil hibernates.


#### Tree and Plant Leaves.

The general arrangement of the leaves on limbs and stalks of trees and plants secures between each sufficient space to prevent one leaf from interfering with another. And not only are leaves so arranged as to exist independently of each other, but in a general way they have taken upon themselves the forms best adapted to secure the maximum of sunlight as it is showered upon them in different latitudes. At the equator, where the sun's rays are vertical, we find large flat leaves like those of the banana, plantain and the

Farther north, where sunlight strikes at an angle, small leaves and pine "needles" are found. Then again note the peculiarity of the Australian gum tree. Instead of exposing their broad faces to the sun the edges only are so turned. Were it otherwise the sun would rob them of all their moisture, it being a well known fact that the gum tree

Why Foam Is White.

The question as to why all foam is white is not an easy one to understand, but the fact is that foam is always white, whatever may be the color duced on a bottle of the blackest ink is white and would be perfectly so formed by the foam, for it is these surwhite. If we remember that all bodies owe their colors to the rays of light, which which reflect all the light they receive. without absorbing any, appear perfectly white, we shall be prepared to understand how the multitude of reflecting surfaces formed by the foam, and which do not absorb any light, must pearance. It is for the same reason that any very fine powder appears white, even the blackest marble, when ground to dust, losing every trace of its original color
